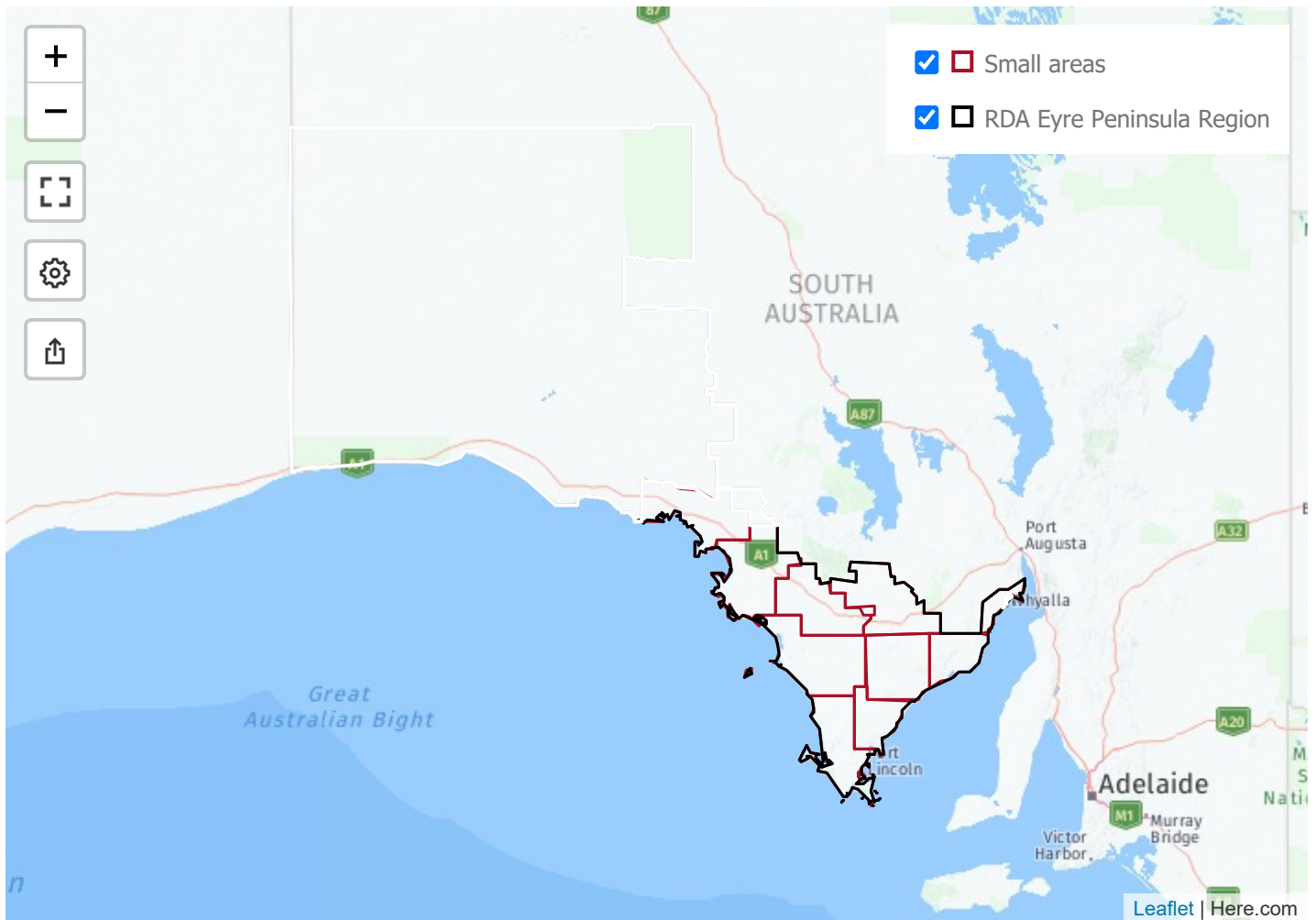

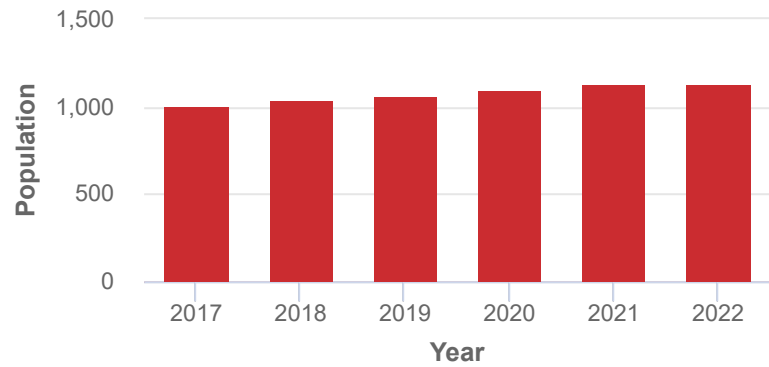

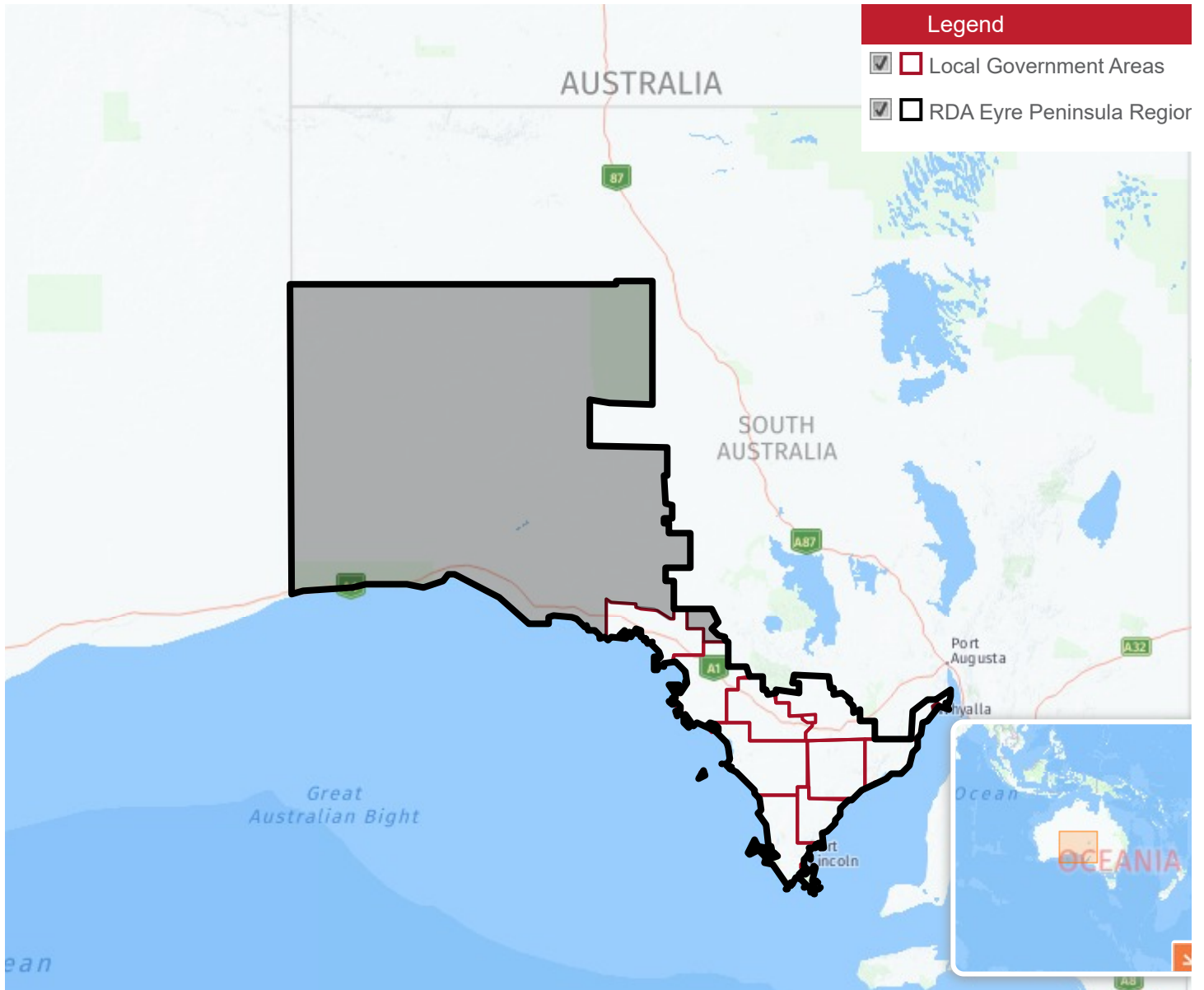

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Population and dwellings

The Census usual resident population of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 was 1,092, living in 660 dwellings with an average household size of 2.36.

There are a number of different ways of measuring the population of an area, all of which give an insight into the size of the place and its rate of growth over different time periods. The Census counts people where they are on the night of the Census (Enumerated population) and also by where they usually live (Usual residence). Both these populations are useful and form the basis for a range of characteristics collected in the Census.

However, the most accurate count of the total population is Estimated Resident Population, which factors in an estimate of those missed in the Census and those who were overseas on Census night. It is usually higher than either Census count, and is also updated annually after the Census, providing preliminary estimates for up to 5 years.

This page provides the three population counts for Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) at the last Census, with comparisons to previous Census years for the Census counts only. The current estimate for Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) at the most recent year available is shown at the top of the page. This figure is a preliminary estimate only and is subject to review after the next Census data are released. Please use with caution.

Also included are a range of sub-population groups and key statistics from the Census (Usual resident) population, such as citizens, employed persons and Indigenous population.

These figures all provide the context for the size of the population and growth rate within Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and should be looked at in conjunction with other basic demographic information, such as Age Structure, Dwelling Type and Household Size.

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Estimated Resident Population (ERP)

The population estimate for Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) as of the 30th June 2022 is 1,132. Since the previous year, the population has remained stable, with a change of 0.00%. Population growth in Regional SA was 0.56%.

The Estimated Resident Population (ERP) is the Australian Bureau of Statistics' official 2022 population figure for all Local Government Areas (LGAs) - but is subject to review after the next Census release. For areas smaller than LGAs, the ERP is derived from SA1 geographies based on population distribution from the previous Census. As such, these smaller geographies are subject to a greater level of revision each Census due to the change in actual numbers and in population distributions.

Populations are counted and estimated in various ways. The most comprehensive population count available in Australia is derived from the Census of Population and Housing conducted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics every five years. However the Census count is generally an under-estimate of the actual population, due to people missed in the Census and people overseas on Census night. To provide a more accurate population figure more frequently, the ABS also produces ERP numbers.

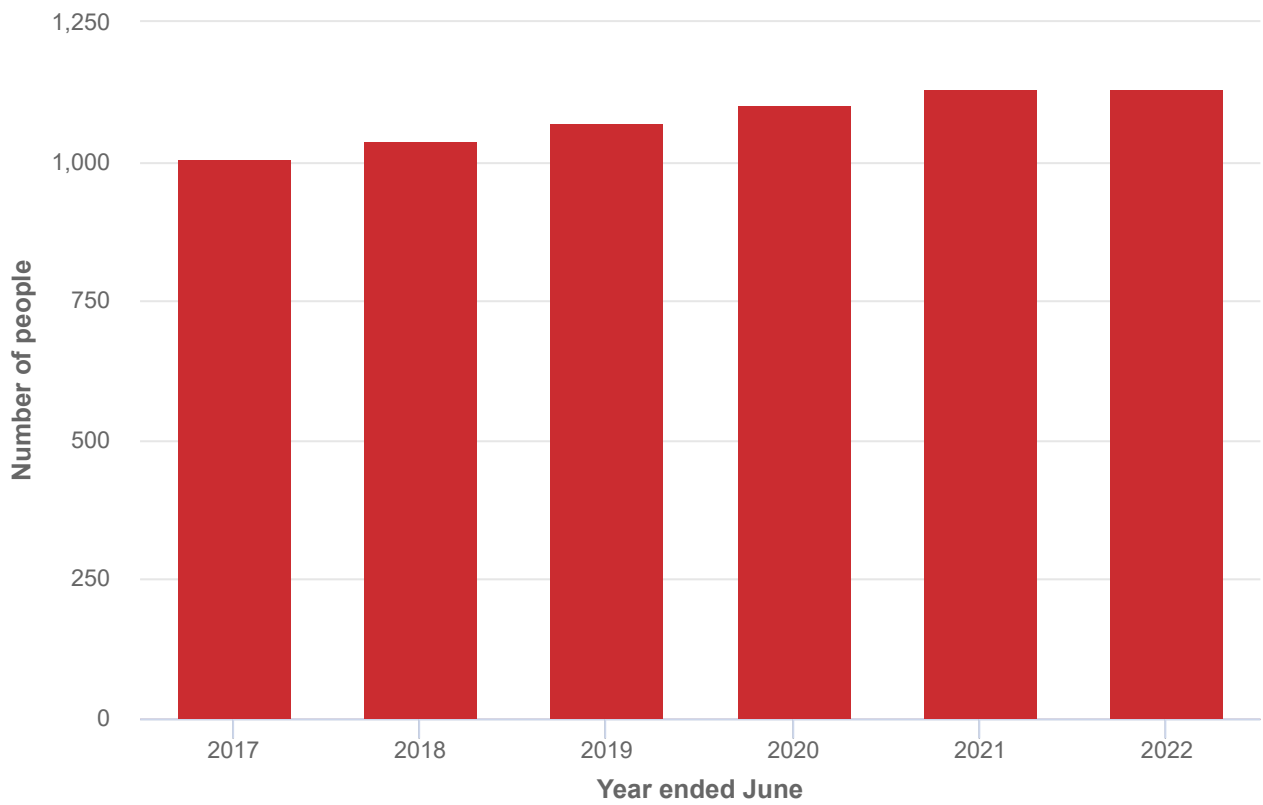

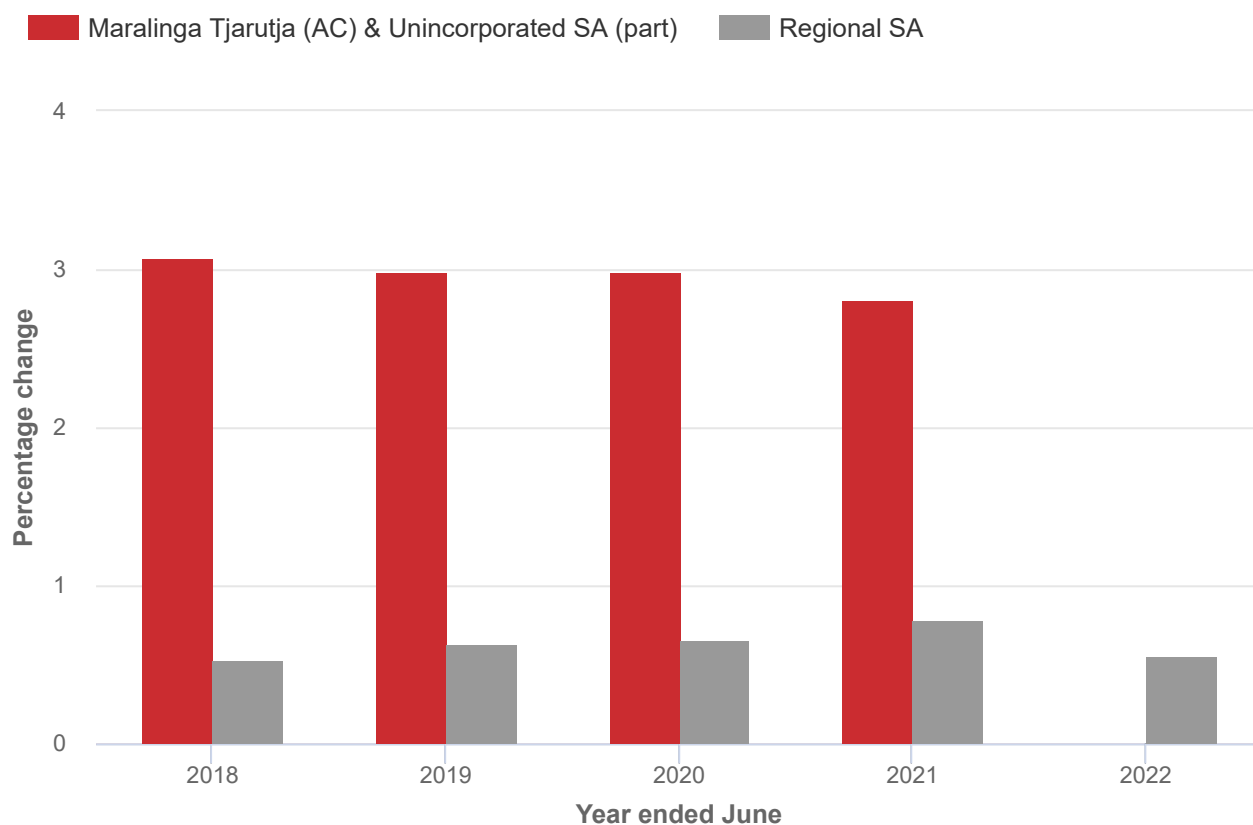

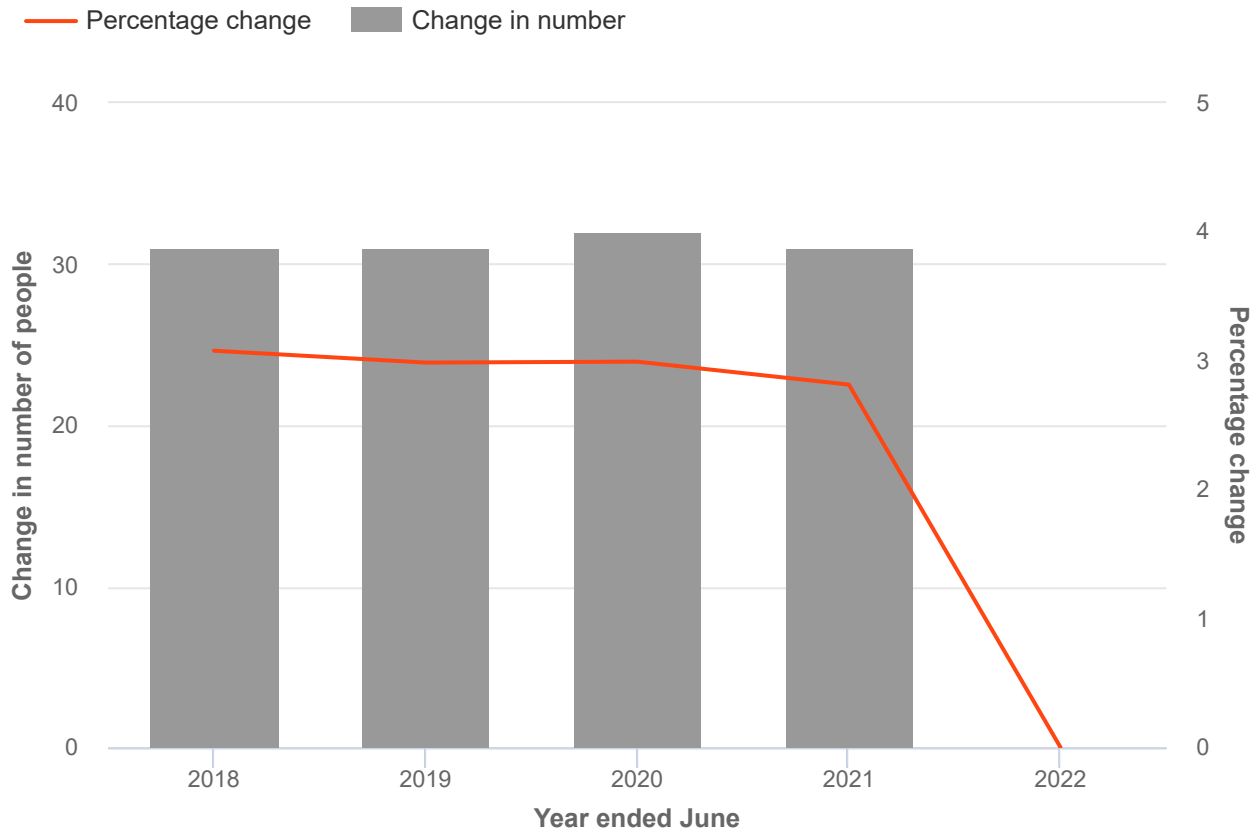
## Percentage change in ERP - Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) compared to Regional SA

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Service age groups

In 2021, Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) had higher proportion of children (under 18) and a lower proportion of persons aged 60 or older than Regional SA.

The Age Structure of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) provides key insights into the level of demand for age based services and facilities such as child care. It is an indicator of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s residential role and function and how it is likely to change in the future.

Service age groups divide the population into age categories that reflect typical life-stages. They indicate the level of demand for services that target people at different stages in life and how that demand is changing.

To get a more complete picture Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s Age Structure should be viewed in conjunction with Household Types and Dwelling Types.

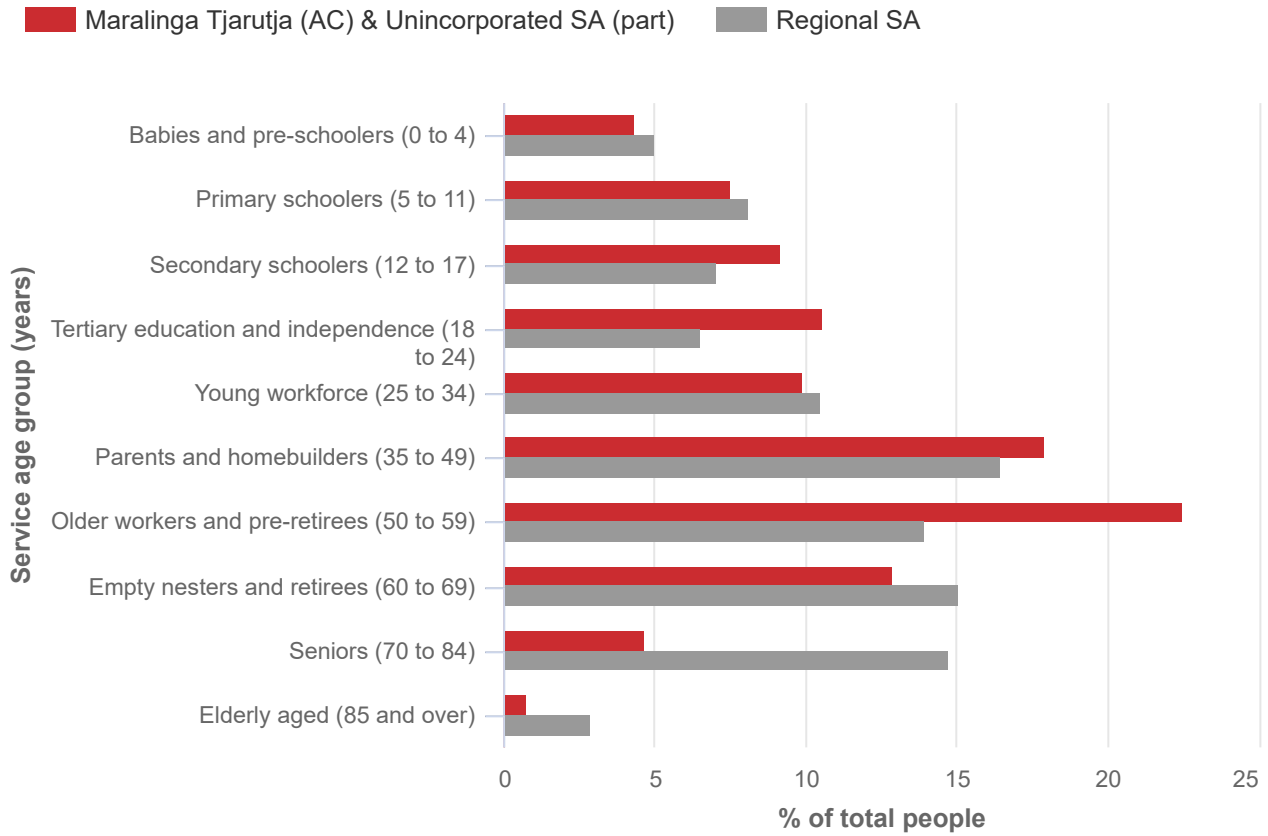

## Age structure - service age groups, 2021

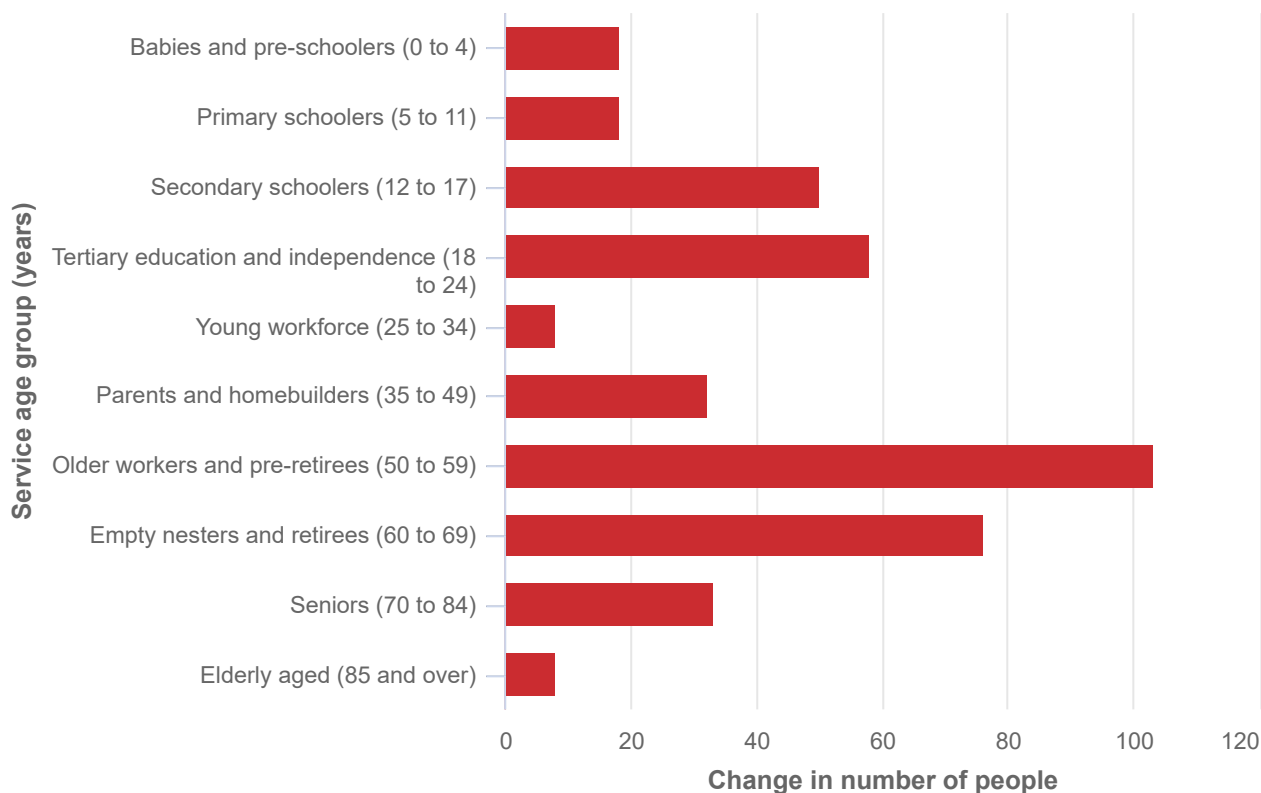

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the service age groups of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a higher proportion of people in the younger age groups (0 to 17 years) and a lower proportion of people in the older age groups (60+ years).

Overall, 20.9% of the population was aged between 0 and 17, and 18.3% were aged 60 years and over, compared with 20.0% and 32.6% respectively for Regional SA.

The major differences between the age structure of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of 'Older workers & pre-retirees' (22.5% compared to 13.9%)
- A *larger* percentage of 'Tertiary education & independence' (10.5% compared to 6.5%)
- A *smaller* percentage of 'Seniors' (4.7% compared to 14.7%)
- A *smaller* percentage of 'Empty nesters and retirees' (12.9% compared to 15.1%)

## Emerging groups

---

From 2016 to 2021, Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s population increased by 404 people (58.6%). This represents an average annual population change of 9.66% per year over the period.

The largest changes in the age structure in this area between 2016 and 2021 were in the age groups:

- Older workers and pre-retirees (50 to 59) (+103 people)
- Empty nesters and retirees (60 to 69) (+76 people)
- Tertiary education and independence (18 to 24) (+58 people)
- Secondary schoolers (12 to 17) (+50 people)

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Five year age groups

In 2021, the largest age group in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) was 50 to 54 year olds. The group that changed the most since 2016 was 50 to 54 year olds, increasing by 65 people.

The Age Structure of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) provides key insights into the level of demand for age based services and facilities such as child care. It is also an indicator of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s residential role and function and how it is likely to change in the future.

Five year age groups present a classic age profile of the population. Each age group covers exactly five years, which enables direct comparison between each group.

To get a more complete picture Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s Age Structure should be viewed in conjunction with Household Types and Dwelling Types.

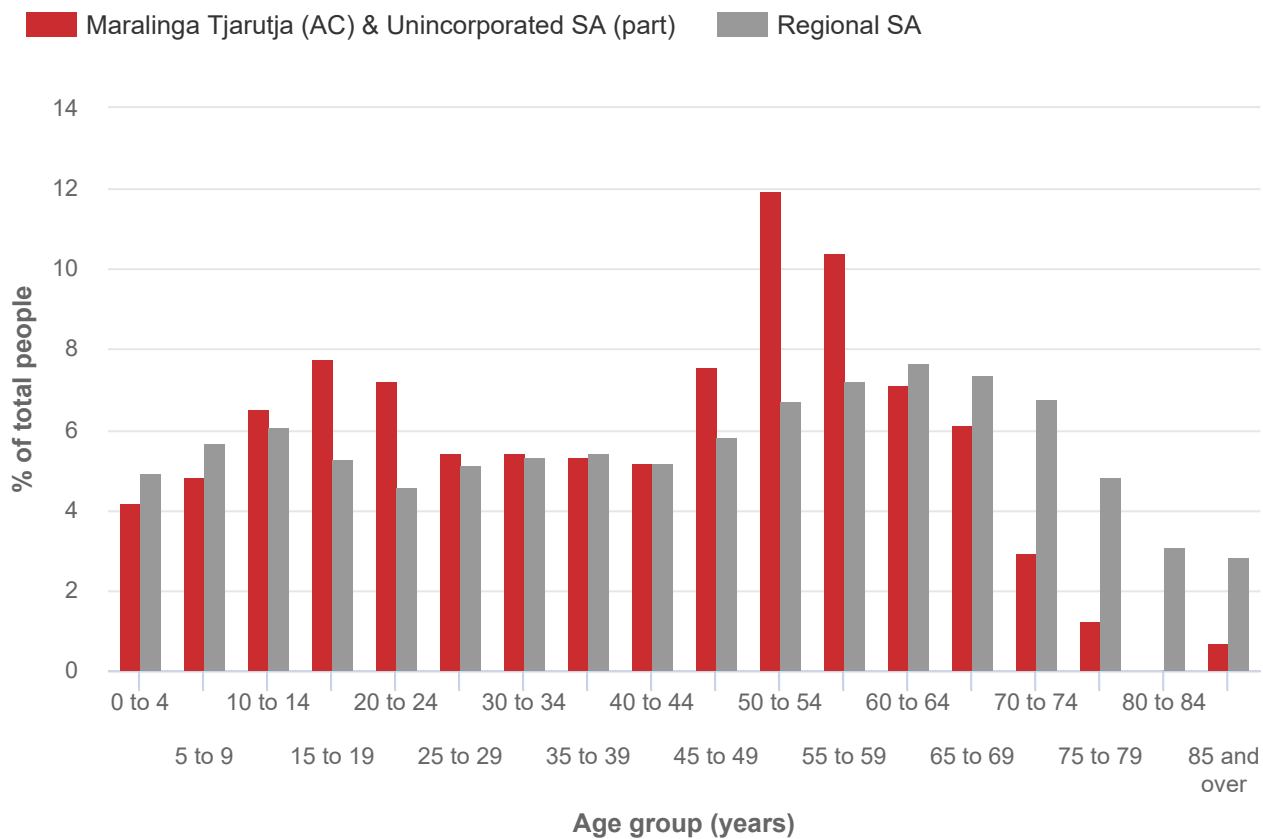

## Age structure - five year age groups, 2021

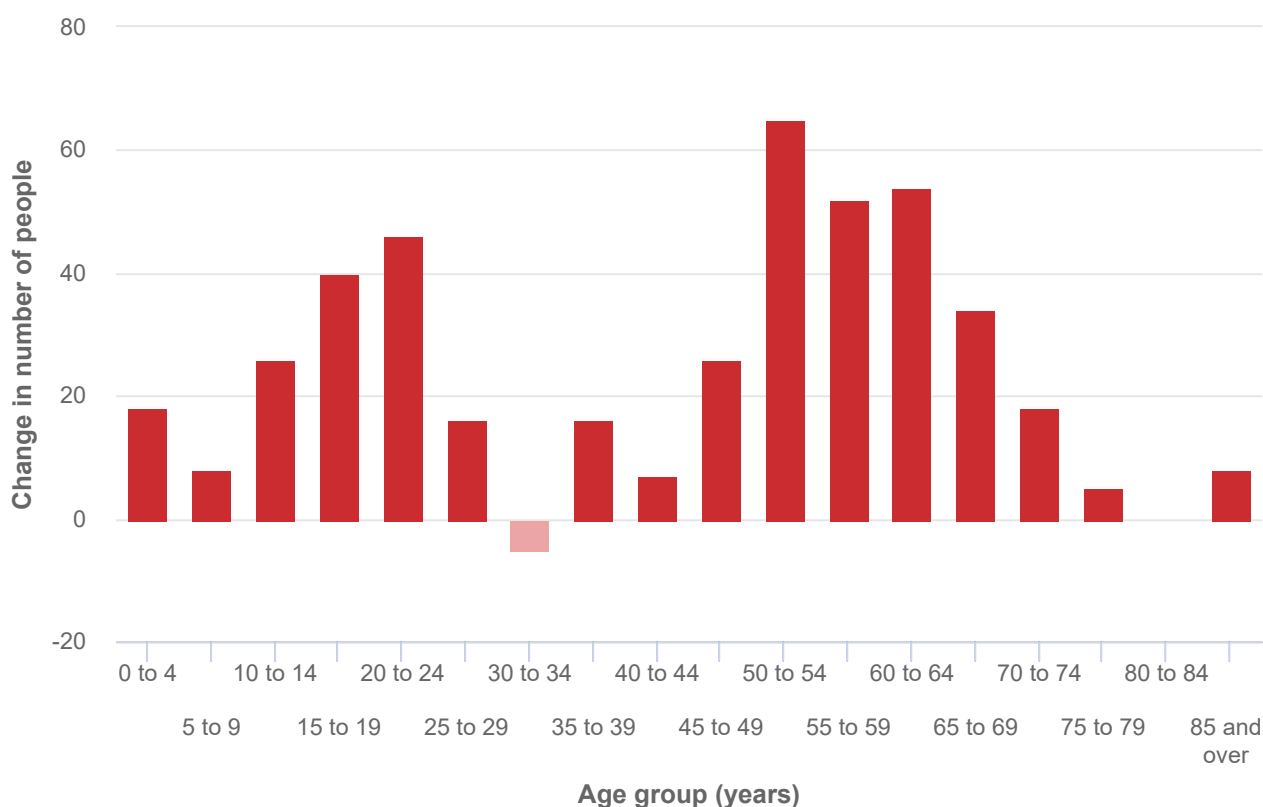

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the five year age groups of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of people in the younger age groups (under 15) as well as a lower proportion of people in the older age groups (65+).

Overall, 15.5% of the population was aged between 0 and 15, and 11.1% were aged 65 years and over, compared with 16.7% and 24.9% respectively for Regional SA.

The major differences between the age structure of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons aged 50 to 54 (11.9% compared to 6.7%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons aged 55 to 59 (10.4% compared to 7.2%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons aged 70 to 74 (2.9% compared to 6.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons aged 75 to 79 (1.2% compared to 4.8%)

## Emerging groups

From 2016 to 2021, Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s population increased by 434 people (63.1%). This represents an average annual population change of 10.28% per year over the period.

The largest changes in age structure in this area between 2016 and 2021 were in the age groups:

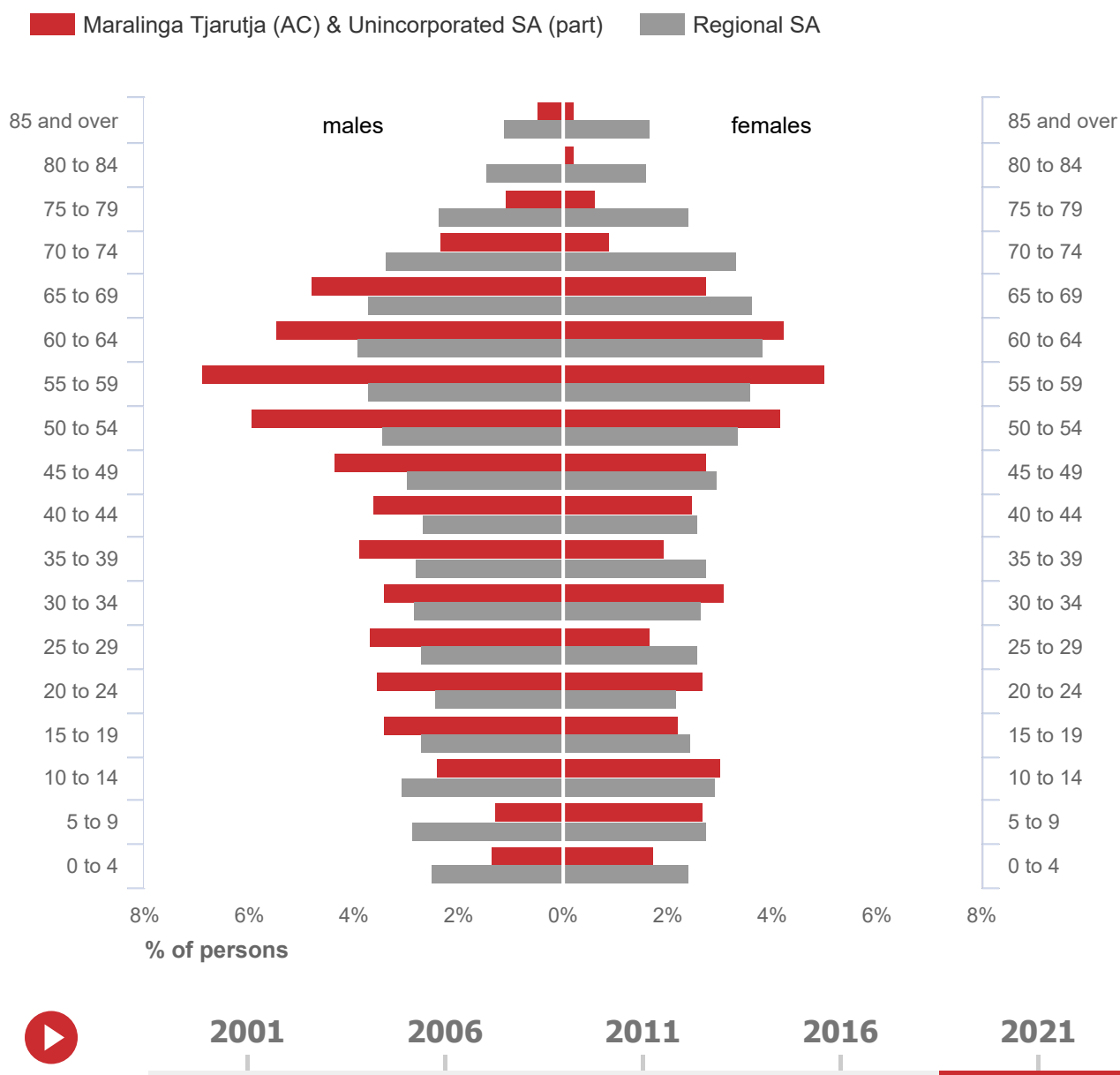
- 50 to 54 (+65 persons)
- 60 to 64 (+54 persons)
- 55 to 59 (+52 persons)

The age-sex pyramid is a demographic tool which shows patterns of change in the age structure and sex ratio of an area over time. Its name comes from the traditional pyramid shape of an area which indicates a lot of children in large families, with a lower life expectancy and relatively few elderly. This shape is quite rare in developed nations like Australia. As nations and areas transition over time this shape turns into a column where there are less children a mix of ages including many elderly. Older areas with a lot of retirees or relatively few births may have a "reverse" pyramid formation where the largest proportion of the population is at the top of the chart. The sex ratio of males to females can also be seen - young areas are likely to have more males, while elderly areas generally have more females due to longer life expectancy.

The age-sex pyramid should be used in conjunction with Household Types and Dwelling Types information to build up a picture of who is living in the area and how it is changing over time.

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Ancestry

The three largest ancestries in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 were Australian Aboriginal, Australian and English.

Ancestry defines the cultural association and ethnic background of an individual going back three generations. Ancestry is a good measure of the total size of cultural groups in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) regardless of where they were born or what language they speak.

Ancestry data, should be combined with data on Birthplace, Language Spoken at Home and Religion for a more complete picture of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s ethnic characteristics.

Please note that the "Australian Aboriginal" and "Torres Strait Islander" categories in this topic are not directly comparable from 2021 to previous years, due to a change in the wording of the question. In 2021, these options were marked boxes on the question rather than write-in options. 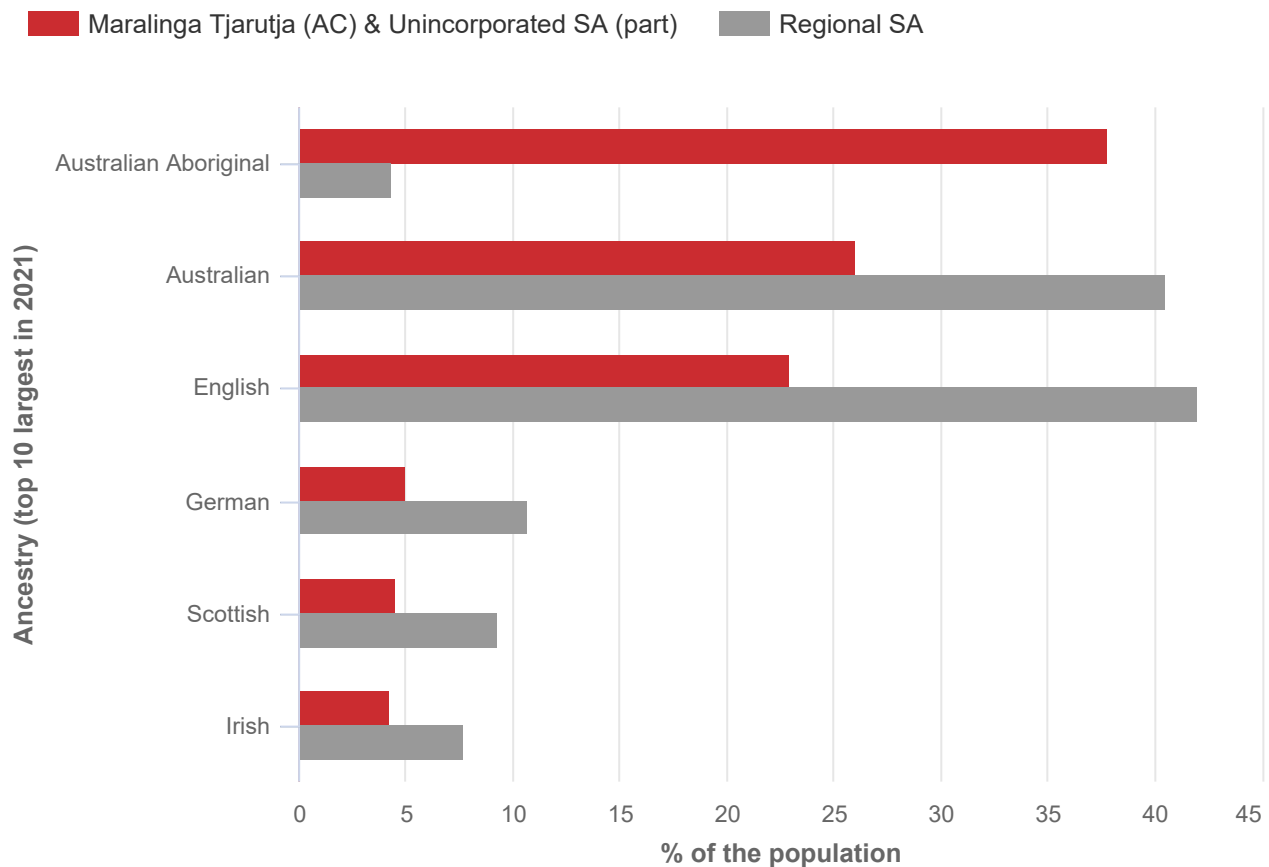

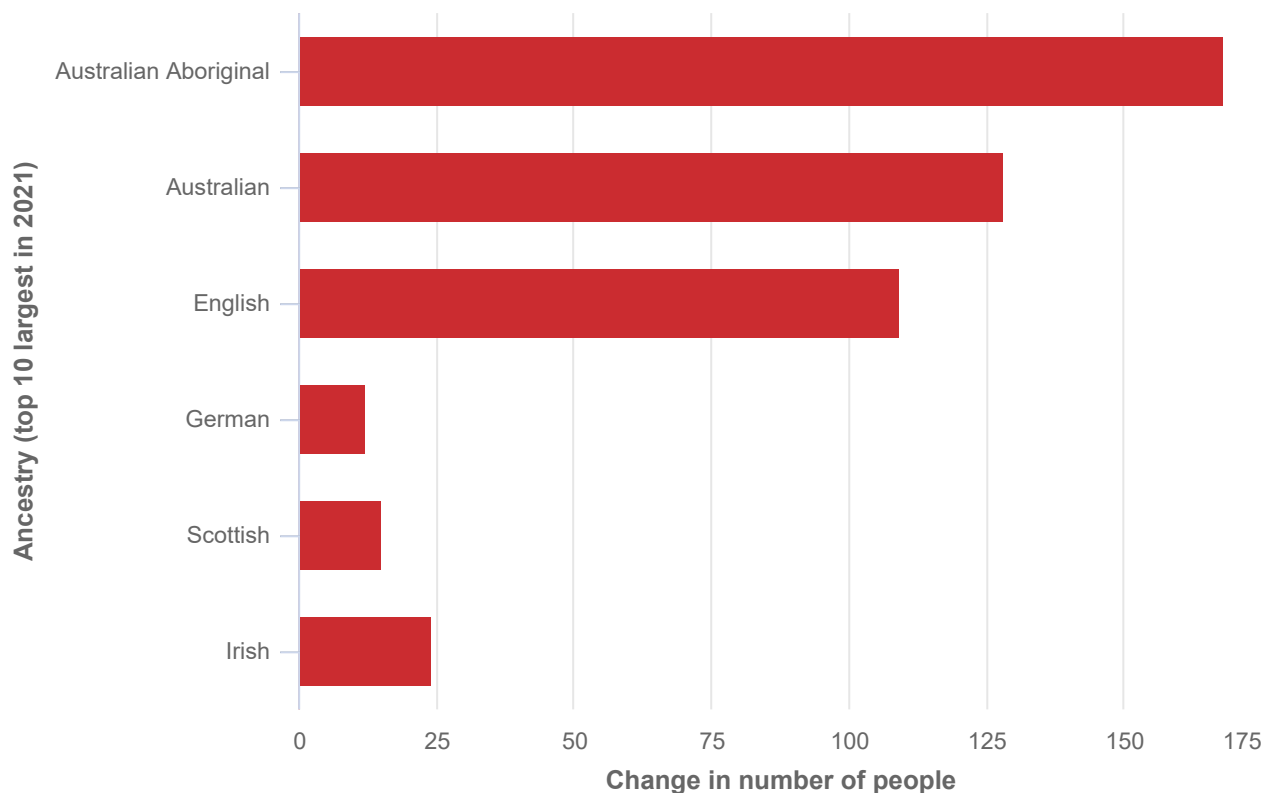
## Ancestry, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the ancestry responses of the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 shows that the top five ancestries nominated were:

- Australian Aboriginal (413 people or 37.8%)

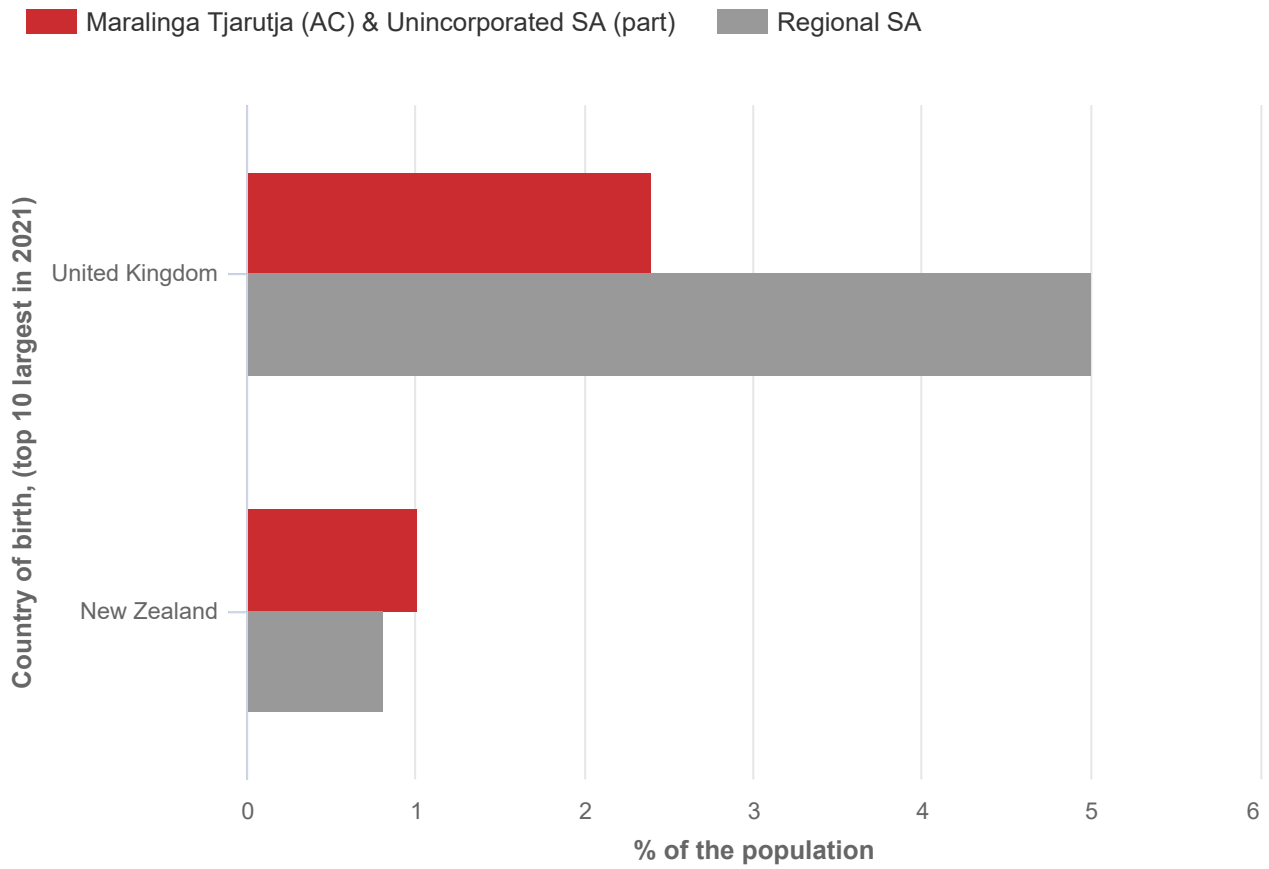

## Birthplace, 2021

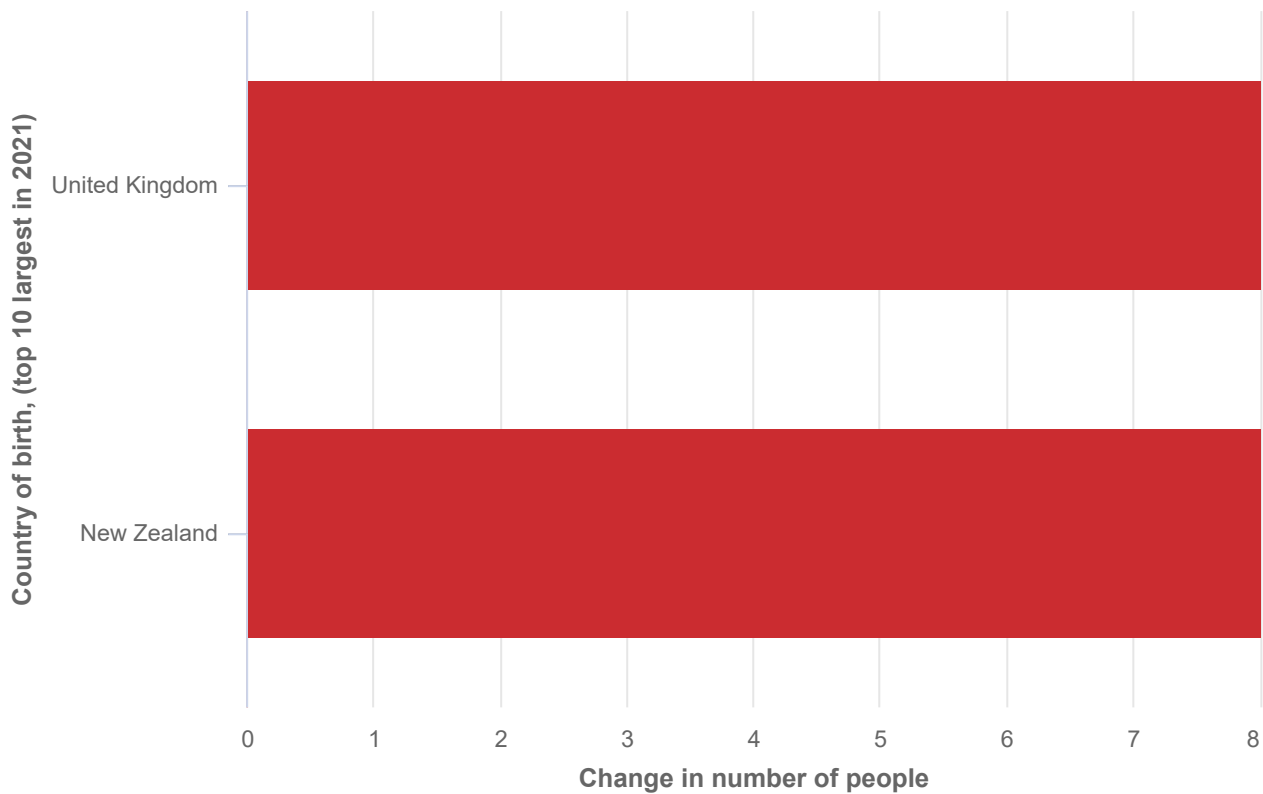

The number of recent overseas arrivals in an area is often determined by housing affordability, employment opportunities and pre-existing communities located in the area.

Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s Year of Arrival data, when used with Birthplace, Religion and Language Spoken at Home data, is a good indicator of the likely need for services in migrant communities.

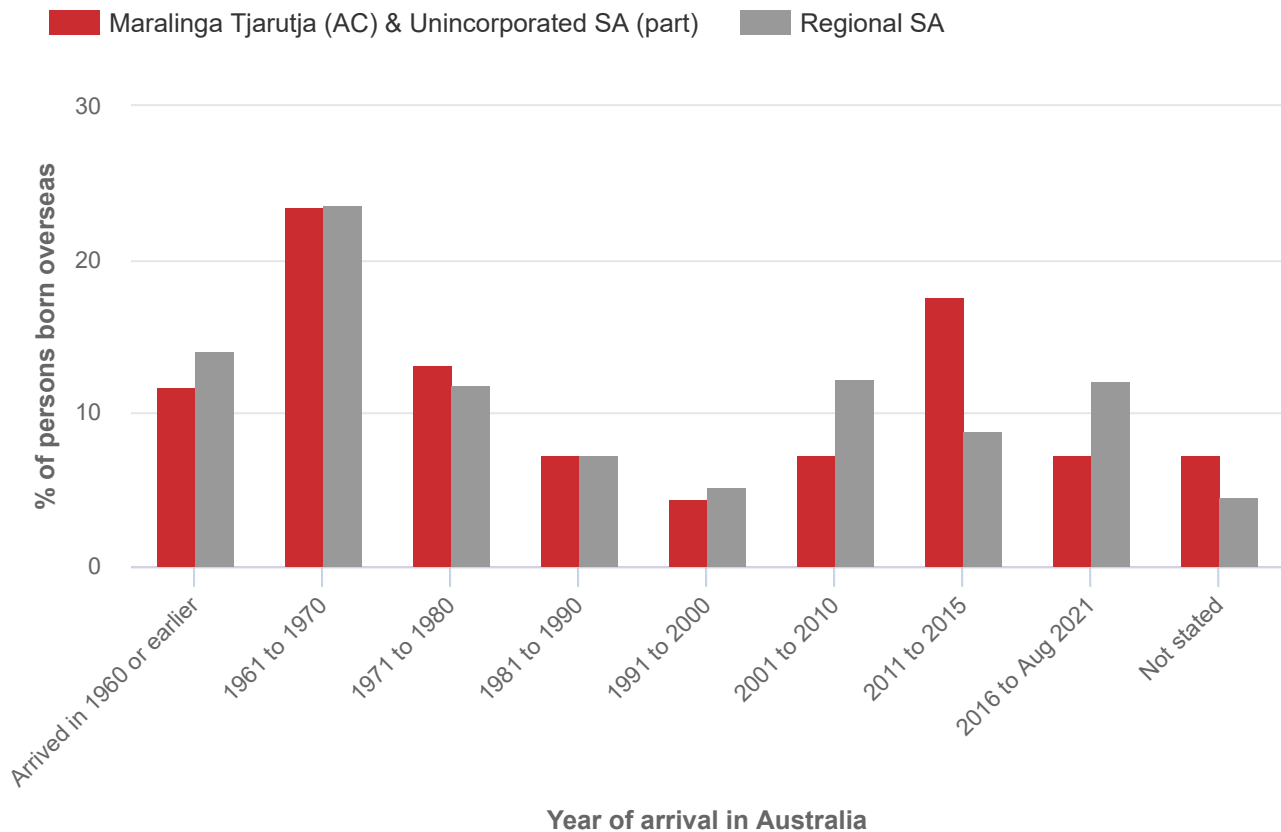

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the year of arrival for the overseas born population of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a smaller proportion of people who arrived before 2001, as well as a smaller proportion of recent overseas arrivals (those who arrived between 2016 to Aug 2021).

Overall, 60.3% of the overseas born population arrived before 2001, and 7% arrived during or after 2016, compared with 62.0% and 12.2% respectively for Regional SA.

Proficiency in English measures the self-assessed proficiency in spoken English of people who speak a language other than English at home. The data, when viewed with other ethnic and cultural indicators, such as **Ancestry**, **Country of Birth**, **Language Spoken at Home** and **Religion**, reflects Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s ethnic composition and how long the overseas born have been in Australia. This helps service providers determine whether they need to communicate with the local population in languages other than English.

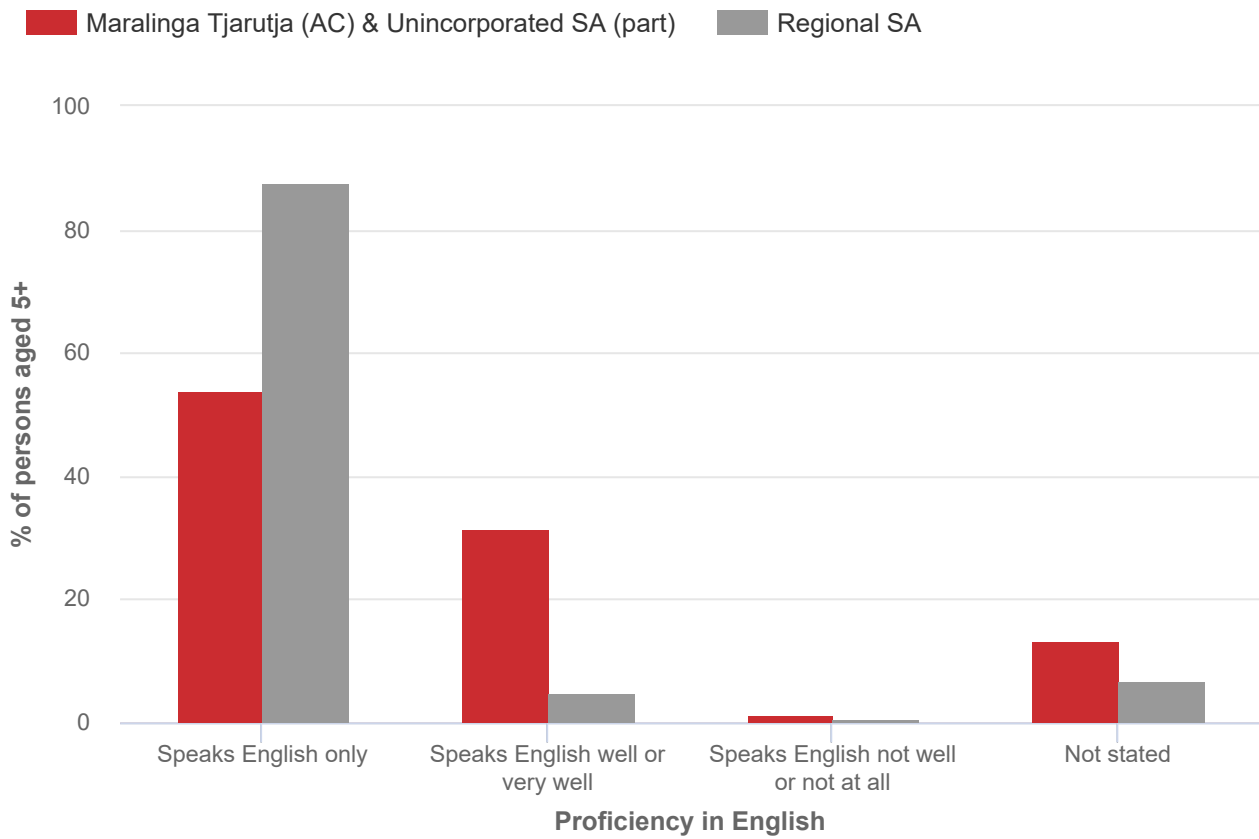

## Proficiency in English, 2021

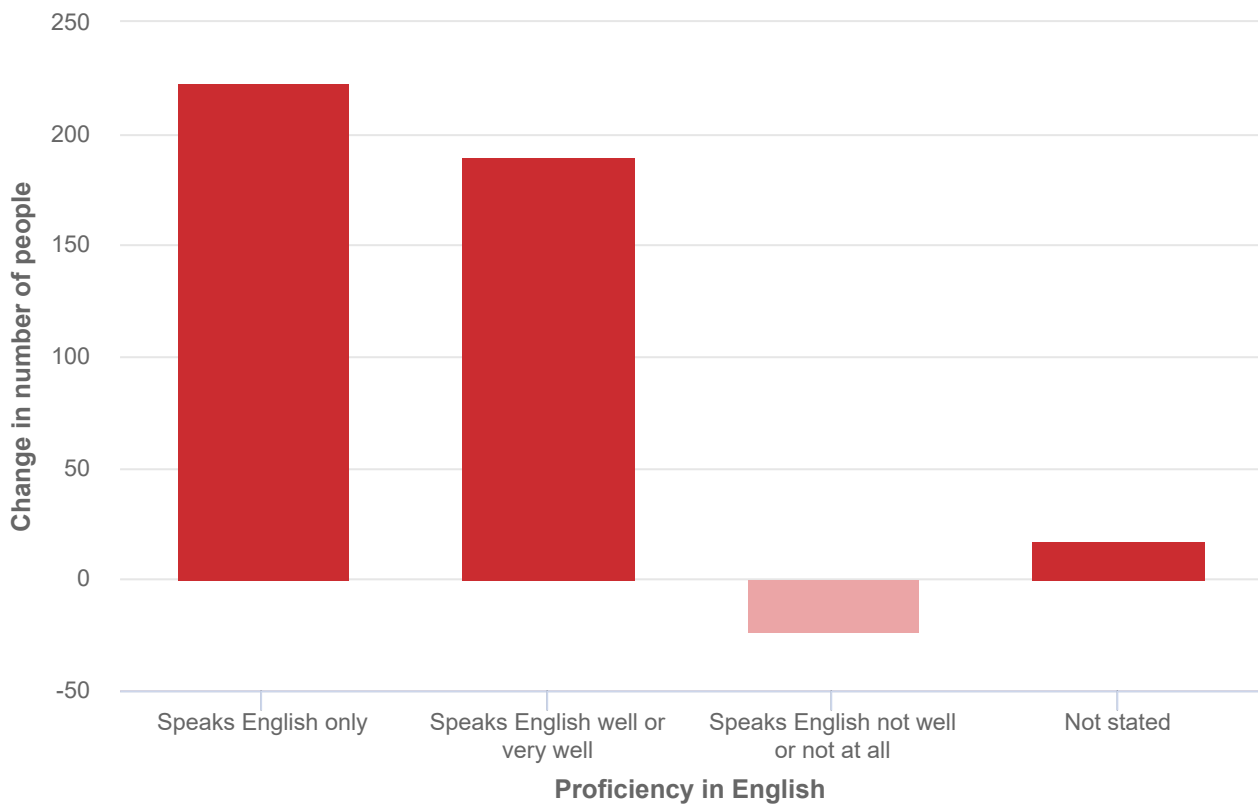

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the proficiency in English data of the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of people who spoke English only, and a higher proportion of people who spoke another language and English not well or not at all.

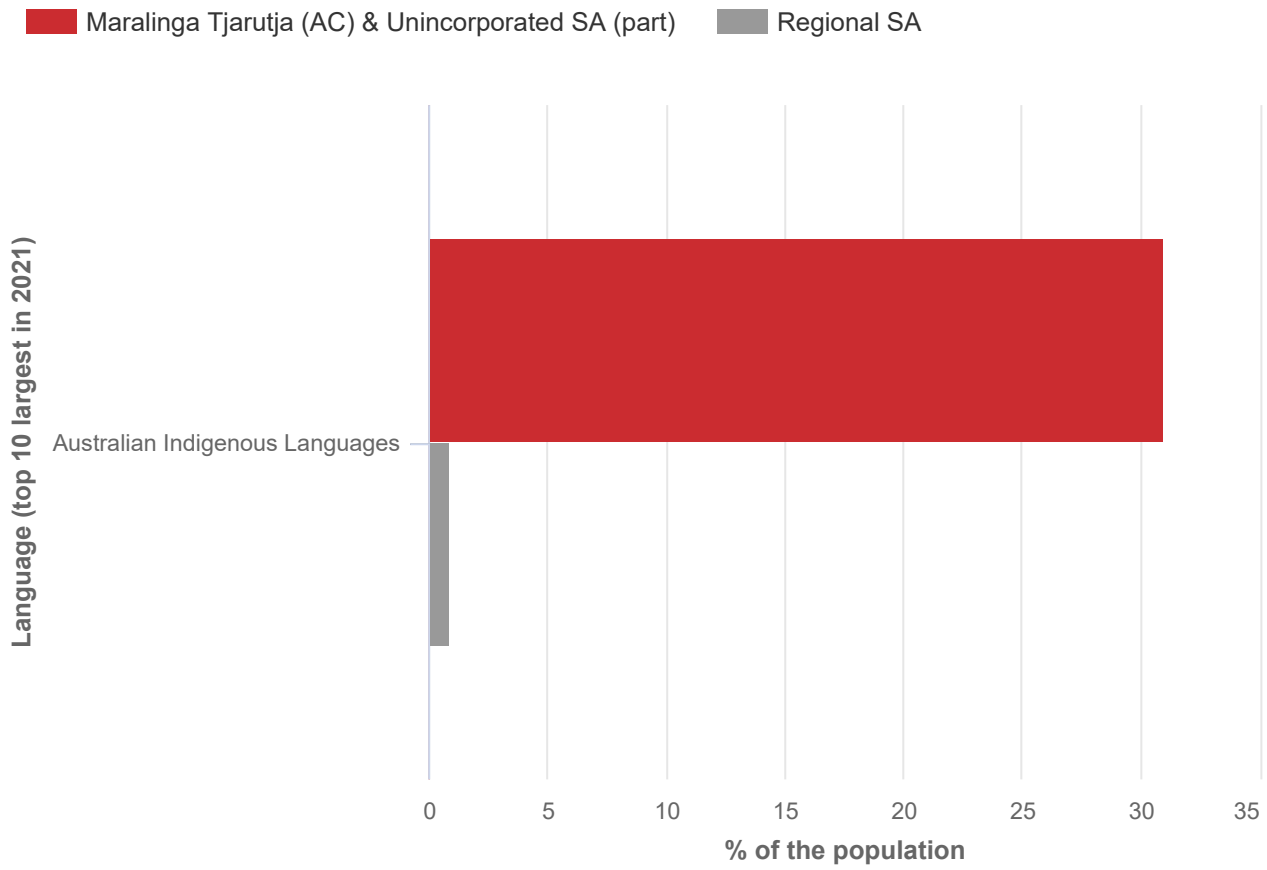

## Language used at home, 2021

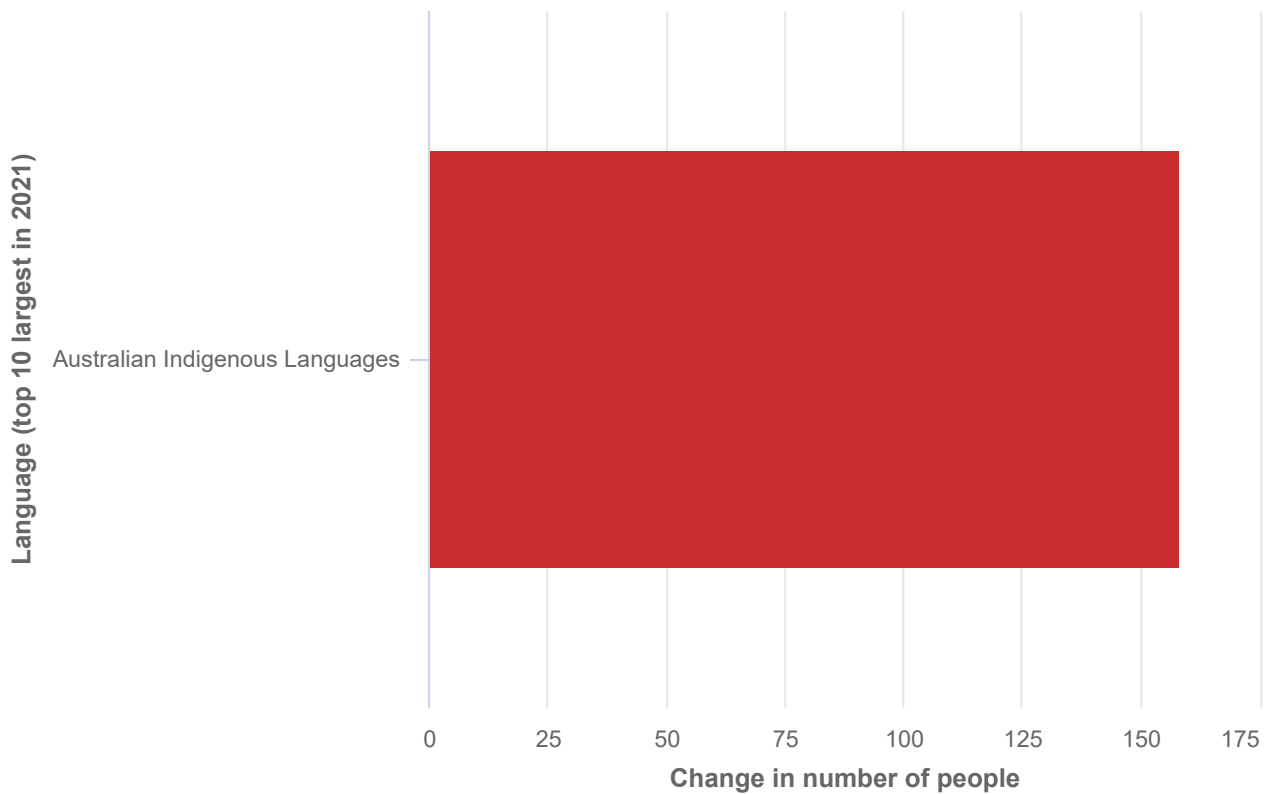

Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s religion statistics provide an indicator of cultural identity and ethnicity when observed in conjunction with other key variables. Religion data reveal the major concentrations of religions as well as revealing the proportion of people with no religious affiliation. There are a number of reasons for different religious compositions across areas including the country of birth and ethnic background of the population, the age of the population (belief in religion is generally stronger, the older the population) and changes in values and belief systems.

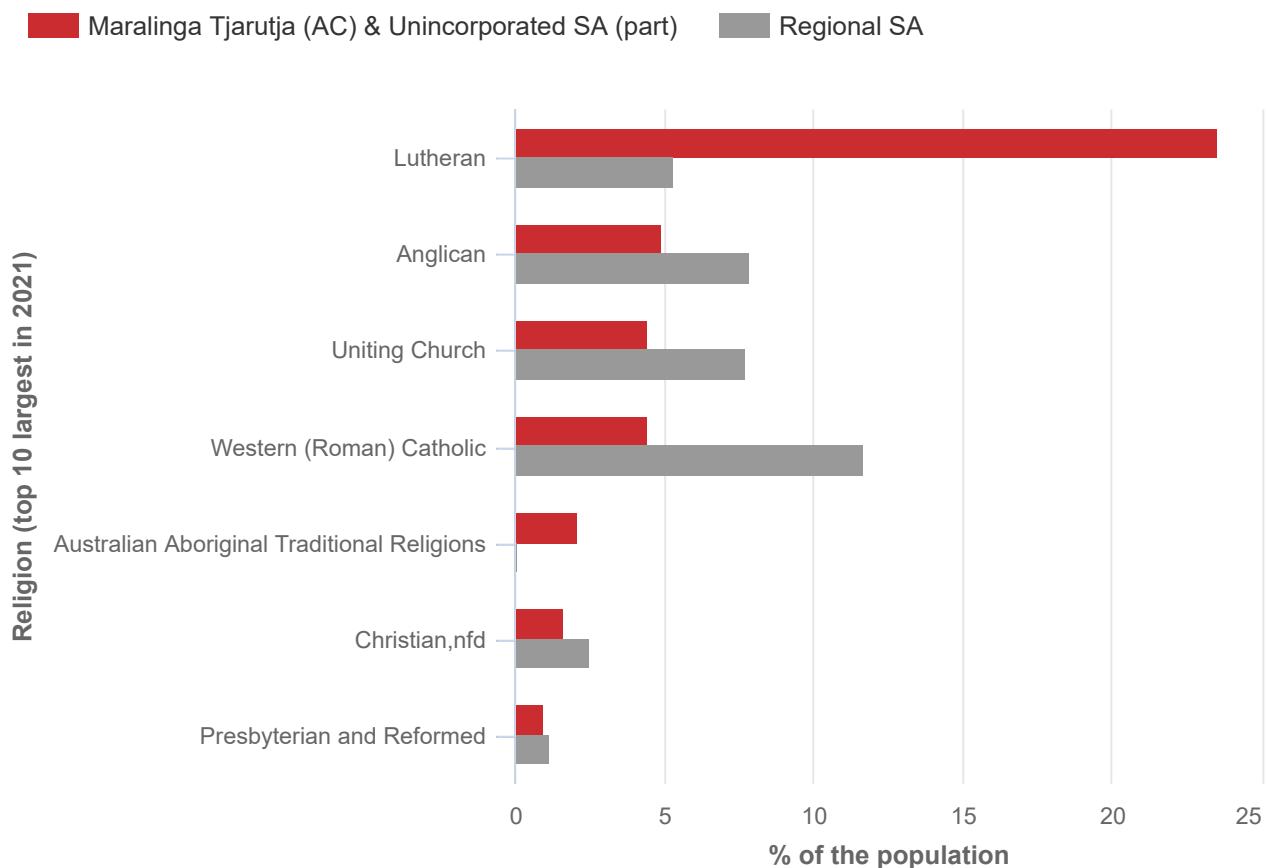

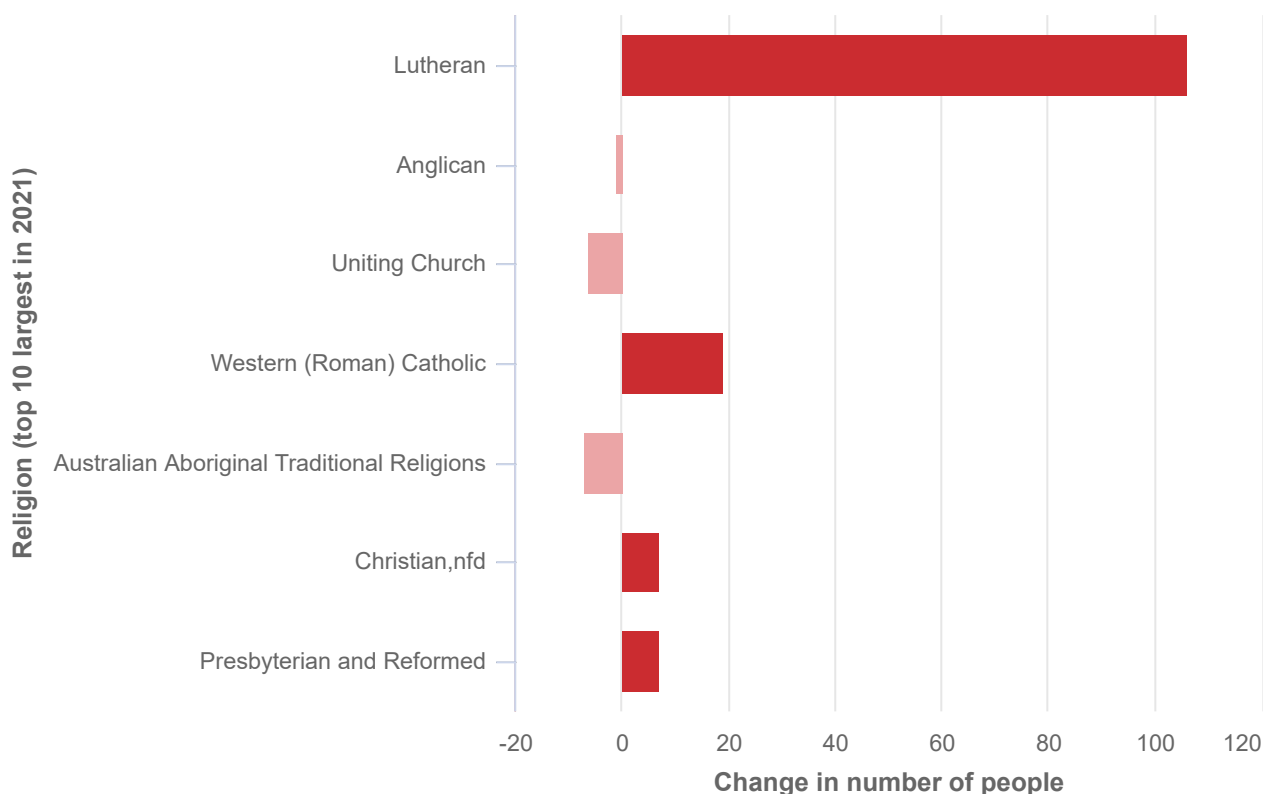
## Religion, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the religious affiliation of the population of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a similar proportion of people who professed a religion and a lower proportion who stated they had no religion.

Overall, 43.2% of the population nominated a religion, and 38.7% said they had no religion, compared with 42.9% and 47.8% respectively for Regional SA.

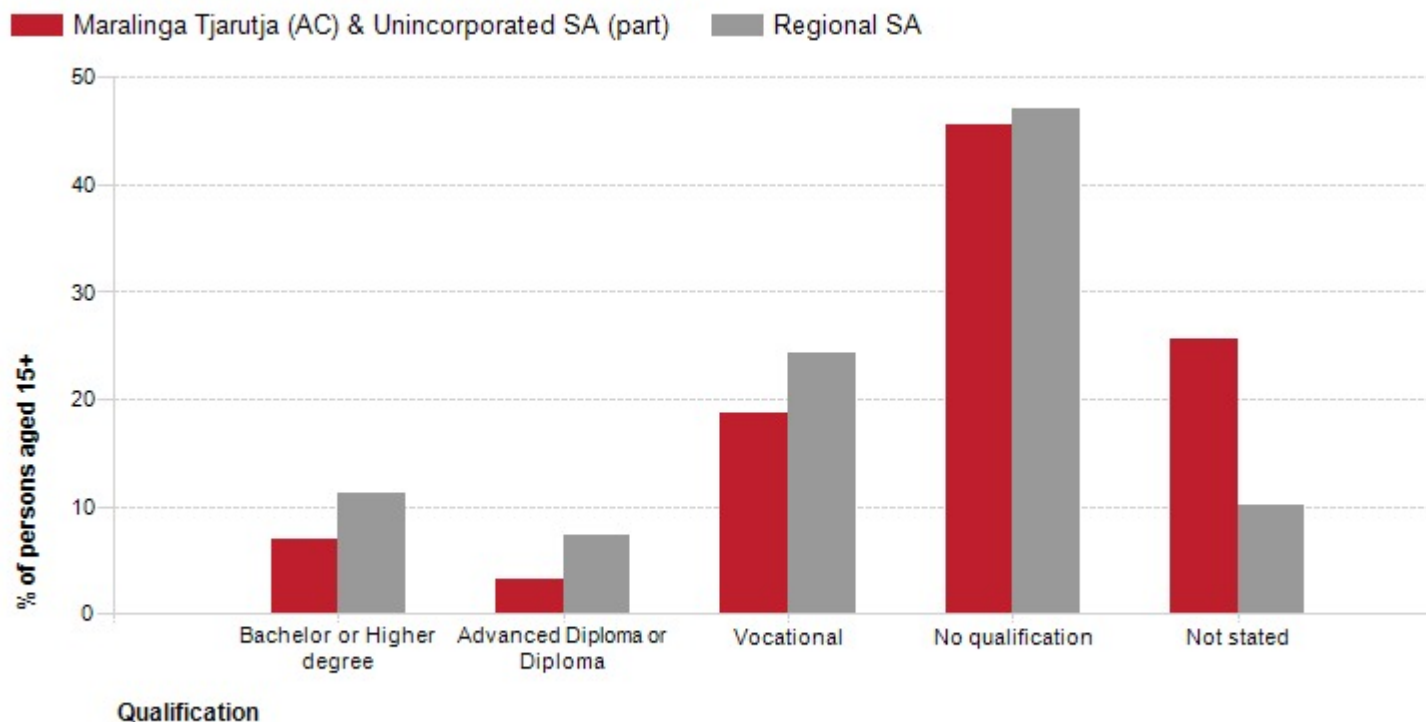

## Highest qualification achieved, 2021

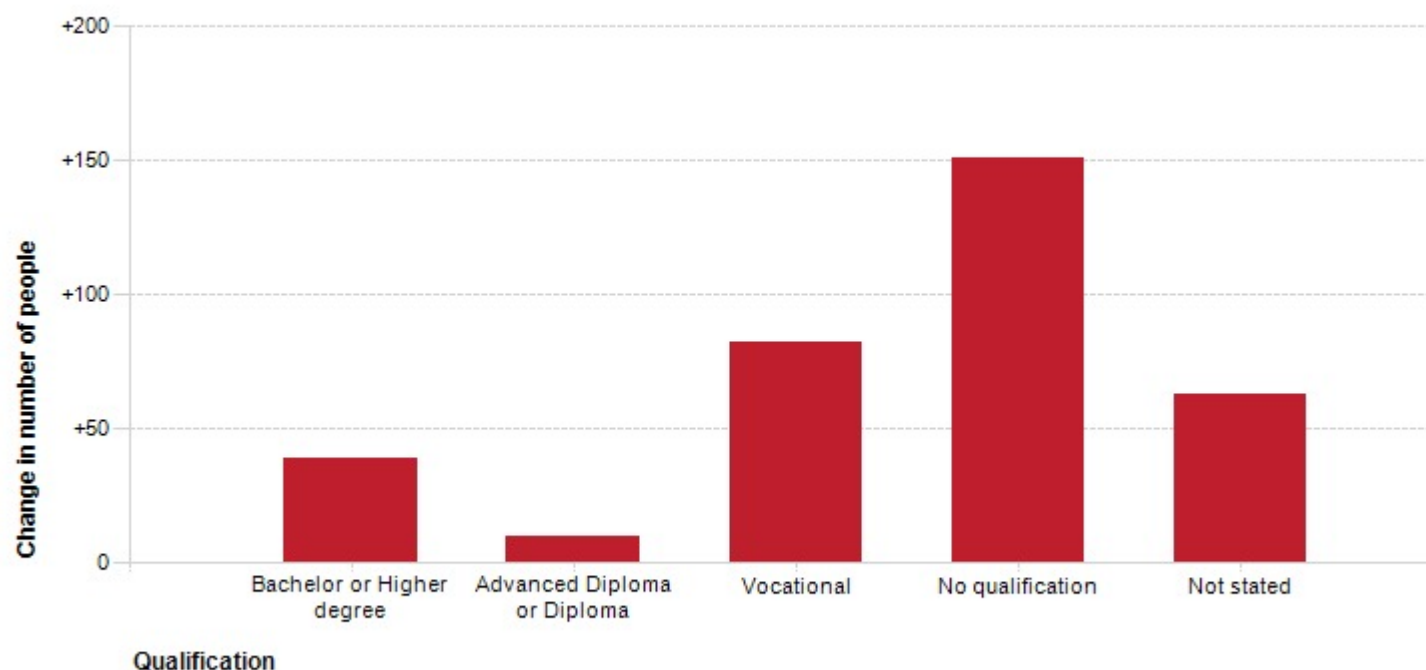

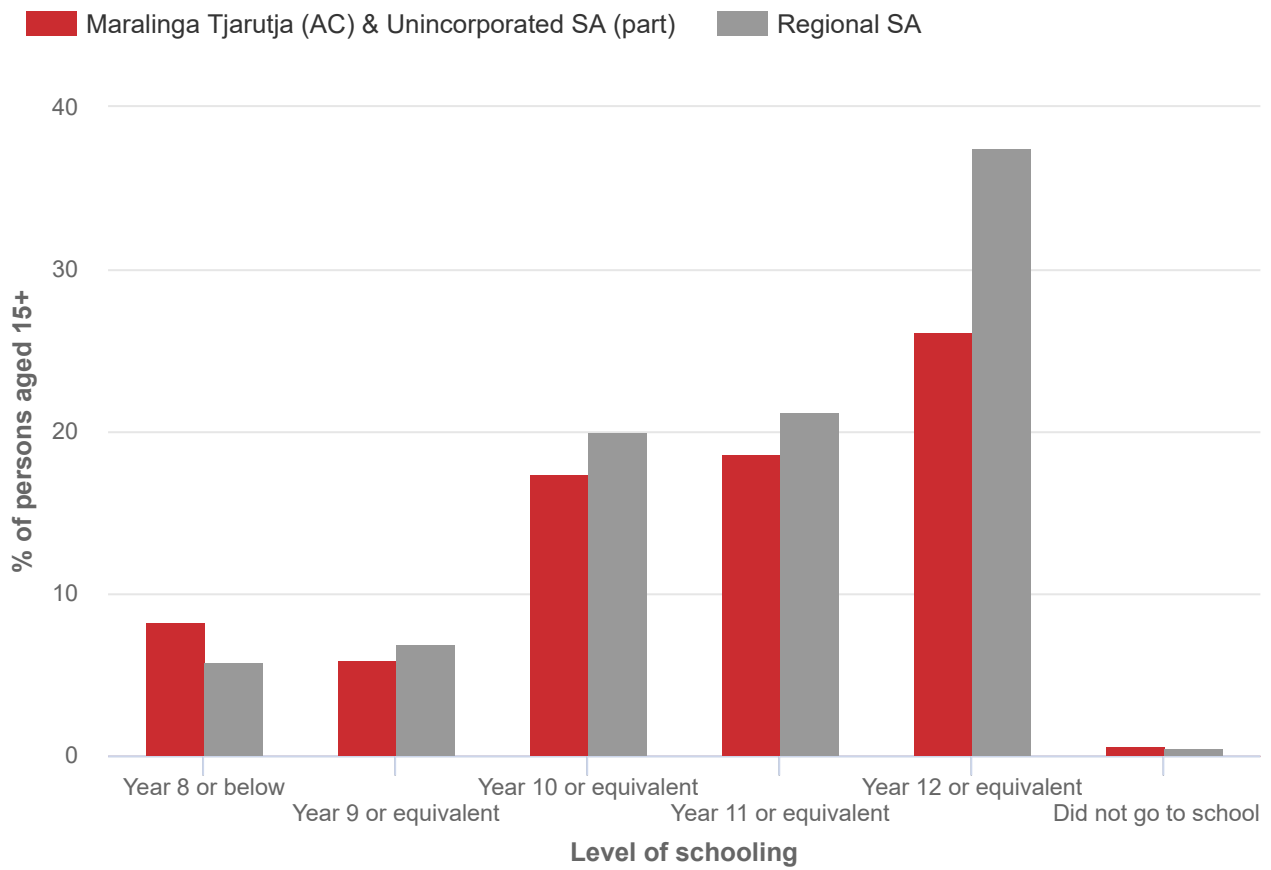

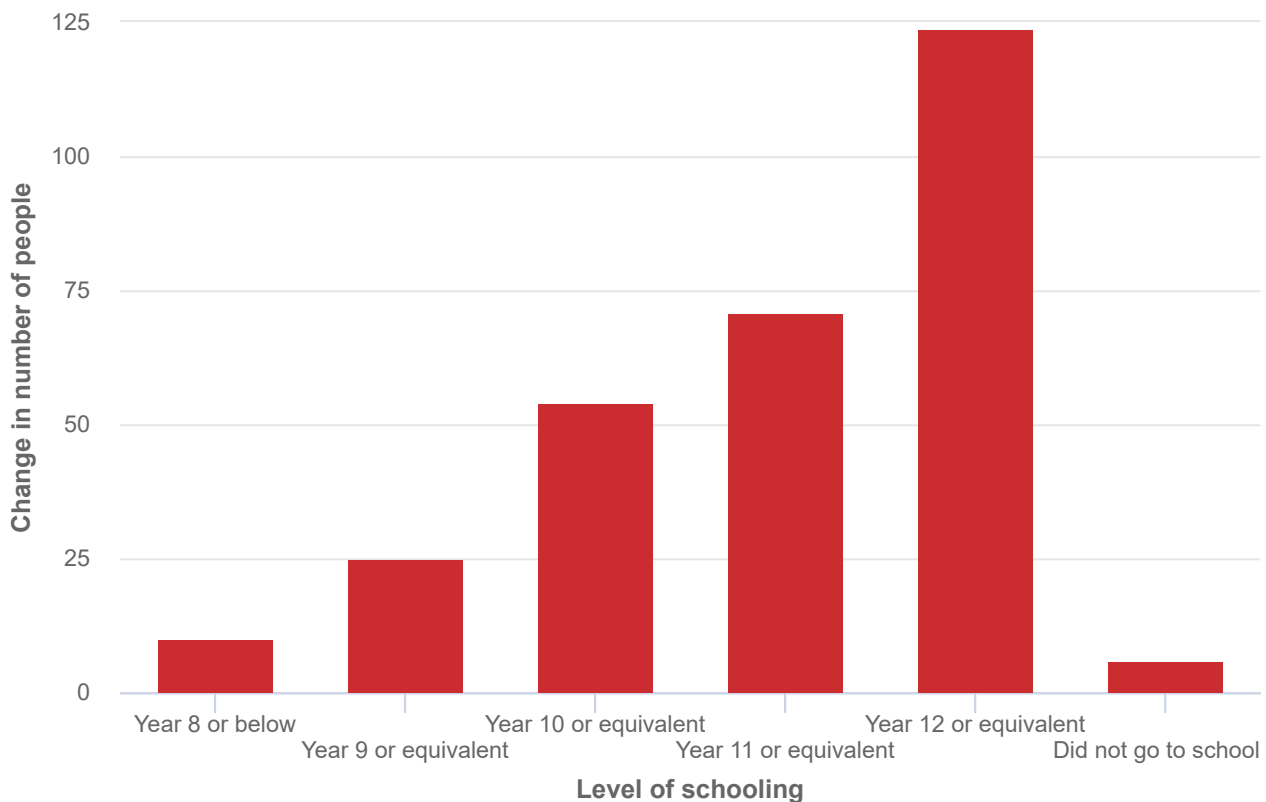
## Highest level of schooling completed, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the highest level of schooling attained by the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of people who had left school at an early level (Year 10 or less) as well as a lower proportion of people who completed Year 12 or equivalent.

Overall, 32.2% of the population left school at Year 10 or below, and 26.2% went on to complete Year 12 or equivalent, compared with 33.2% and 37.6% respectively for Regional SA.

The major differences between the level of schooling attained by the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons who completed year 8 or below (8.3% compared to 5.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who completed year 12 or equivalent (26.2% compared to 37.6%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who completed year 10 or equivalent (17.4% compared to 20.0%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who completed year 11 or equivalent (18.6% compared to 21.2%)

## Emerging groups

The largest changes in the level of schooling attained by the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Year 12 or equivalent (+124 persons)
- Year 11 or equivalent (+71 persons)

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Education institution attending

In 2021, 17 people in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) were attending university. This represents 1.6% of the population, compared to 1.5% in Regional SA.

The share of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s population attending educational institutions reflects the age structure of the population, as it is influenced by the number of children attending school; proximity to tertiary education, which can mean young adults leaving home to be nearer to educational facilities and; the degree to which people are seeking out educational opportunities in adulthood, especially in their late teens and early twenties.

This data is often combined with Age Structure to identify areas with significant university student populations.

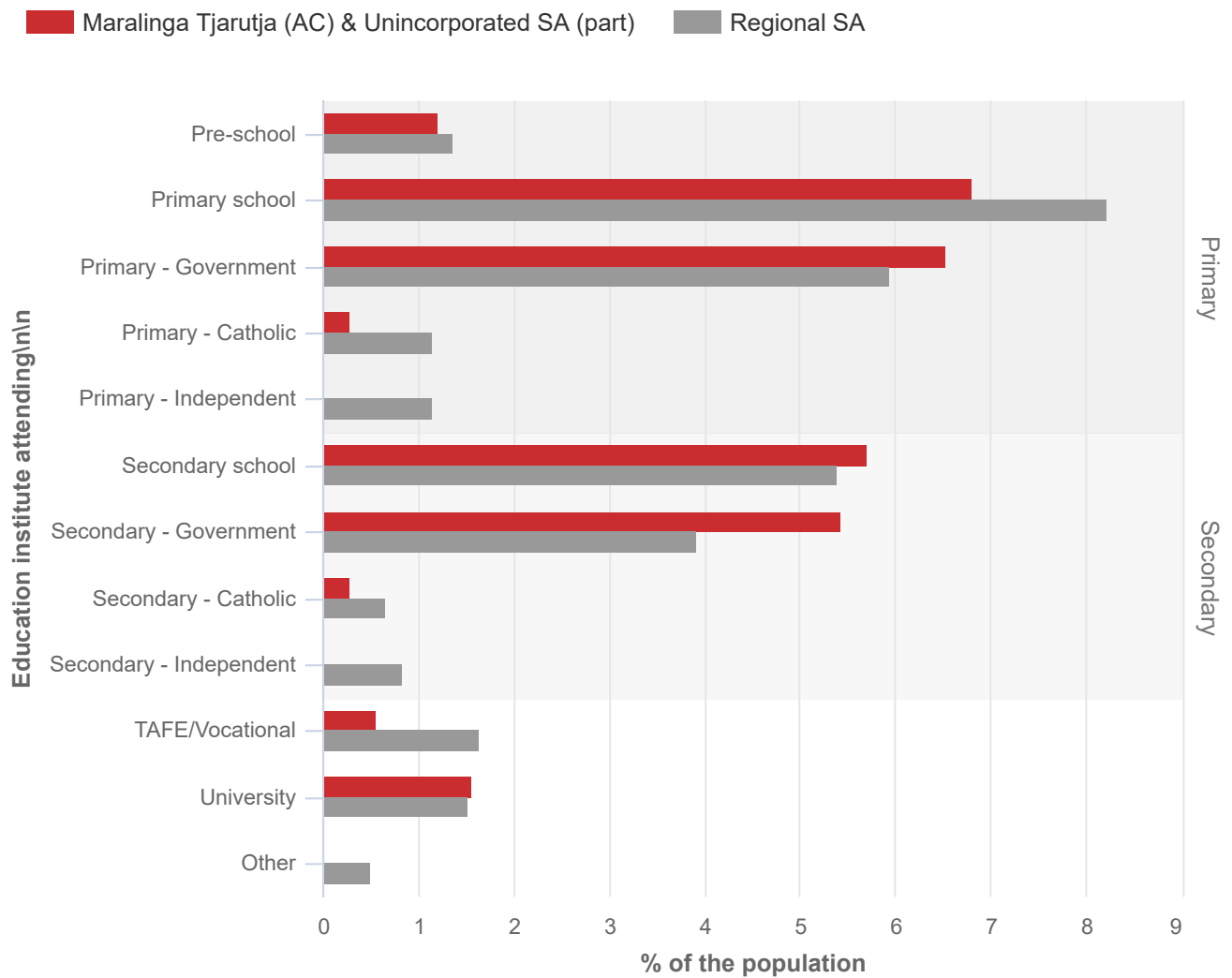

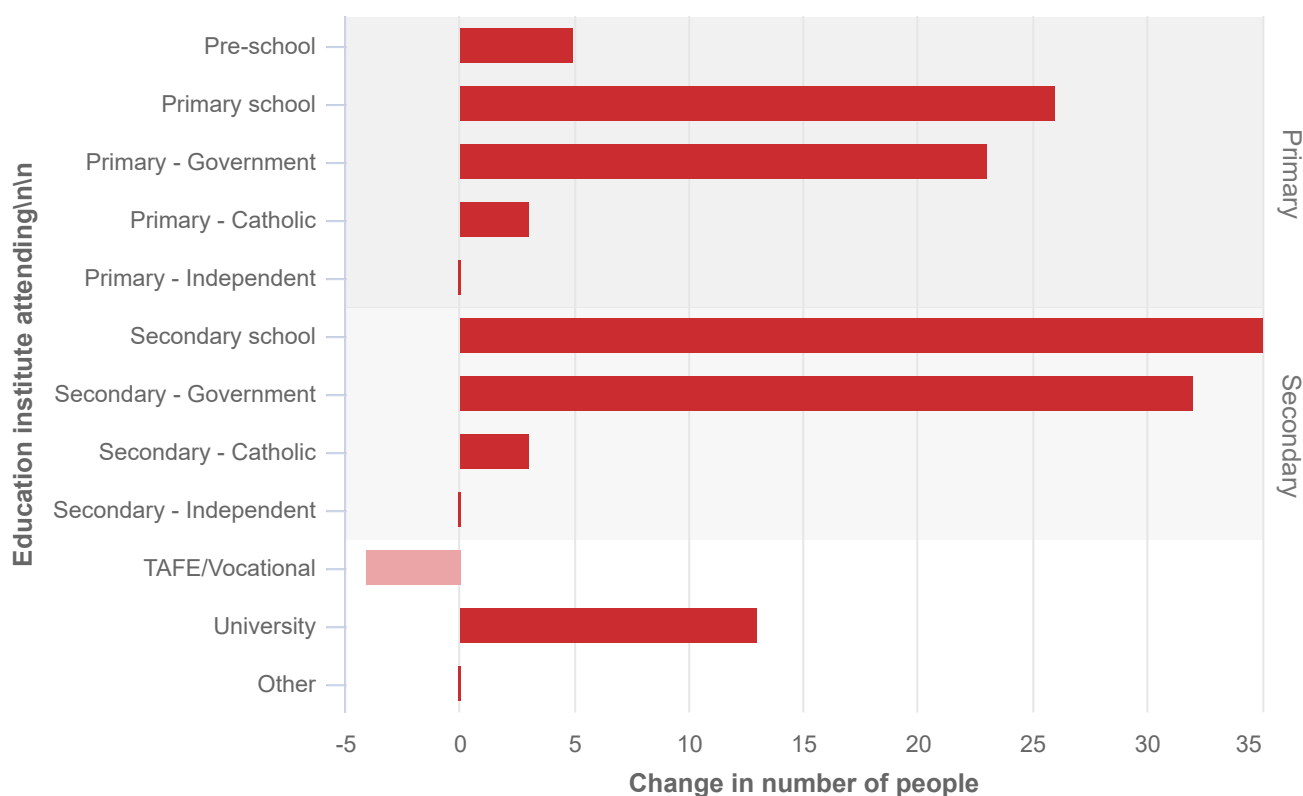
## Education institution attending, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the share of the population attending educational institutions in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion attending primary school, a similar proportion attending secondary school, and a lower proportion engaged in tertiary level education.

Overall, 6.8% of the population were attending primary school, 5.7% of the population were attending secondary institutions, and 2.1% were learning at a tertiary level, compared with 8.2%, 5.4% and 3.1% respectively for Regional SA.

The major differences between the share of the population attending learning institutions in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons attending a Government secondary school (5.4% compared to 3.9%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons not attending (68.5% compared to 74.1%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons attending a primary school (any type) (6.8% compared to 8.2%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons attending an independent primary school (0.0% compared to 1.1%)

## Emerging groups

From 2016 to 2021, Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s population increased by 401 people (+58.3%). This represents an average annual change of 9.62% per year over the period.

*There were no major differences in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) between 2016 and 2021.*

## Need for assistance

In 2021, 33 people (or 3.0% of the population) in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) reported needing help in their day-to-day lives due to disability. This was a percentage increase from 2016.

Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s disability statistics relate directly to need for assistance due to a severe or profound disability. The information may be used in the planning of local facilities, services such as day-care and occasional care and in the provision of information and support to carers. Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s disability statistics help in understanding the prevalence of people who need support in the community, and along with information on Unpaid Care to a person with a disability, how that support is provided.

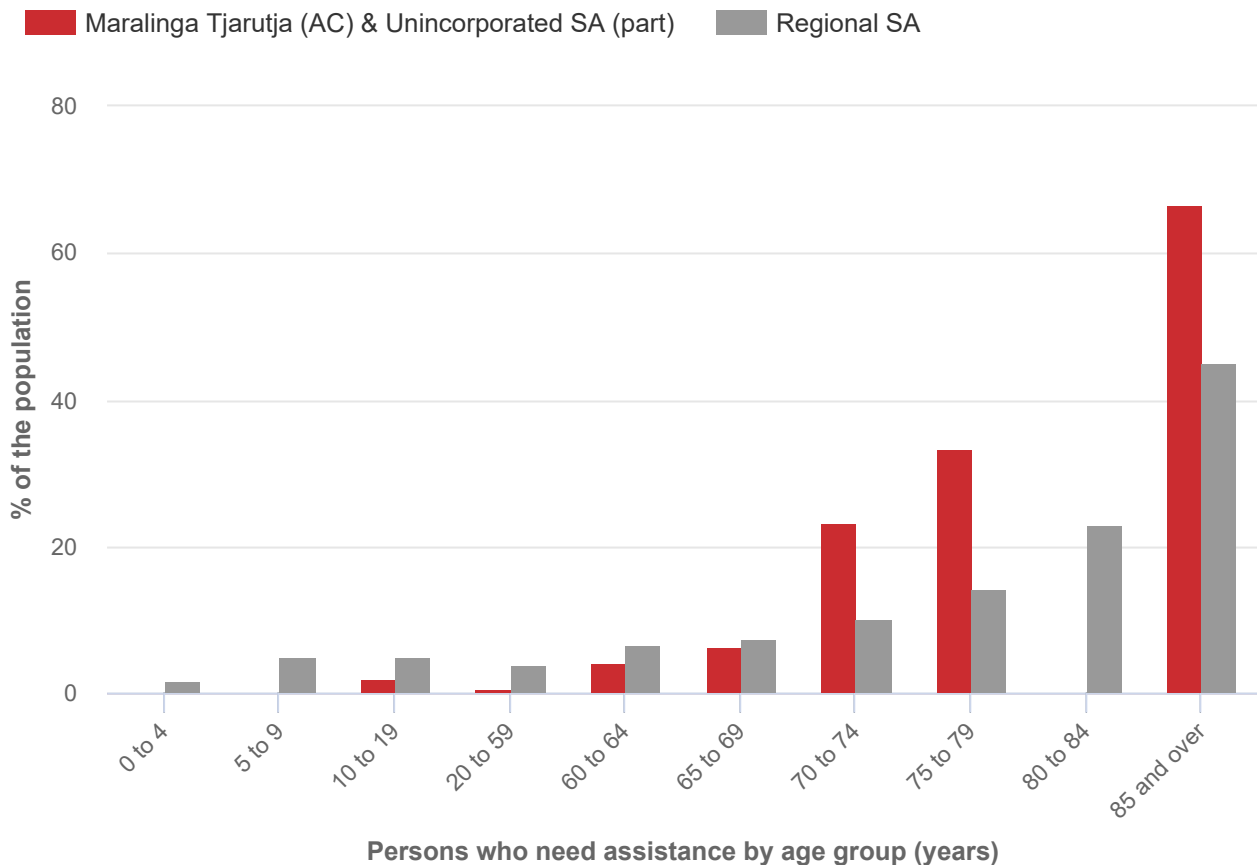

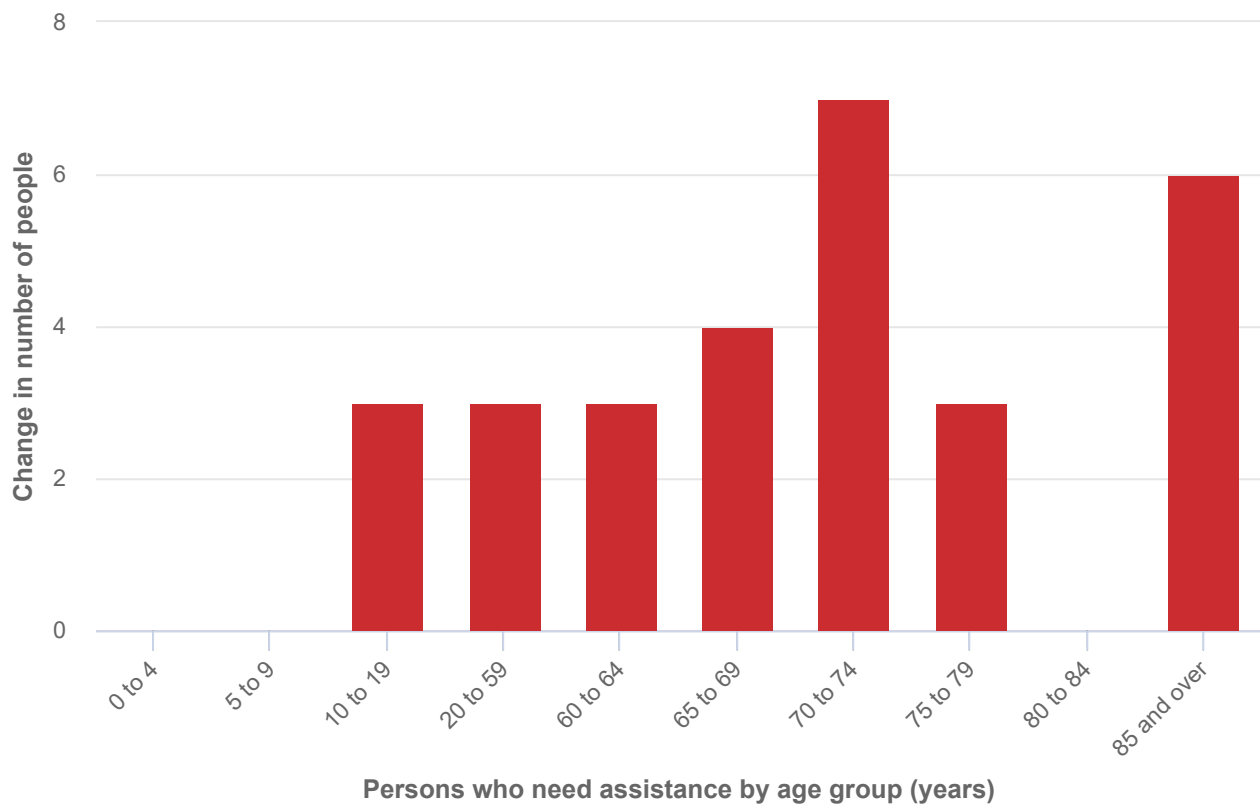
## Need for assistance with core activities, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the need for assistance of people in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of people who reported needing assistance with core activities.

Overall, 3.0% of the population reported needing assistance with core activities, compared with 7.0% for Regional SA.

The major differences in the age groups reporting a need for assistance in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons aged 85 and over (66.7% compared to 45.2%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons aged 75 to 79 (33.3% compared to 14.1%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons aged 70 to 74 (23.3% compared to 10.1%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons aged 80 to 84 (0.0% compared to 22.8%)

## Long term health conditions

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), the most common long-term health condition was diabetes, while 21.8% of the population reported one or more health conditions, a lower rate than in Regional SA (37.5%).

The 2021 Census looked for the first time at the level of incidence of selected long-term health conditions in the community. The Census question asked respondents if they have been diagnosed with a specific condition (or other condition) from a list of ten conditions plus "other". Combined, these ten conditions comprise approximately 60% of Australia's deaths, and even those which are not deadly contribute substantially to the burden of disease.

It is well known that socio-economic factors also contribute to morbidity and health outcomes, with lower-socio economic characteristics correlated with higher incidence of some health conditions. The inclusion of this topic in the Census enables these factors to be explored in more detail.

Also, in society, health conditions tend to increase with age. For these reasons, it is recommended that long-term health conditions data for be viewed at in conjunction with age structure, household income, educational qualifications, and need for assistance datasets, along with the SEIFA index of disadvantage.

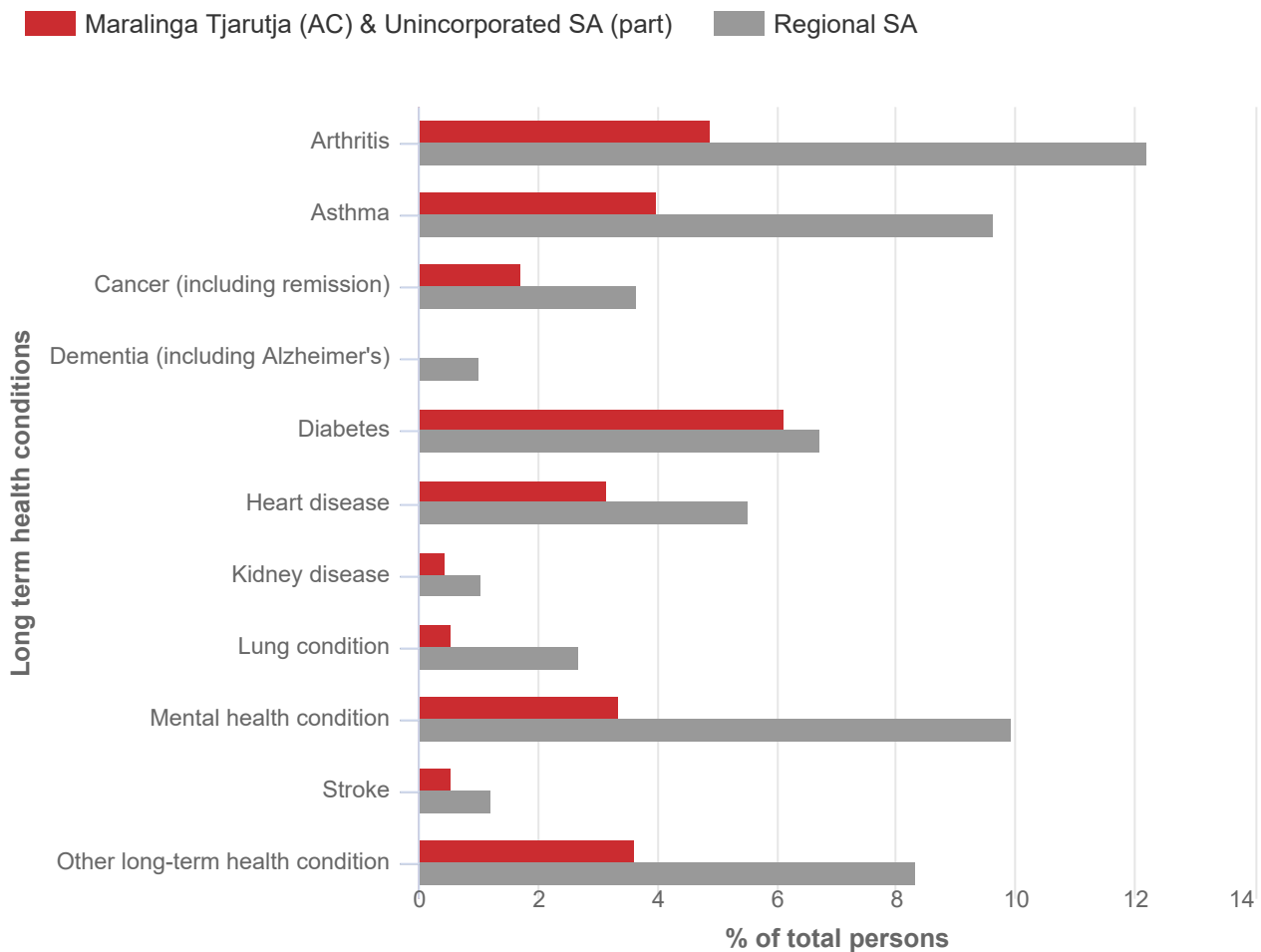

Analysis of the long term health conditions of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of people with a long-term health condition 21.8% compared to 37.5% in Regional SA.

The major differences in the long-term health conditions between Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA are:

- A *smaller* percentage with arthritis (4.9% compared to 12.2%)
- A *smaller* percentage with mental health condition (3.3% compared to 9.9%)
- A *smaller* percentage with asthma (4.0% compared to 9.6%)
- A *smaller* percentage with other long-term health condition (3.6% compared to 8.3%)

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Employment status

447 people living in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 were employed, of which 60% worked full-time and 26% part-time.

Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s employment statistics are an important indicator of socio-economic status. The levels of full or part-time employment, unemployment and labour force participation indicate the strength of the local economy and social characteristics of the population. Employment status is linked to a number of factors including **Age Structure**, which influences the number of people in the workforce; the economic base and employment opportunities available in the area and; the education and skill base of the population (**Occupations, Industries, Qualifications**).

The two most important measures are:

- Unemployment rate - the number of people looking for work, as a percentage of the labour force (employed and unemployed over 15)
- Participation rate - the labour force expressed as a percentage of the total population over 15

Please note that in the 2021 Census, due to the COVID pandemic and lockdowns in many areas, the proportion of people who were employed but away from work in the week before Census has increased. We have no information on whether these people were normally employed full or part time so this is shown separately.

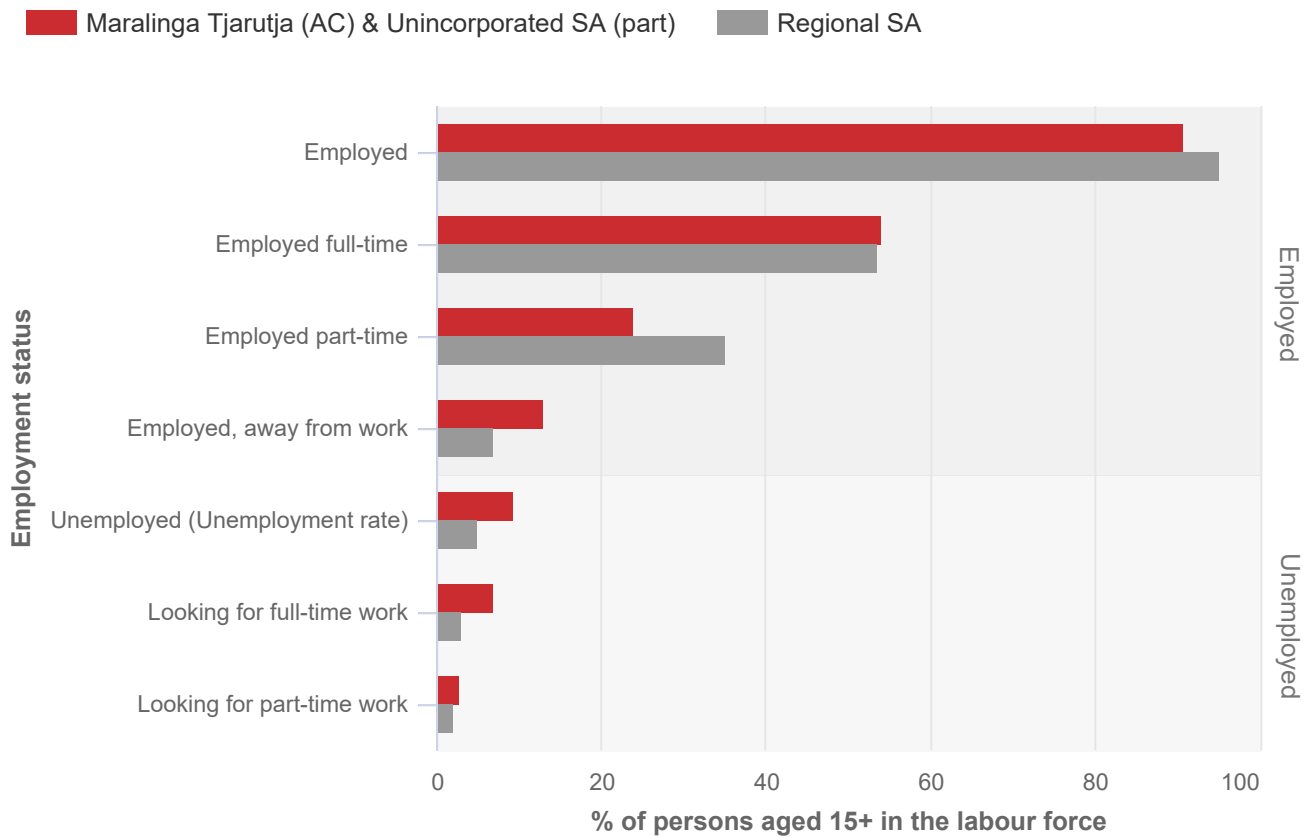

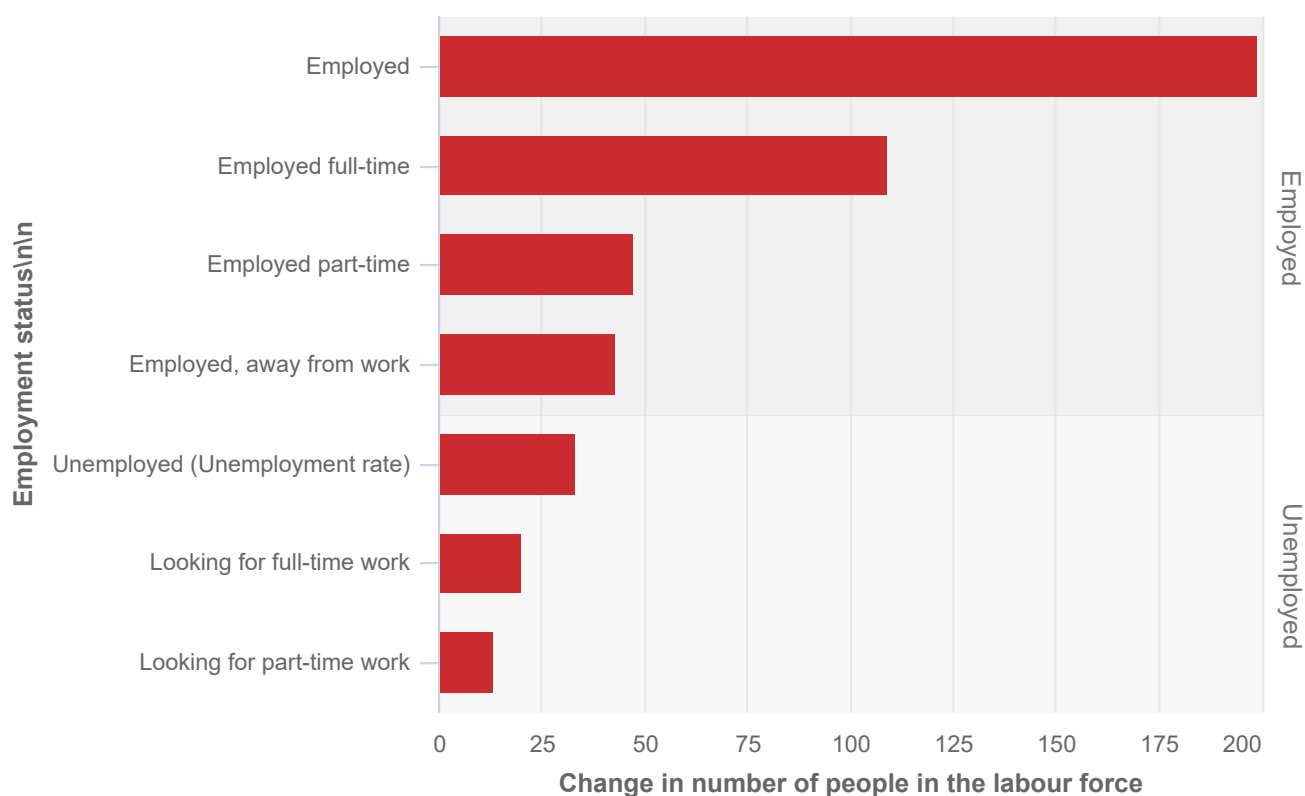
Total persons in the labour force

## Dominant groups

The size of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s labour force in 2021 was 493, of which 118 were employed part-time and 266 were full time workers.

Analysis of the employment status (as a percentage of the labour force) in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion in employment, and a higher proportion unemployed. Overall, 90.7% of the labour force was employed, and 9.3% unemployed, compared with 95.2% and 4.8% respectively for Regional SA.

Analysis of the labour force participation rate of the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 shows that there was a lower proportion in the labour force (52.9%) compared with Regional SA (54.1%).

## Emerging groups

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of people employed in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) showed an increase of 199, and the number unemployed showed an increase of 33. In the same period, the number of people in the labour force showed an increase of 232 or 88.9%.

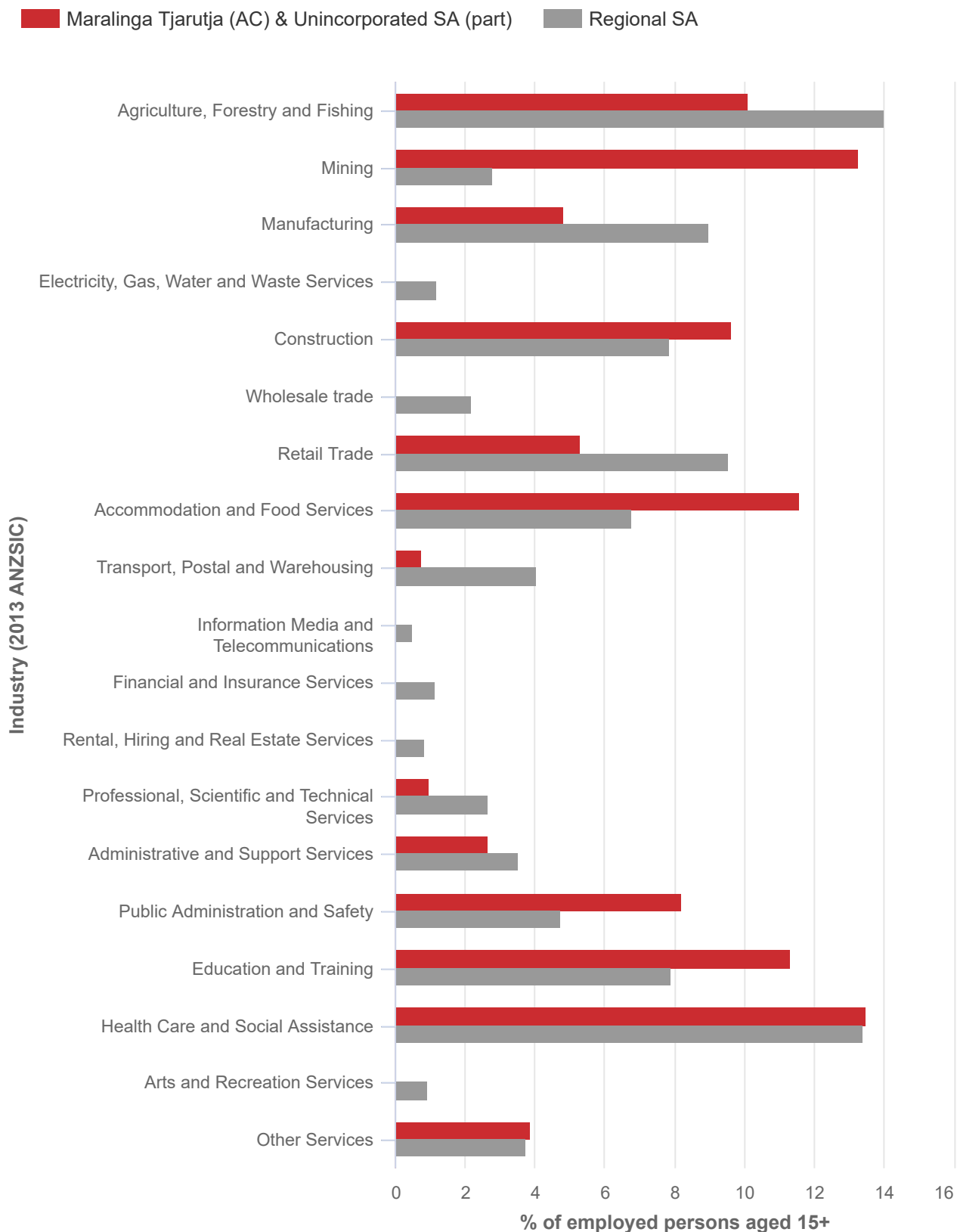

An analysis of the jobs held by the resident population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 shows the three most popular industry sectors were:

- Health Care and Social Assistance (56 people or 13.5%)

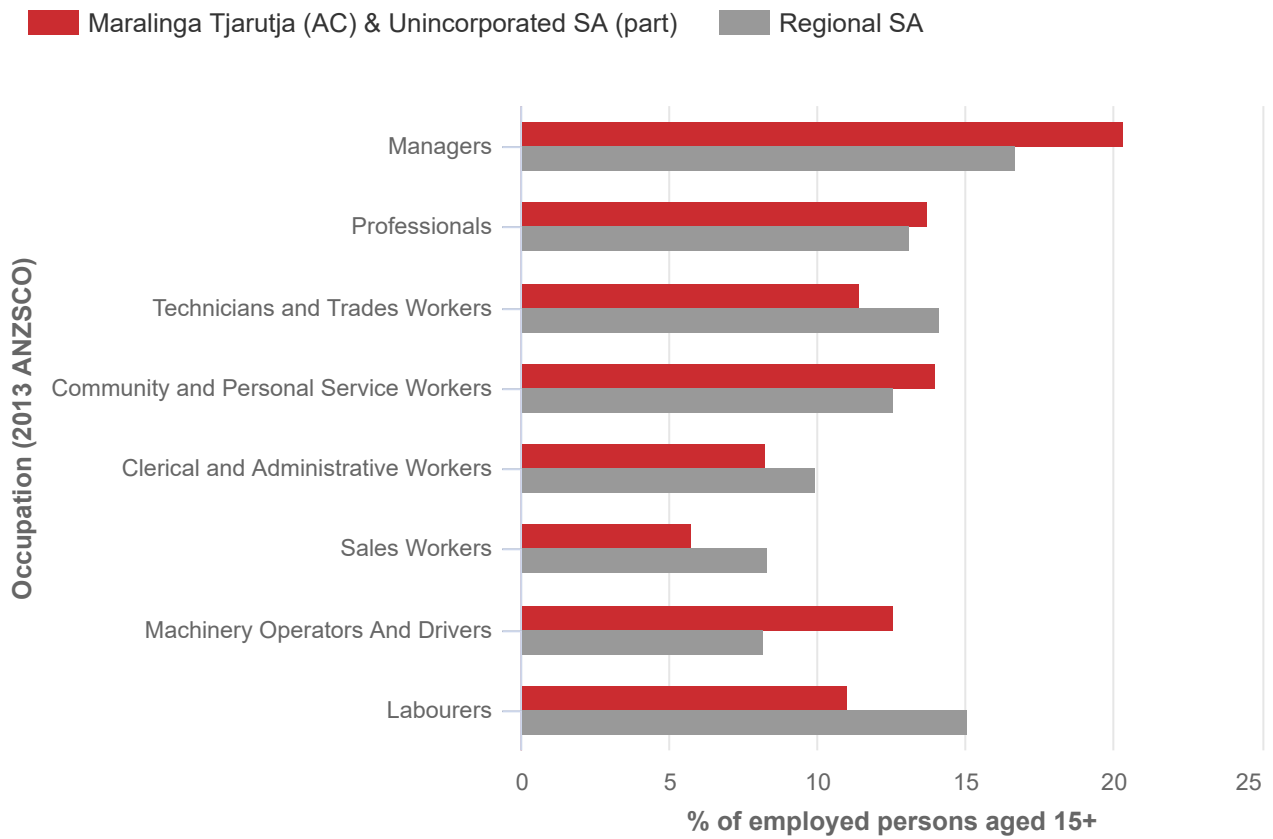

## Occupation of employment, 2021

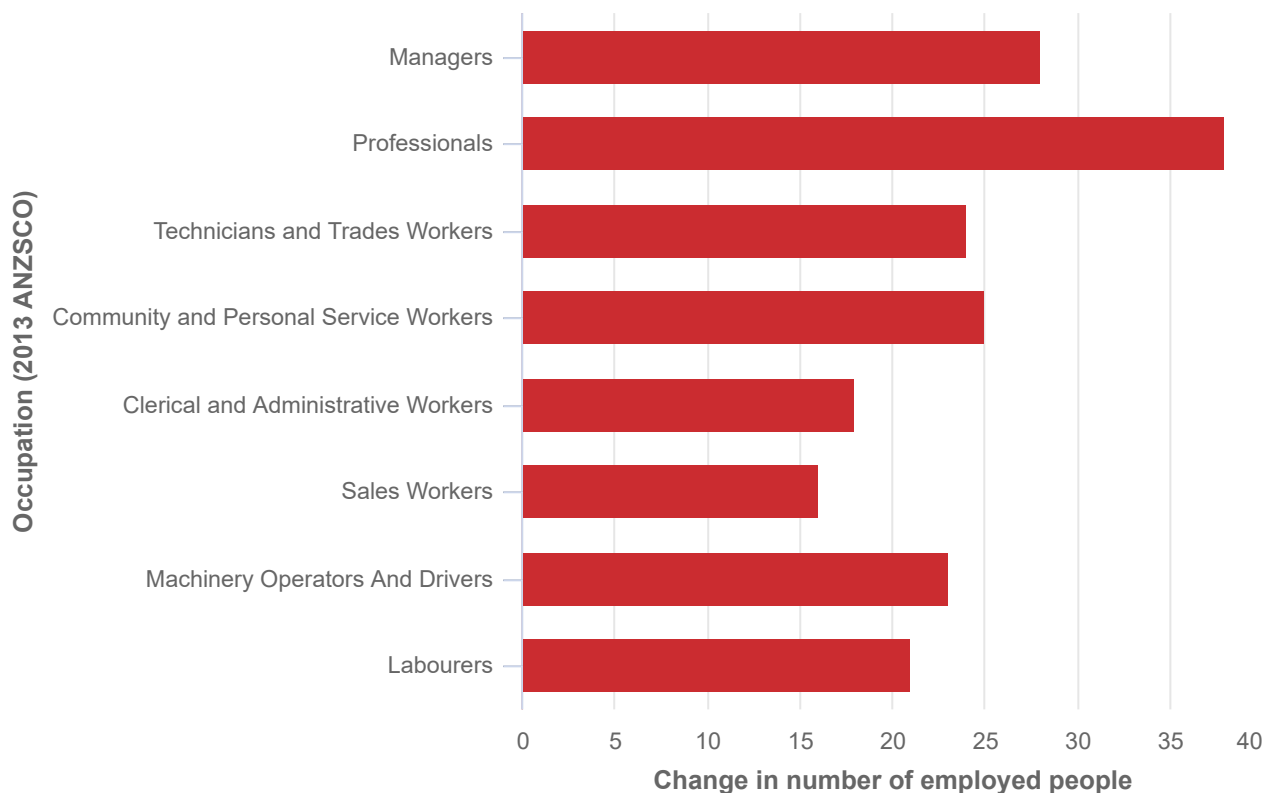
Total employed persons

## Dominant groups

An analysis of the jobs held by the resident population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 shows the three most popular occupations were:

- Managers (89 people or 20.4%)
- Community and Personal Service Workers (61 people or 14.0%)
- Professionals (60 people or 13.7%)

In combination these three occupations accounted for 210 people in total or 48.1% of the employed resident population.

In comparison, Regional SA employed 16.7% in Managers; 12.6% in Community and Personal Service Workers; and 13.1% in Professionals.

The major differences between the jobs held by the population of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons employed as Machinery Operators And Drivers (12.6% compared to 8.1%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons employed as Managers (20.4% compared to 16.7%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons employed as Labourers (11.0% compared to 15.1%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons employed as Technicians and Trades Workers (11.4% compared to 14.1%)

## Method of travel to work

On Census day 2021 in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), 52.3% of people travelled to work in a private car, 4.7% took public transport and 18.9% rode a bike or walked. 6.5% worked at home.

Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s commuting statistics reveal the main modes of transport by which residents get to work. There are a number of reasons why people use different modes of transport to get to work including the availability of affordable and effective public transport options, the number of motor vehicles available within a household, and the distance travelled to work.

Commuting data is very useful in transport planning as it informs decision-makers about the availability, effectiveness and utilisation of local transport options, particularly when analysed with **Residents Place of Work** data and **Car Ownership**.

**WARNING:** Method of travel to work relates to Census day, which for the 2021 Census occurred during COVID-19 lockdowns for large parts of Australia. In lockdown, many occupations were required to work from home if possible, and some industries were closed, so people did not go to work. For this reason, these categories may have increased, with corresponding declines in other methods of travel. Use the data with caution when comparing over time. 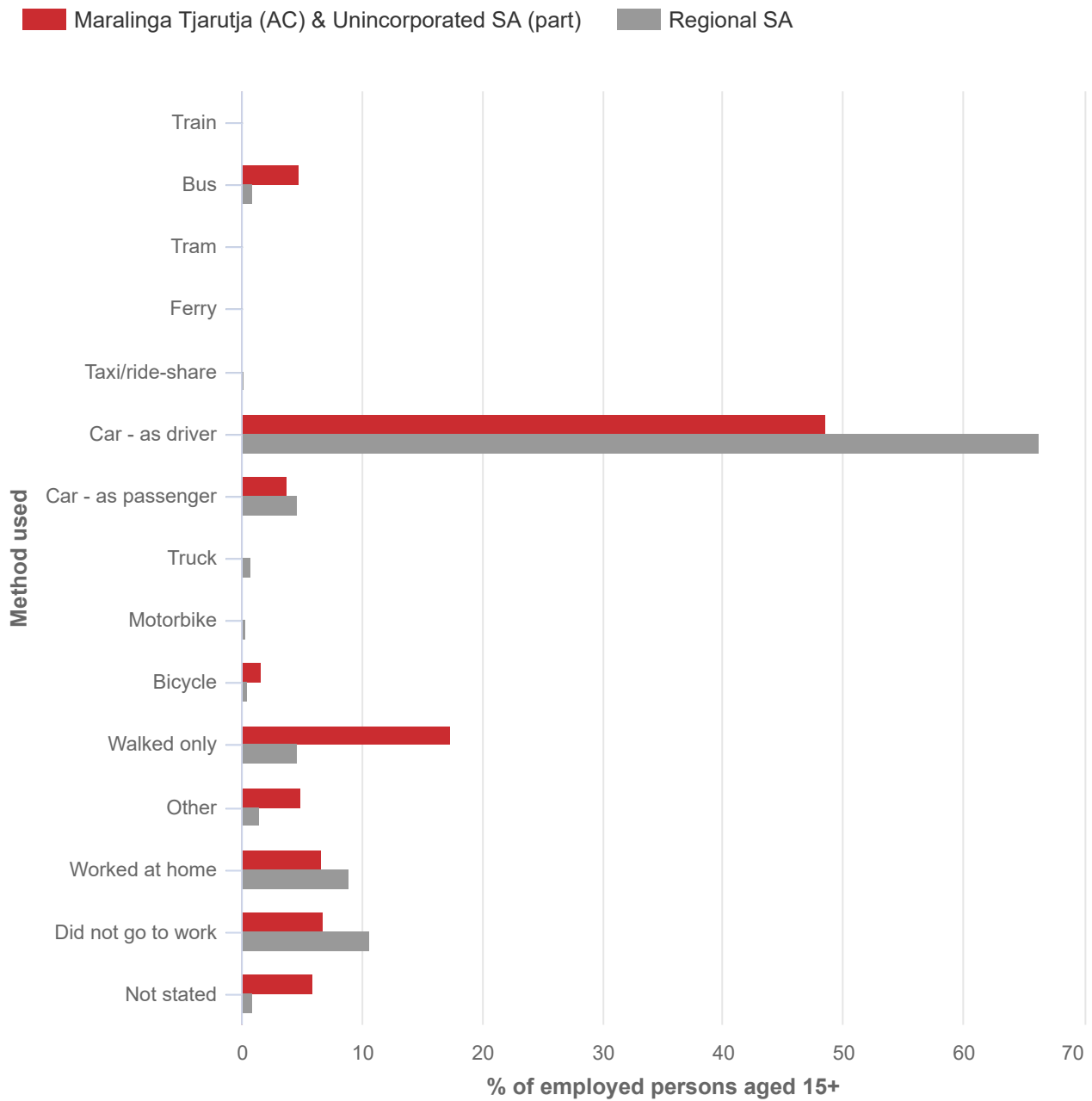

## Method of travel to work, 2021

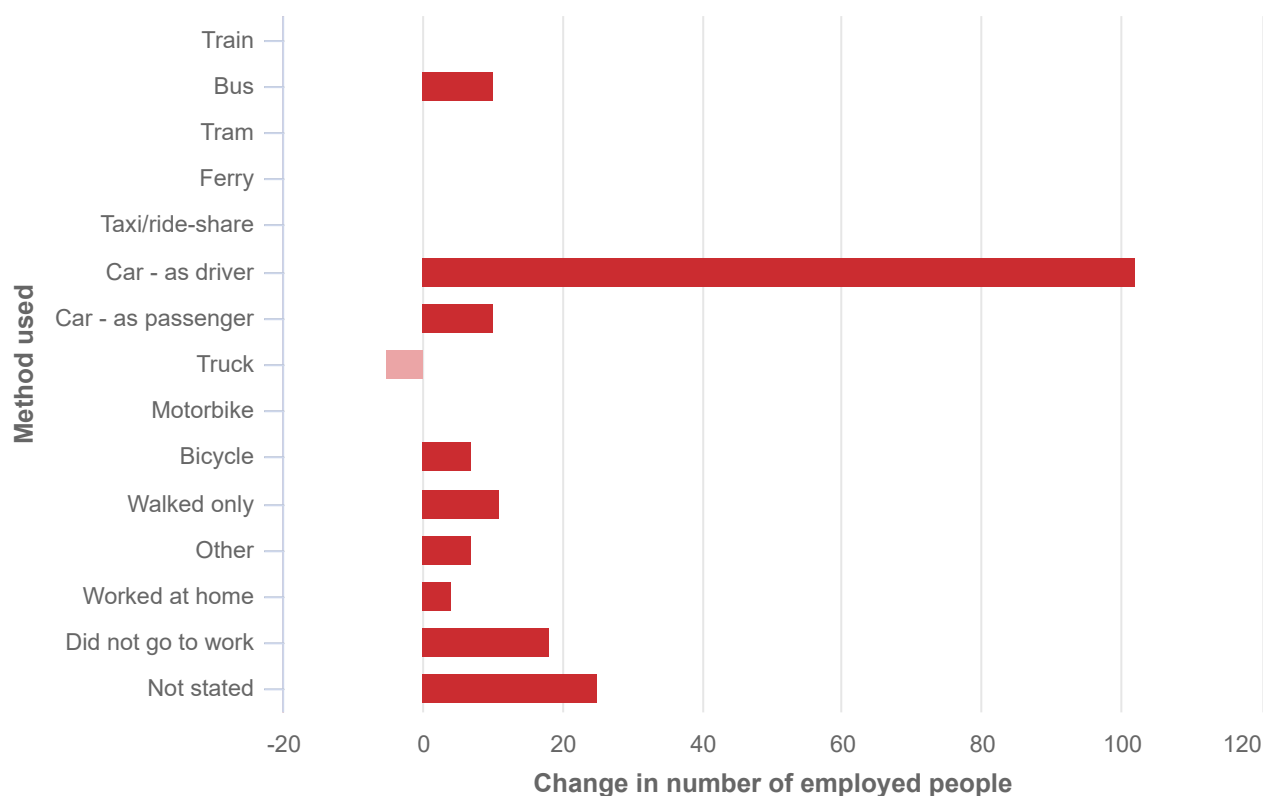
Total employed persons

## Dominant groups

In 2021, there were 20 people who caught public transport to work (train, bus, tram or ferry) in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), compared with 224 who drove in private vehicles (car – as driver, car – as passenger, motorbike, or truck).

Analysis of the method of travel to work of the residents in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021, compared to Regional SA, shows that 4.7% used public transport, while 52.3% used a private vehicle, compared with 0.9% and 70.9% respectively in Regional SA.

The major differences in persons between the method of travel to work of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of persons who walked only (17.3% compared to 4.6%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons Not stated (5.8% compared to 0.9%)
- A *larger* percentage of persons who travelled by bus (4.7% compared to 0.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who travelled by car (as driver) (48.6% compared to 66.3%)

## Emerging groups

The number of employed people in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) increased by 189 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest change in the method of travel to work by resident population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) between 2016 and 2021 was for those nominated:

- Car - as driver (+102 persons)

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Disengagement by age

In 2021, 31.0% of 15 to 24 year olds in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) were disengaged with employment and education, compared to 12.2% in Regional SA.

Engagement in employment and education looks at the level of participation by age and sex of the population in the labour market, or full or part-time education. A full time employed or full-time student would be "Fully engaged", while part-time students may be fully engaged if they are also employed, or partly engaged if they are not working. Engagement in the labour and education market is highly dependent on age. Retirees are generally disengaged, while stay-at-home parents are also likely to be disengaged. The rate of engagement, particularly in the younger and working age groups can be affected by access to strong employment and education markets and is a measure of socio-economic status and the level of welfare dependency in an area. 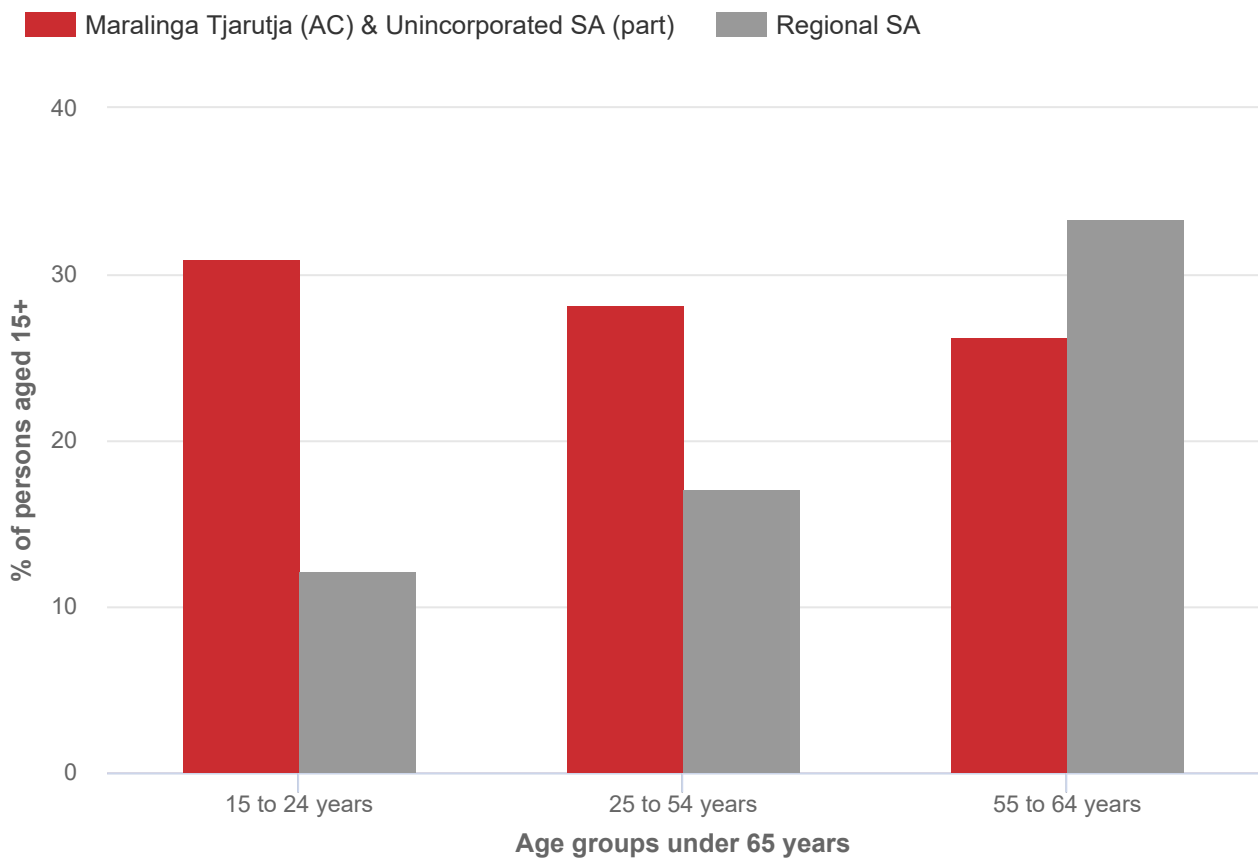

## Disengaged persons by age, 2021

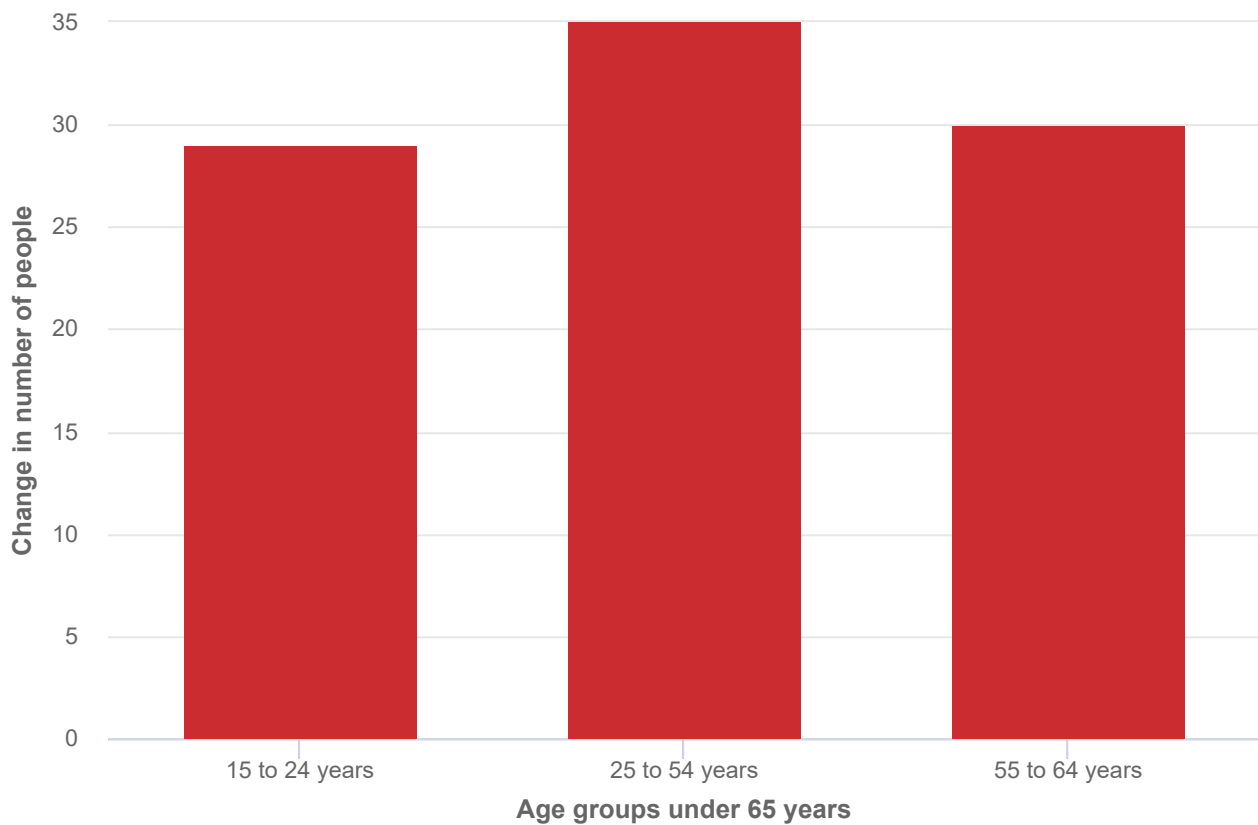
Total disengaged persons under 65 years

The number of people aged 15 to 24 years in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2016 was 155, of this, 31.0% were disengaged and 9.7% were partially engaged, compared to 12.2% and 16.4% respectively for Regional SA.

## Volunteer work

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) 16.4% of the population reported doing some form of voluntary work in 2021. This was a smaller proportion than Regional SA.

The voluntary work sector is an important part of Australia's economy. The level of volunteering can indicate the cohesiveness of the community and how readily individuals are able to contribute to that community. Factors impacting on the level of volunteering in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) include the **Age Structure** of the population, the level of **Proficiency in English**, **Income** and **Education** levels.

Volunteer numbers for the 2021 Census declined in many parts of Australia due to lockdowns and COVID-19 distancing measures.

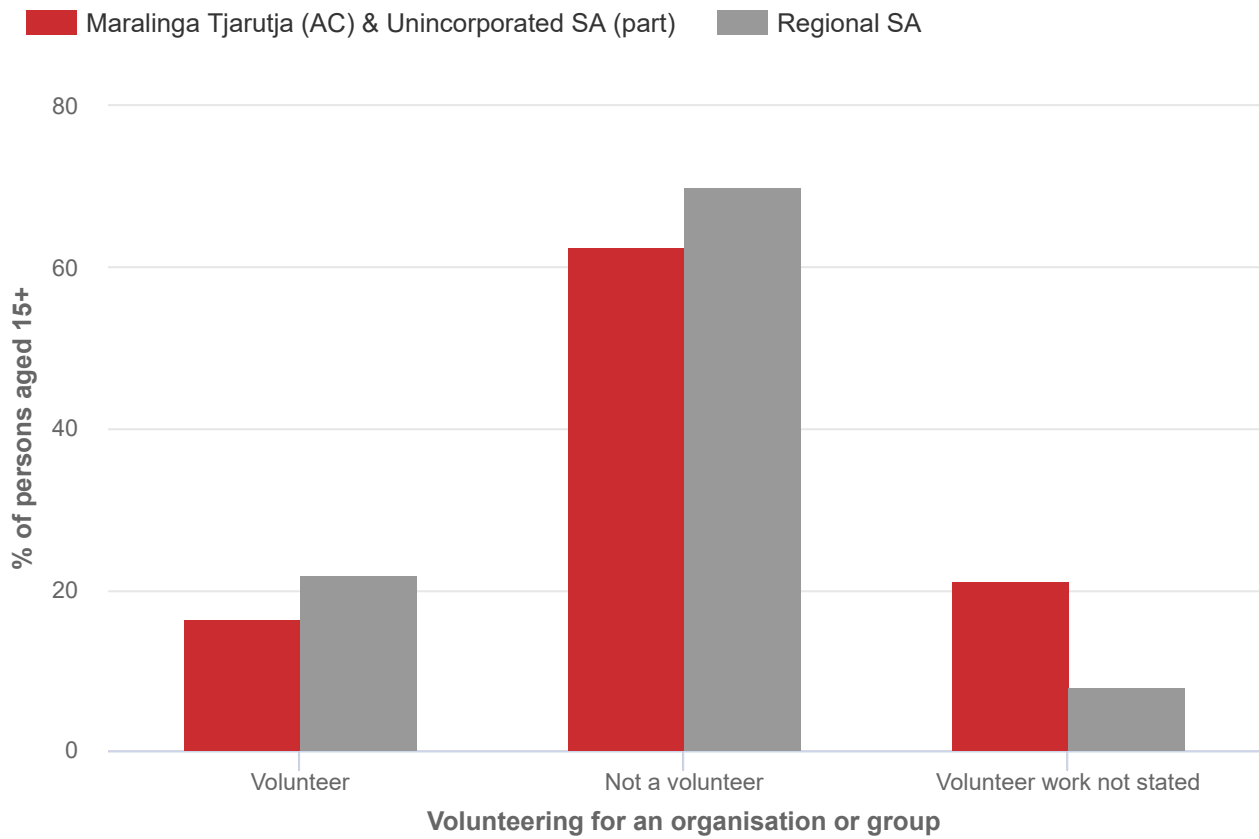

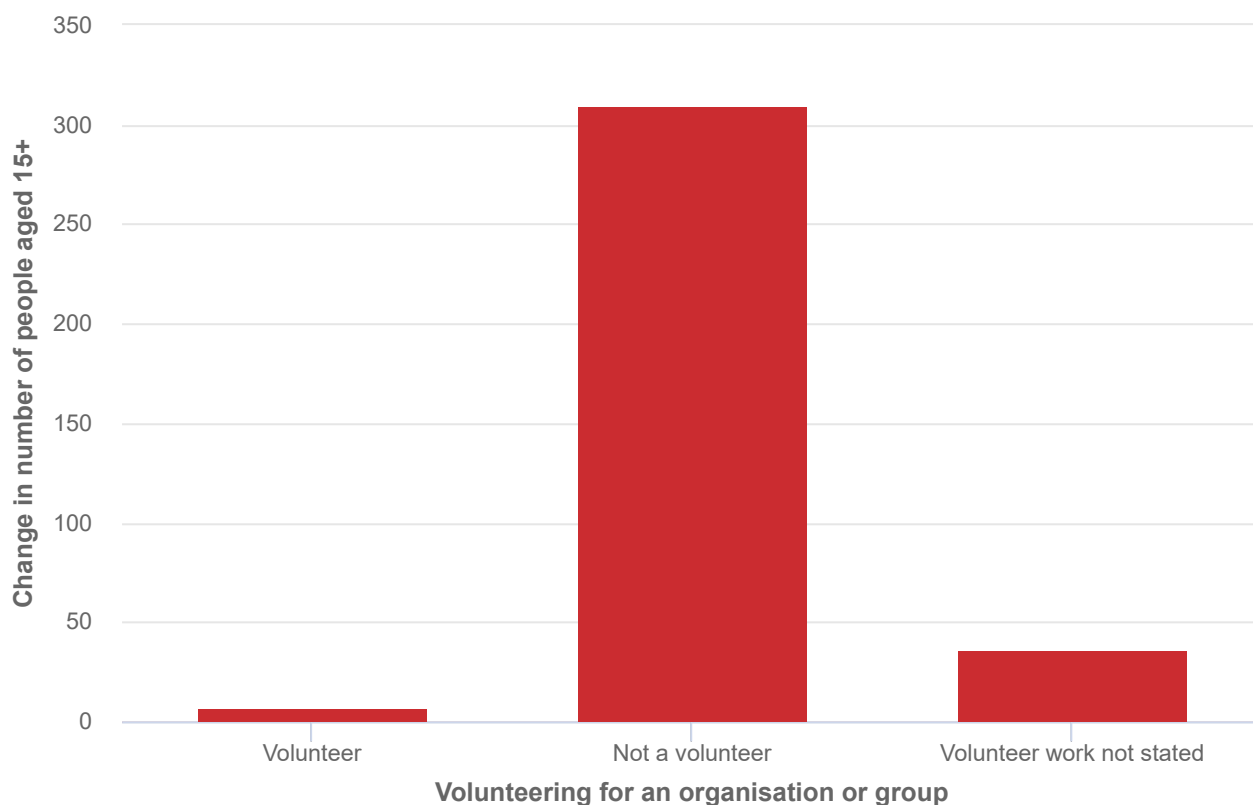

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the voluntary work performed by the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of people who volunteered for an organisation or group.

Overall, 16.4% of the population reported performing voluntary work, compared with 22.0% for Regional SA.

## Emerging groups

The number of volunteers in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) increased by 7 people between 2016 and 2021.

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Unpaid domestic work

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) 19% of the population over 15 did more than 14 hours of housework each week in 2021.

There has been increased interest in identifying, acknowledging and valuing the unpaid work that supports home and community life. The changing amount of time spent on unpaid housework in different Household Types and, particularly the distribution of this work within the household, can indicate the changing roles of males, females and older children in society. The level of unpaid domestic work in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) may also be related to Household Income, as higher income households are able to outsource some of these tasks.

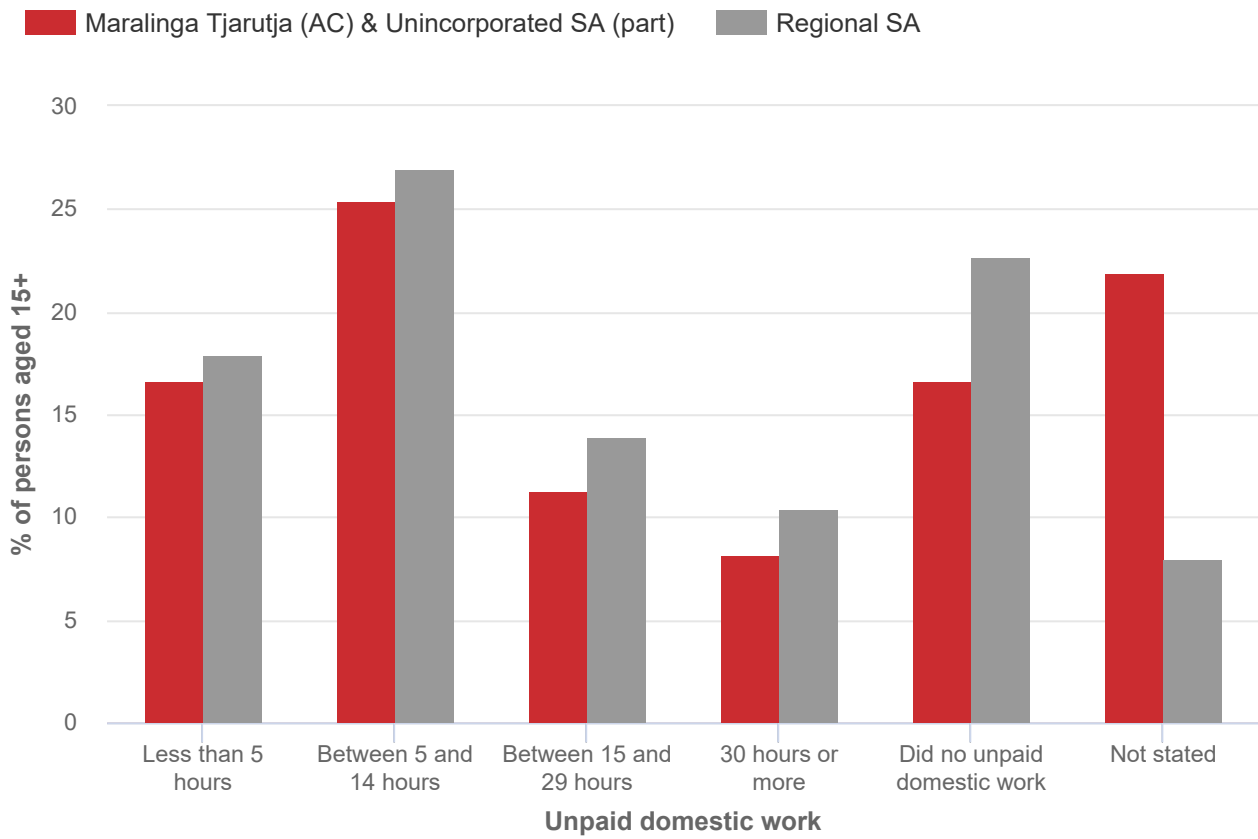

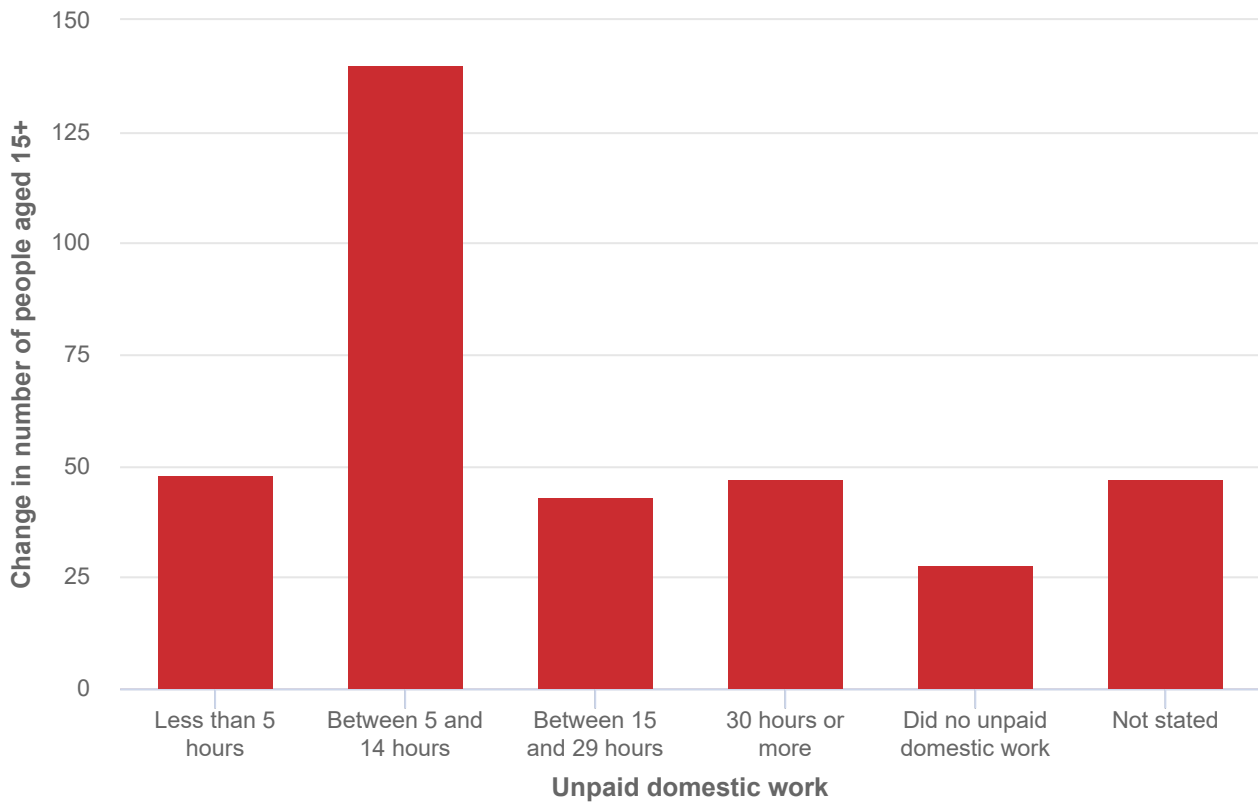

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the unpaid domestic work performed by the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of persons who performed 15 hours or more of unpaid domestic work per week.

Overall, 19% of the population reported performing 15 hours or more of unpaid domestic work, compared with 24.4% for Regional SA.

The major differences between the share of the population performing unpaid domestic work in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *smaller* percentage of persons who did unpaid domestic work (total) (61.5% compared to 69.3%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who did no unpaid domestic work (16.6% compared to 22.7%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who did between 15 and 29 hours of domestic work (11.3% compared to 13.9%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who did 30 hours or more of domestic work (8.1% compared to 10.4%)

## Emerging groups

The largest changes in the number of people performing unpaid domestic work in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), between 2016 and 2021 were those who:

- Did unpaid domestic work (+278 persons)
- Between 5 and 14 hours (+140 persons)

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Unpaid care

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), 88 carers were providing unpaid assistance to a person with a disability, long term illness or old age in 2021. This represents 9.5% of the population aged 15+.

The proportion of people providing unpaid care for the aged and disabled in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) can be an important indicator of the level of demand for aged care services and facilities by local and state governments. An increasing proportion of carers among the population may indicate inadequate aged care provision, or the need for in-home support, or support for the carers themselves. The level of care provided by individuals is likely to be affected by Household Income, Age Structure and the ethnic makeup of the community (Language Spoken), as well as the sense of community cohesiveness.

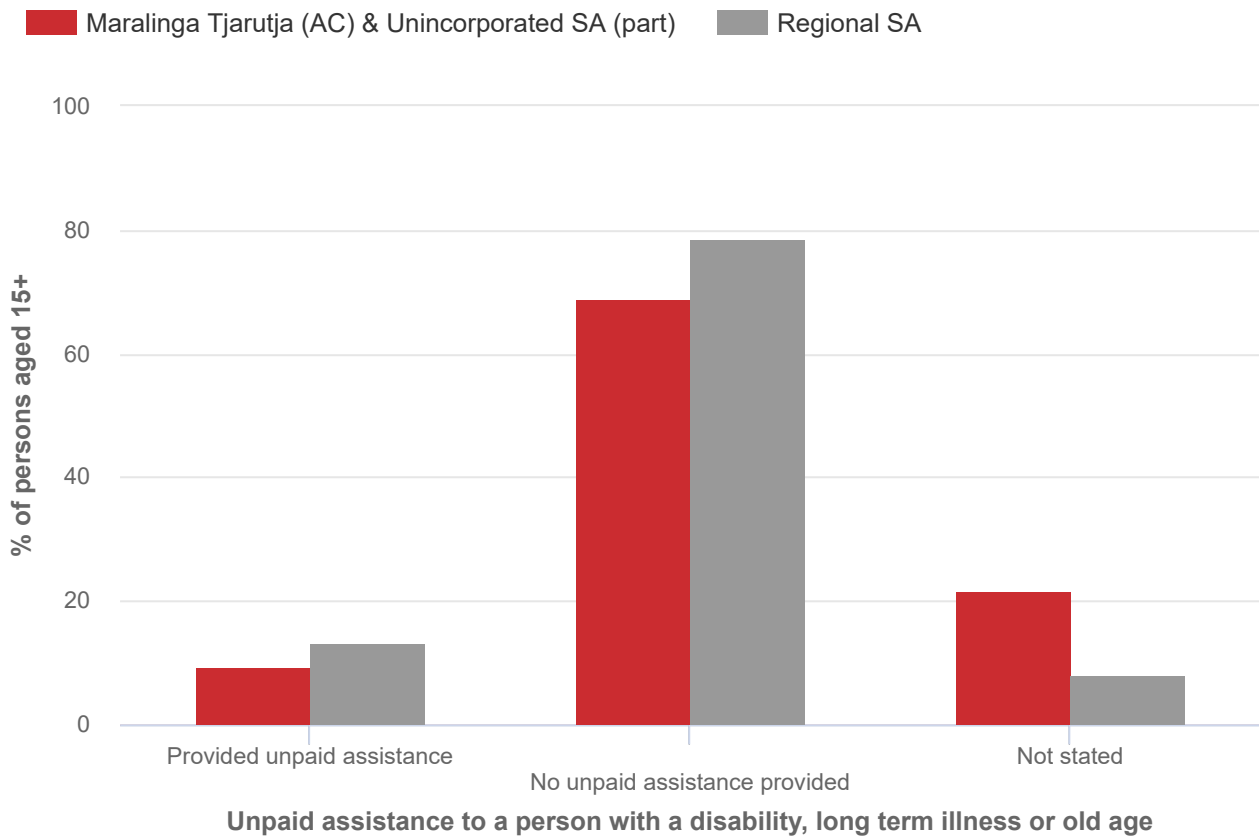

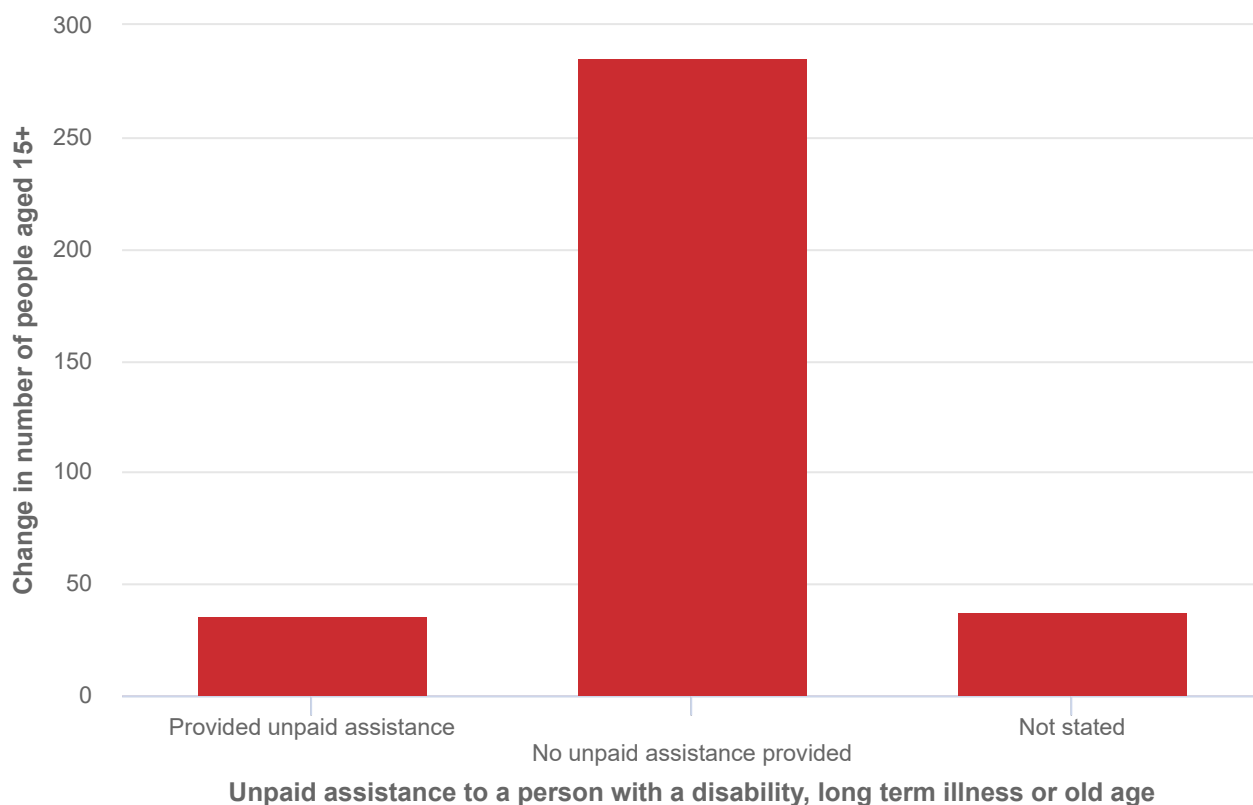

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the unpaid care provided by the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of people who provided unpaid care either to family members or others.

Overall, 9.5% of the population provided unpaid care, compared with 13.2% for Regional SA.

## Emerging groups

The number of people who provided unpaid assistance to a person with a disability, long term illness or old age in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) increased by 36 between 2016 and 2021.

## Unpaid childcare

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) 230 people (25.0% of people aged 15+) provided unpaid care to children in 2021. Of these, 94 people were caring for children other than their own.

The role of unpaid childcare in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) is determined by many different factors. For example areas with high levels of unpaid child care may have a dominance of single income families with one significant earner, or there could be a lack of provision of paid child care in the area. The level to which people care for others children can also indicate the role of extended family (eg. grandparents caring for grandchildren, family day care).

The role of unpaid child care is a complex one so this topic should be viewed in conjunction with several others, including Household Type, Employment, Household Income and Educational Attendance.

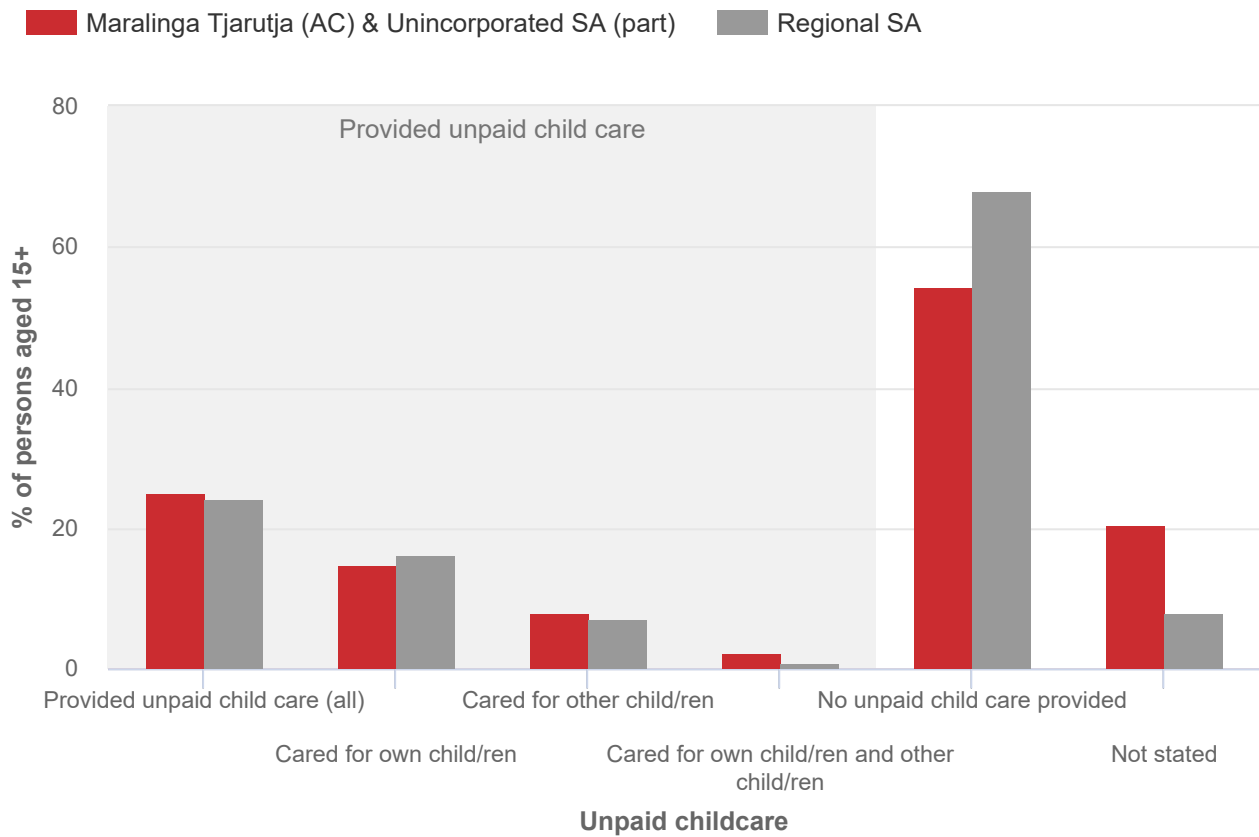

## Unpaid childcare, 2021

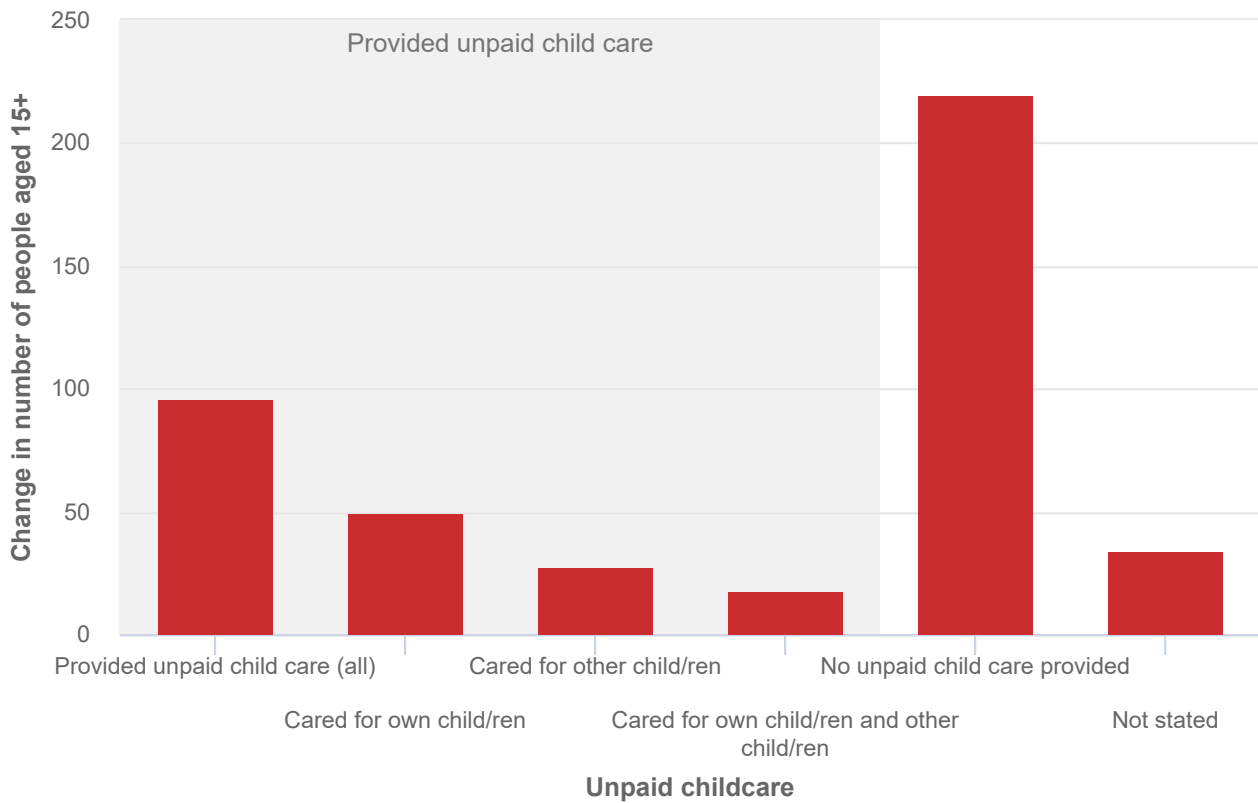
Total persons

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the unpaid child care provided by the population in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a higher proportion of people who provided unpaid child care either to their own or to other children. Overall, 25.0% of the population provided unpaid child care, compared with 24.3% for Regional SA.

The major differences between the share of the population providing unpaid child care in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage who provided unpaid childcare for own and other child/ren (2.4% compared to 0.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage who did not provide care for children (54.5% compared to 67.9%)
- A *smaller* percentage who provided unpaid childcare for own child/ren (14.8% compared to 16.2%)

## Emerging groups

The number of people who provided unpaid child care for their own and/or other people's children in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) increased by 96 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest changes in the number of people performing unpaid child care in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), between 2016 and 2021 were those who:

- No unpaid child care provided (+220 persons)
- Cared for own child/ren (+50 persons)

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Individual income

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), 8.9% of the population earned an income of \$2,000 or more per week in 2021.

Individual Income statistics are an indicator of socio-economic status. With other data sources, such as Household Income, Qualifications and Occupation, they help tell the story of the economic opportunities and socio-economic status of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part). The amount of income an individual receives is linked to a number of factors including employment status, age (as for instance students and retirees often receive a lower income), qualifications and type of employment.

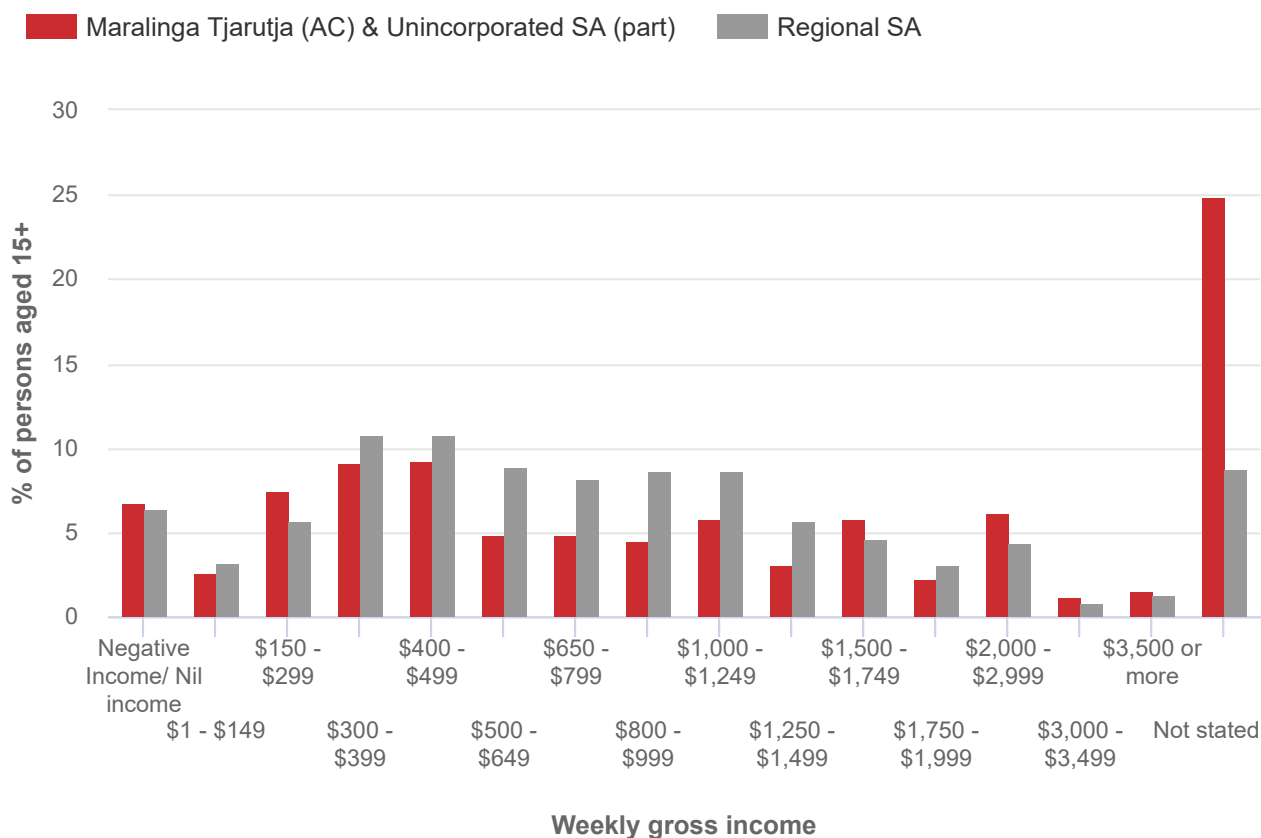

## Dominant groups

Analysis of individual income levels in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a higher proportion of people earning a high income (those earning \$2,000 per week or more) and a lower proportion of low income people (those earning less than \$500 per week).

Overall, 8.9% of the population earned a high income, and 35.2% earned a low income, compared with 6.5% and 36.9% respectively for Regional SA.

The major differences between Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s individual incomes and Regional SA's individual incomes were:

- A *smaller* percentage of persons who earned \$800 - \$999 (4.5% compared to 8.7%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who earned \$500 - \$649 (4.8% compared to 8.9%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who earned \$650 - \$799 (4.9% compared to 8.2%)
- A *smaller* percentage of persons who earned \$1,000 - \$1,249 (5.8% compared to 8.7%)

## Individual income quartiles

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), the 'lowest' income quartile was the largest group in 2021, comprising 32% of people aged 15 and over.

Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s income statistics are an indicator of socio-economic status. With other data sources, such as Household Income, Qualifications and Occupation, they help tell the story of the area's economic opportunities and socio-economic status. Individual income levels are not comparable over time because of the influences of economic change such as wage level fluctuations and inflation. The income quartile method is the most objective method of comparing change in the income profile of a community over time.

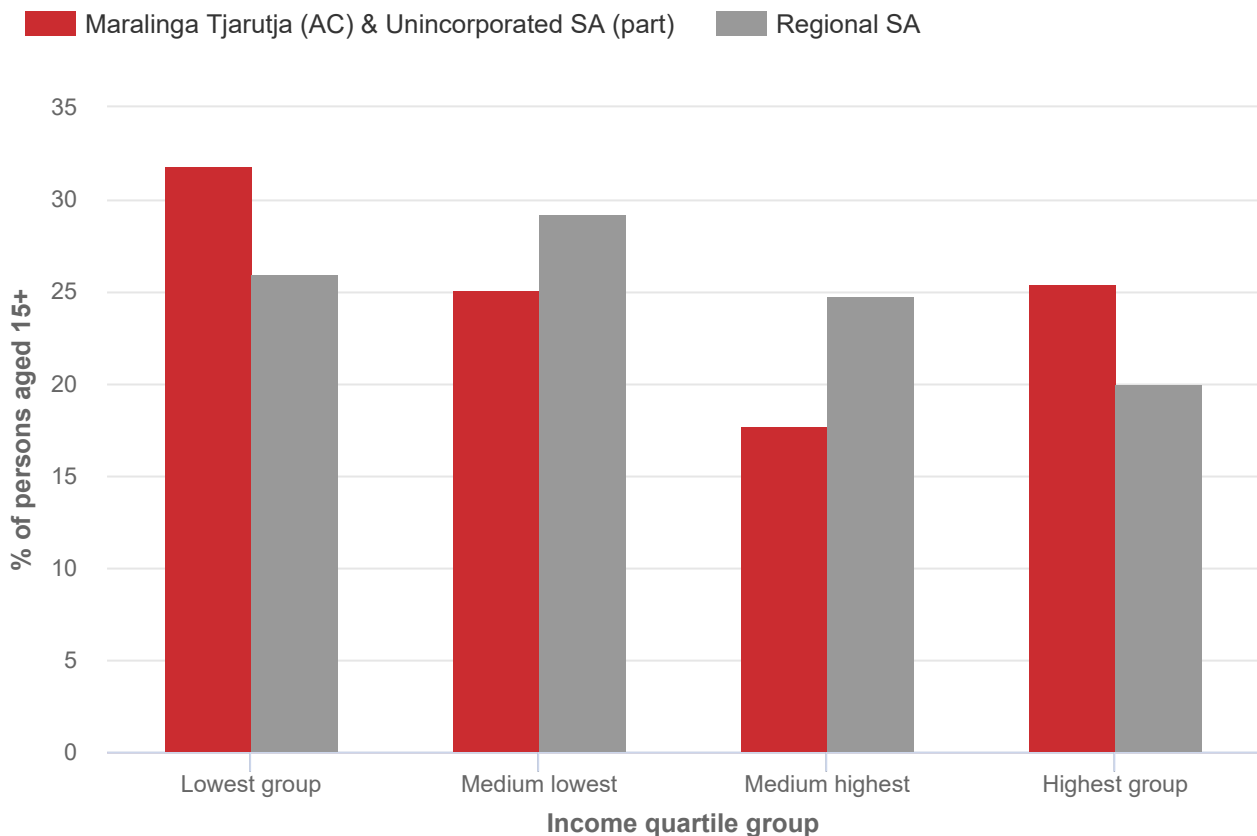

Total persons

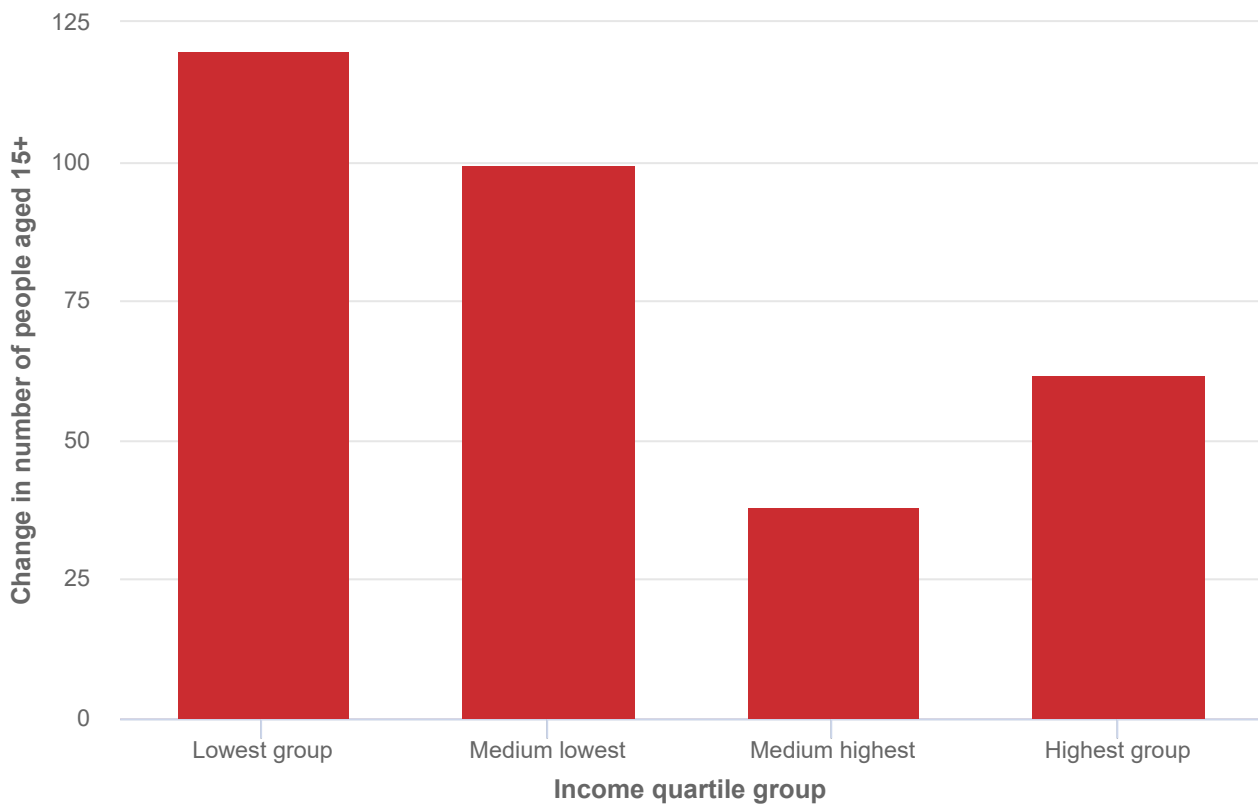

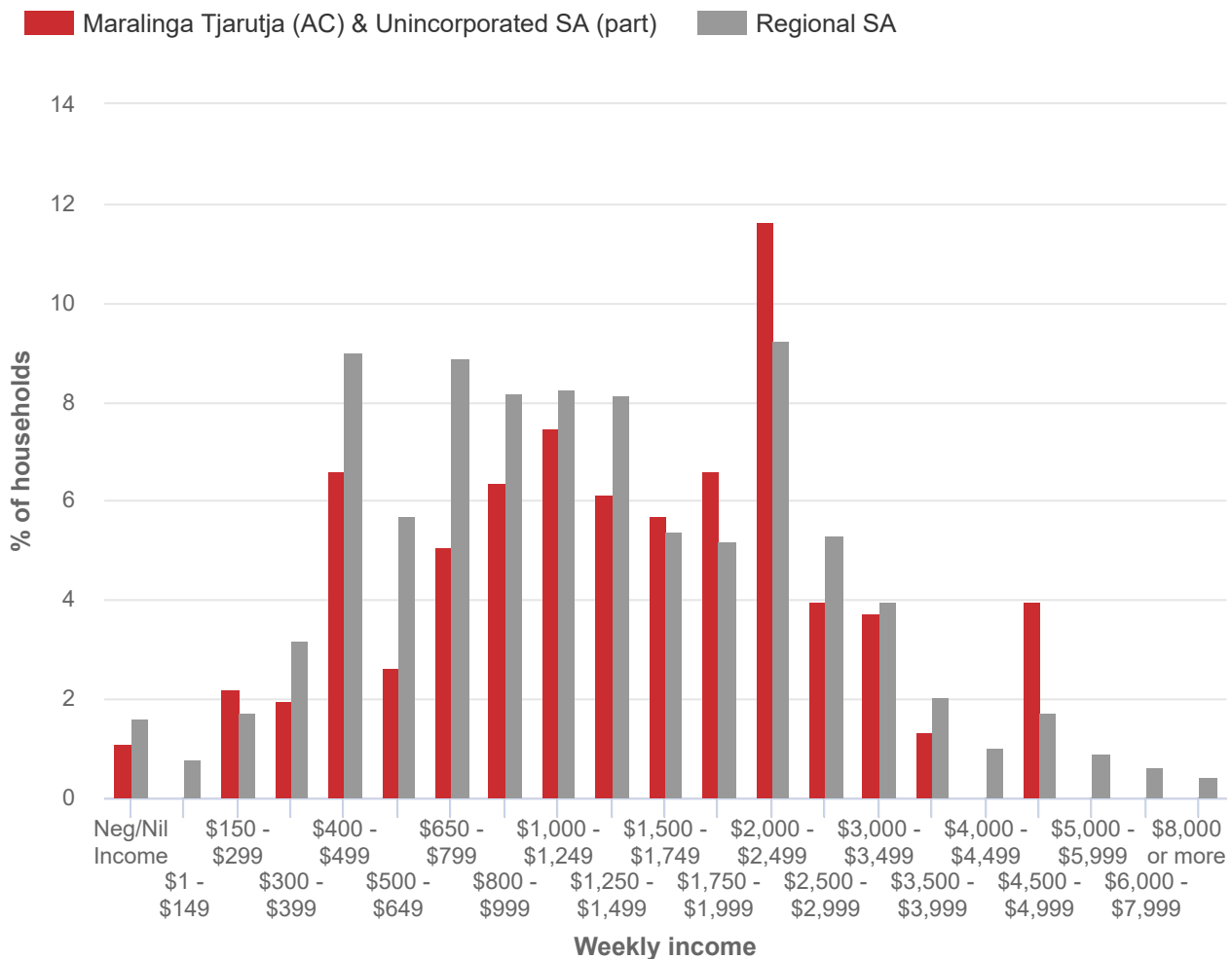

## Dominant groups

Analysis of household income levels in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a smaller proportion of high income households (those earning \$3,000 per week or more) and a lower proportion of low income households (those earning less than \$800 per week).

Overall, 9.0% of the households earned a high income and 19.6% were low income households, compared with 10.7% and 30.9% respectively for Regional SA.

The major differences between the household incomes of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of households who earned Not stated (23.5% compared to 8.7%)

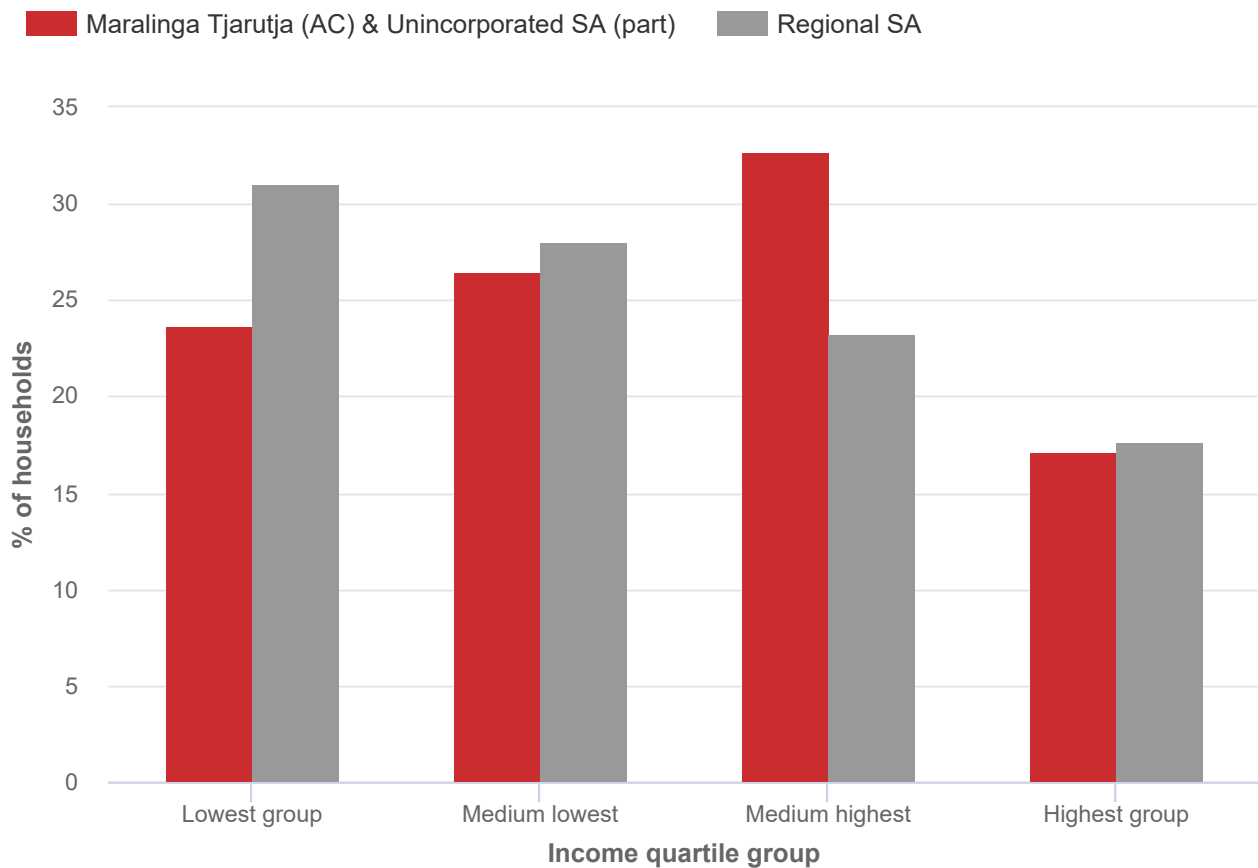

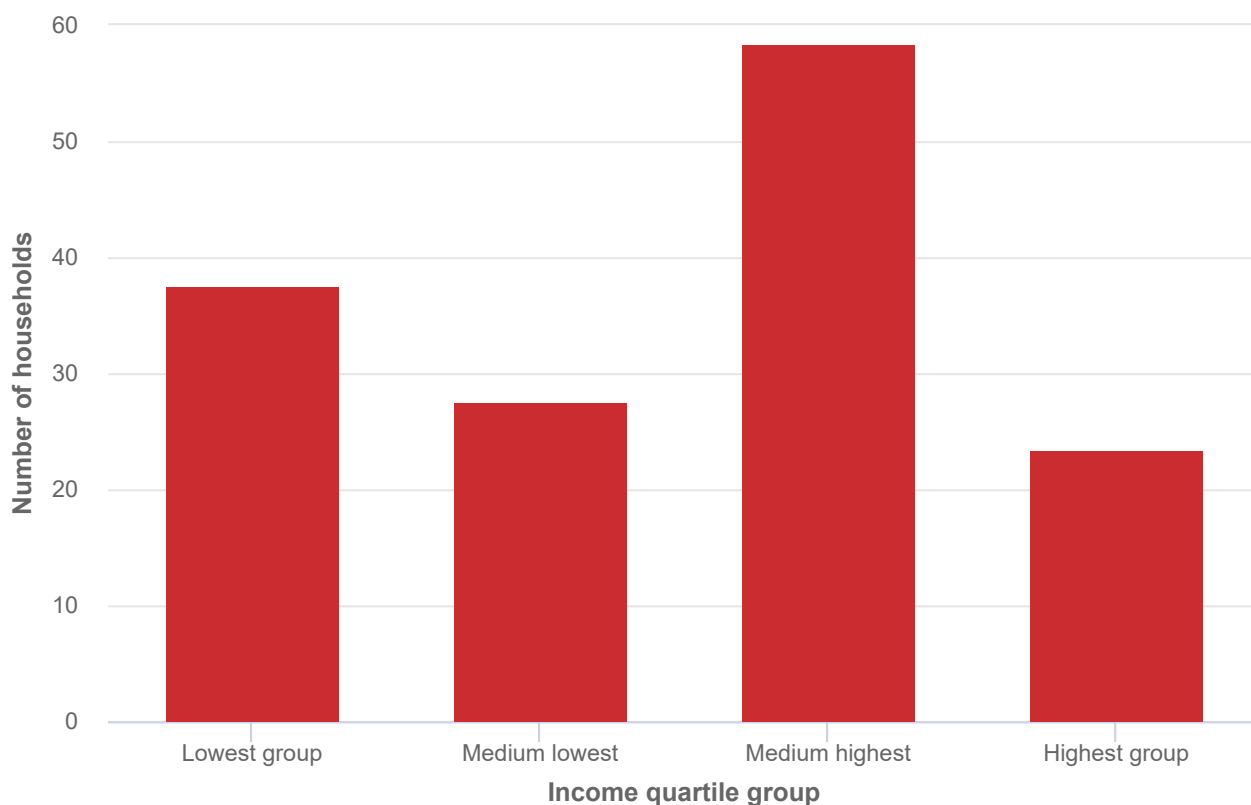
## Household income quartiles, 2021

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Equivalised household income

Assuming all households were the same size, the 'lowest' quartile was the largest income group in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021.

While Household Income is a useful measure, it is difficult to tell if changes over time and between geographic areas are due to actual changes in income levels, or due to changes in household size and composition. For example, an increase in lower income households could be due to job losses in key economic sectors, or simply due to decreasing household size as adult children leave home.

Equivalised Household Income puts all households on an equal footing independent of household size and composition to enable a true comparison between areas and over time. It is an indicator of the income resource available to a household of standard size and is the best measure of the changing economic fortunes of households living in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part).

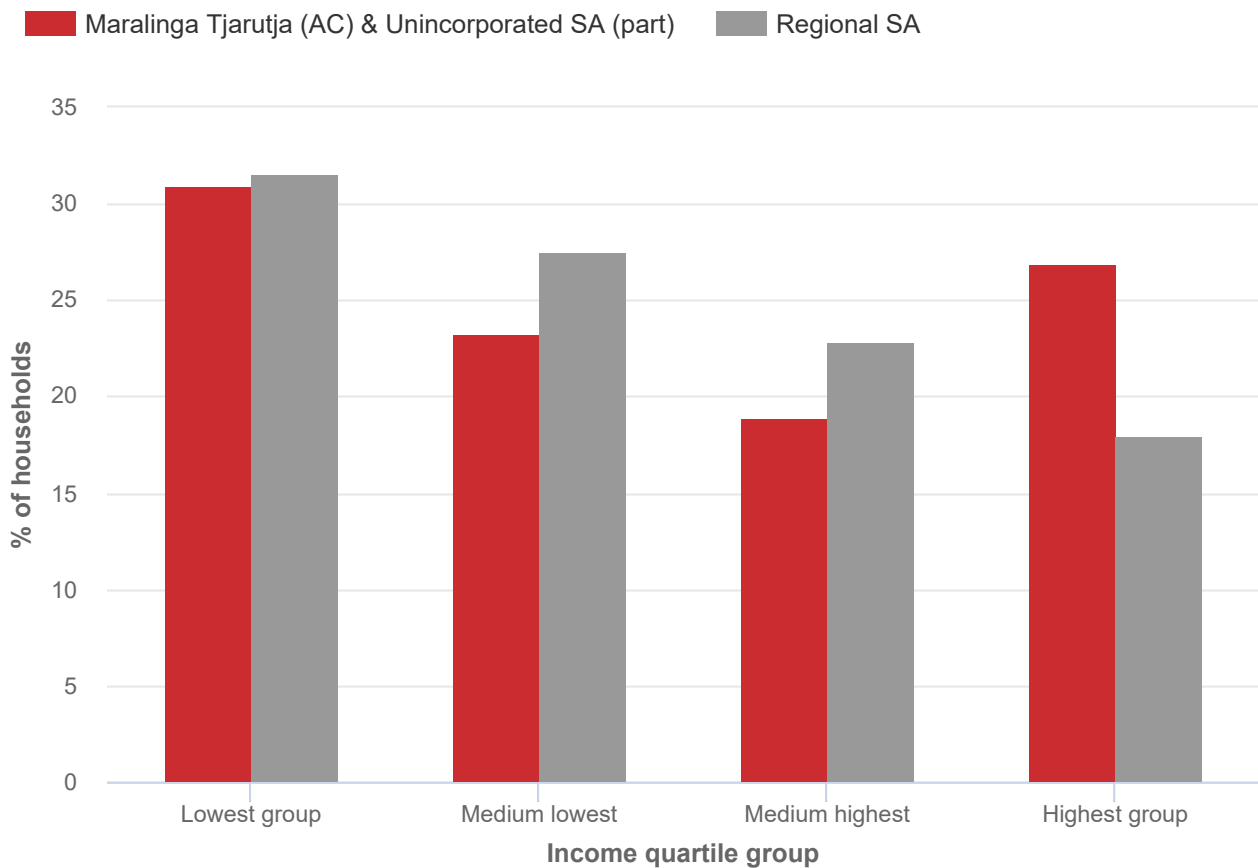

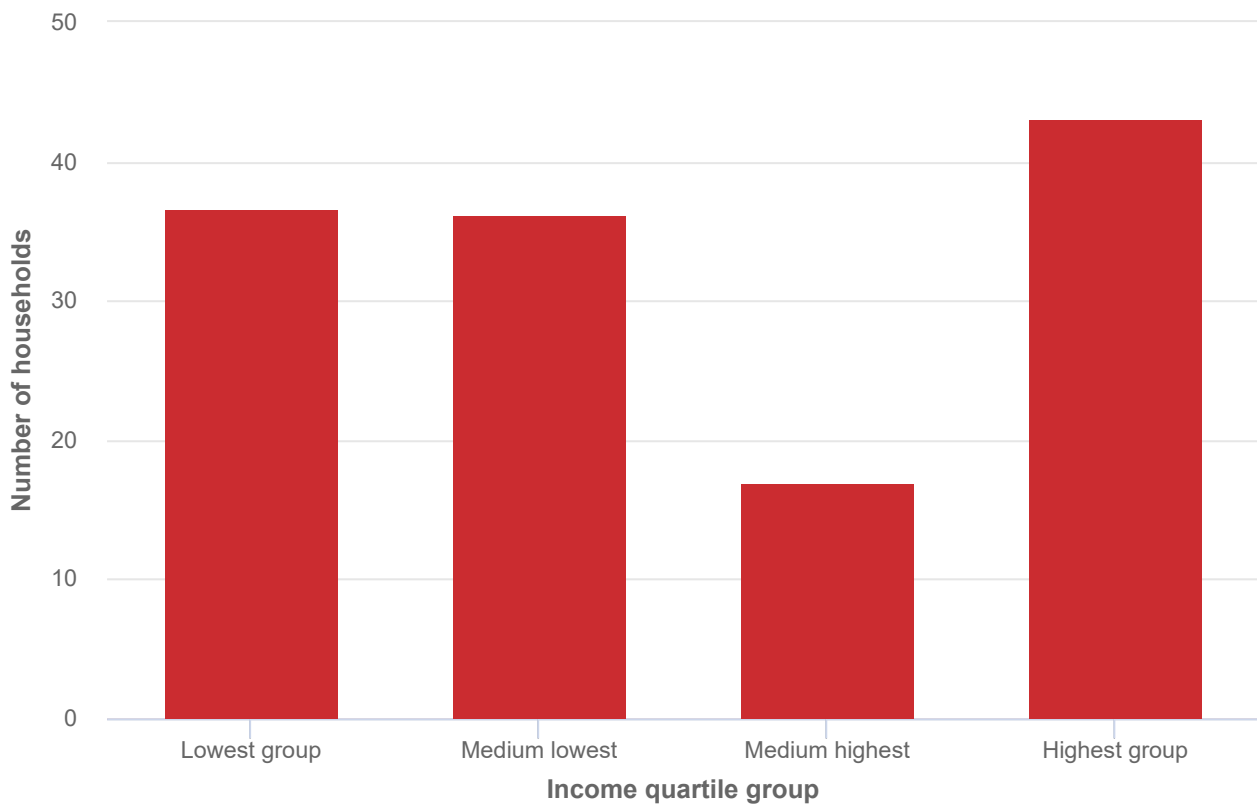
## Equivalised household income quartiles, 2021

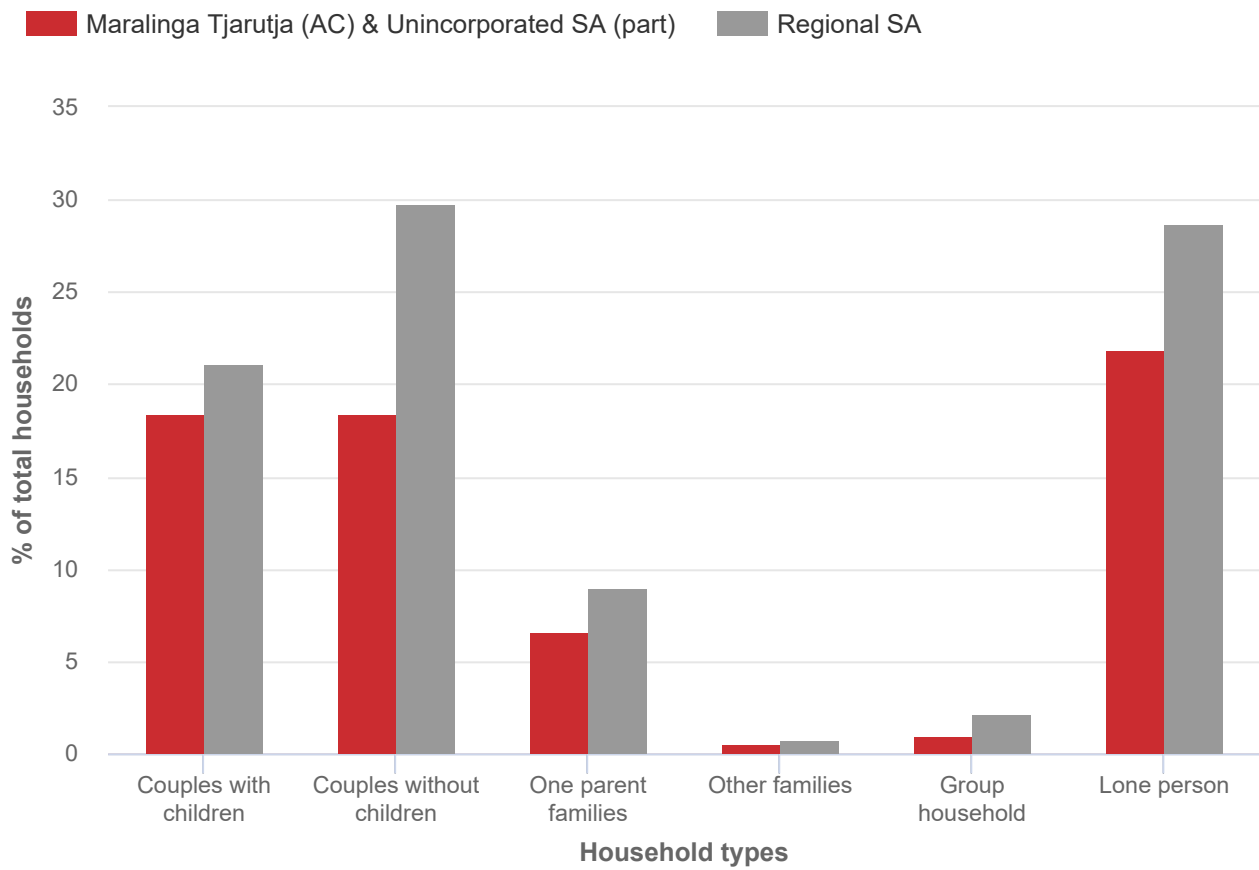

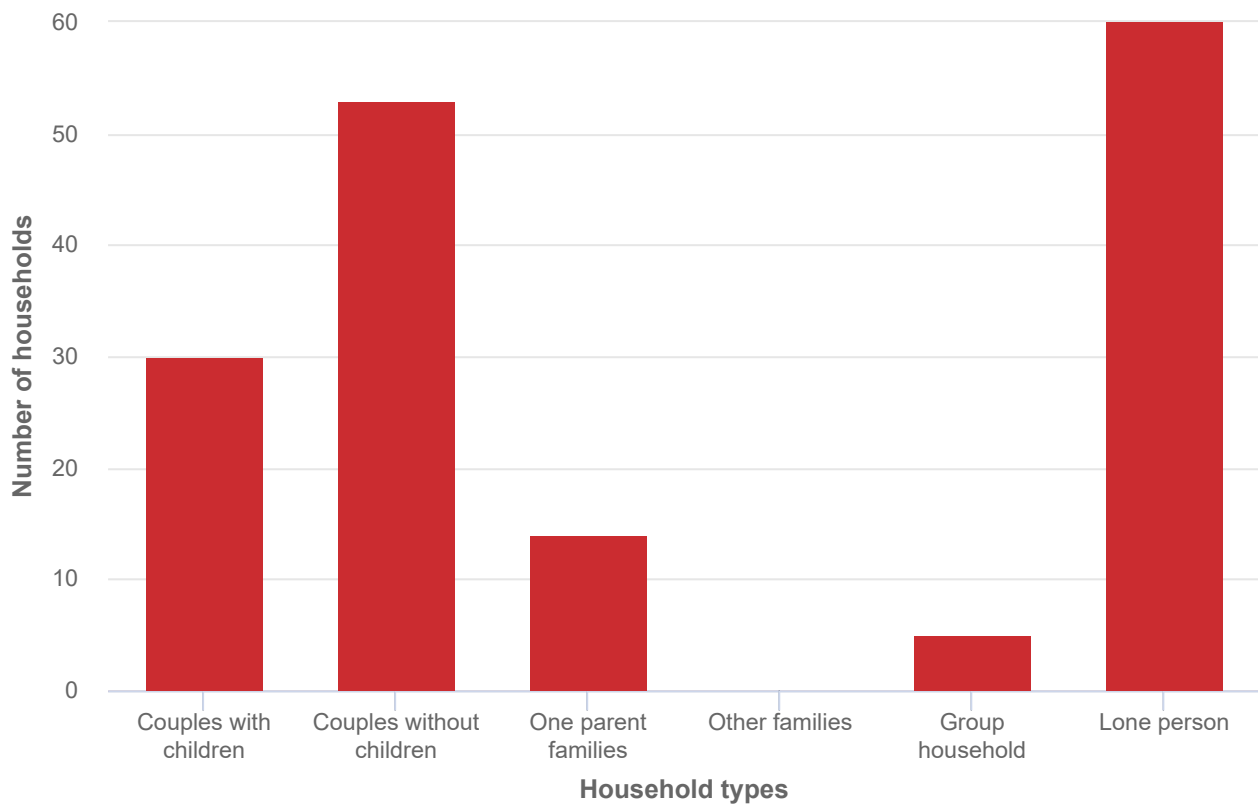
## Household type, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the household/family types in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a lower proportion of couple families with child(ren) as well as a lower proportion of one-parent families. Overall, 18.4% of total families were couple families with child(ren), and 6.6% were one-parent families, compared with 21.2% and 9.0% respectively for Regional SA.

There were a lower proportion of lone person households and a lower proportion of couples without children. Overall, the proportion of lone person households was 21.9% compared to 28.7% in Regional SA while the proportion of couples without children was 18.4% compared to 29.8% in Regional SA.

## Households with children

There are 35 couples with young children in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021, comprising 6.8% of households.

Households with Children require different services and facilities than other household types, and their needs change as both adults and children age. When many families in an area are at the same stage in their individual lifecycles, it creates a suburb lifecycle. Knowing where a suburb is in a cycle of change helps planners make evidence-based decisions about the demand for services both now and in the future.

For Households with Children in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), life stage is based on the age of children in the household. The age of the parent(s) is not taken into account.

- **Young children:** Children aged under 15 only
- **Mixed age children:** One or more children under 15 and one or more children over 15 (must have 2 or more children)
- **Older children:** Children aged 15 and over only

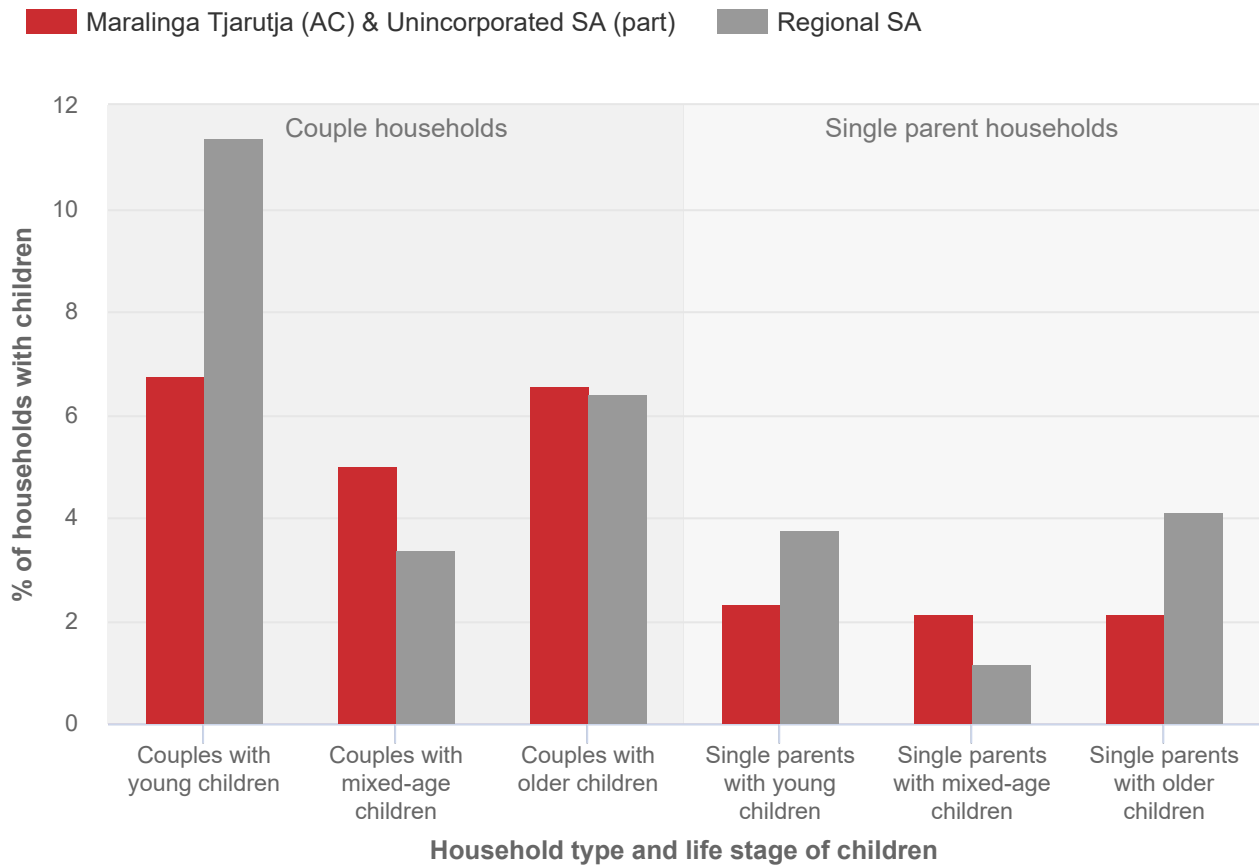

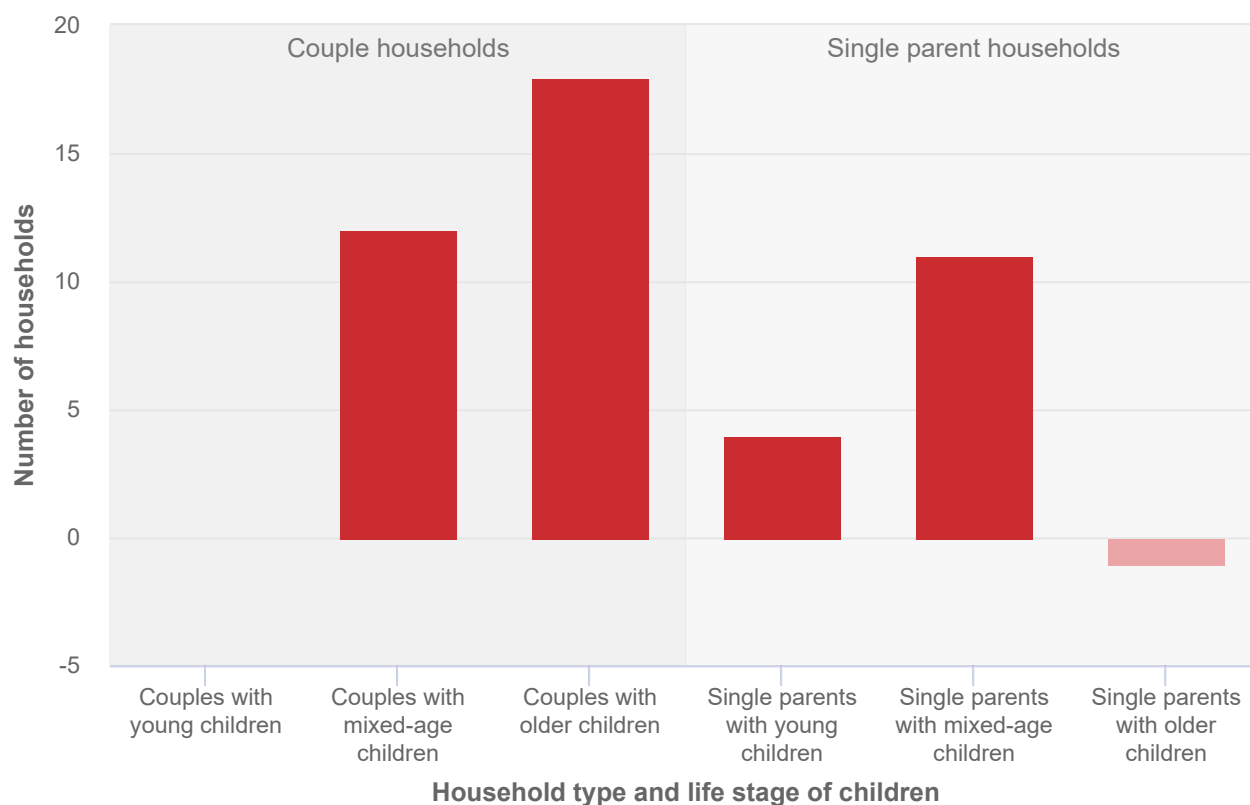
## Households with children, 2021

Analysis of the families with children in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a smaller proportion of couples with young children, and a similar proportion of couples with older children.

Overall, 6.8% of total households with children were couple with young children, and 6.6% were couples with older children, compared with 11.4% and 6.4% respectively for Regional SA.

There were a smaller proportion of single parent households with young children and a smaller proportion of single parent households with older children. Overall, the proportion of single parent households with young children was 2.3% compared to 3.8% in Regional SA while the proportion of single parent households with older children was 2.1% compared to 4.1% in Regional SA.

## Emerging groups

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of households with children increased by 44 households or 51.8%.

## Households without children

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), older couples without children account for 3% of total households in 2021.

Households without Children include couples without children and lone person households. They require different services depending on the age of the people in the households. For example young couples who have not had children (yet) compared to older "empty nester" couples whose children may have left home.

For Households without Children in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), life stage is based on the age of the household reference person (usually person 1 on the Census form):

- **Young:** Aged 15-44
- **Middle-aged:** Aged 45-64
- **Older:** Aged 65 and over

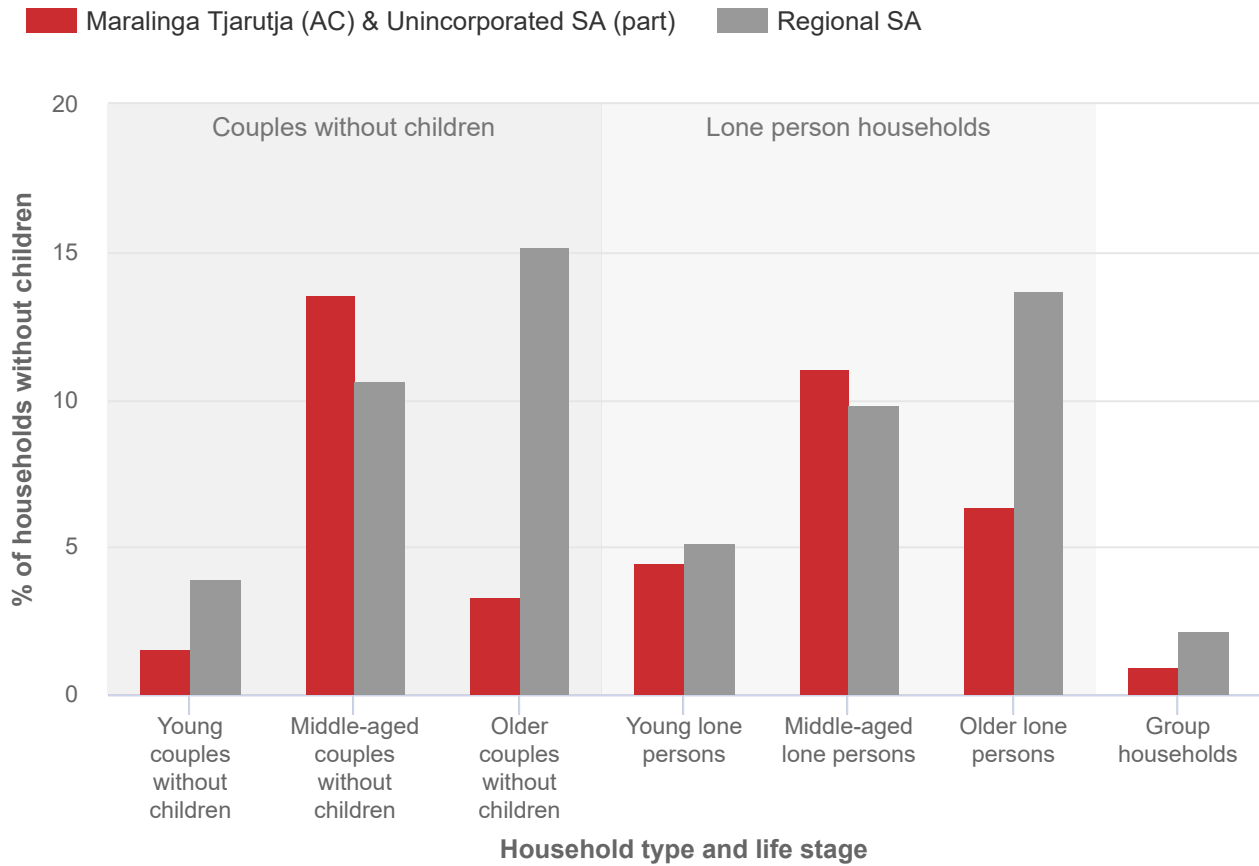

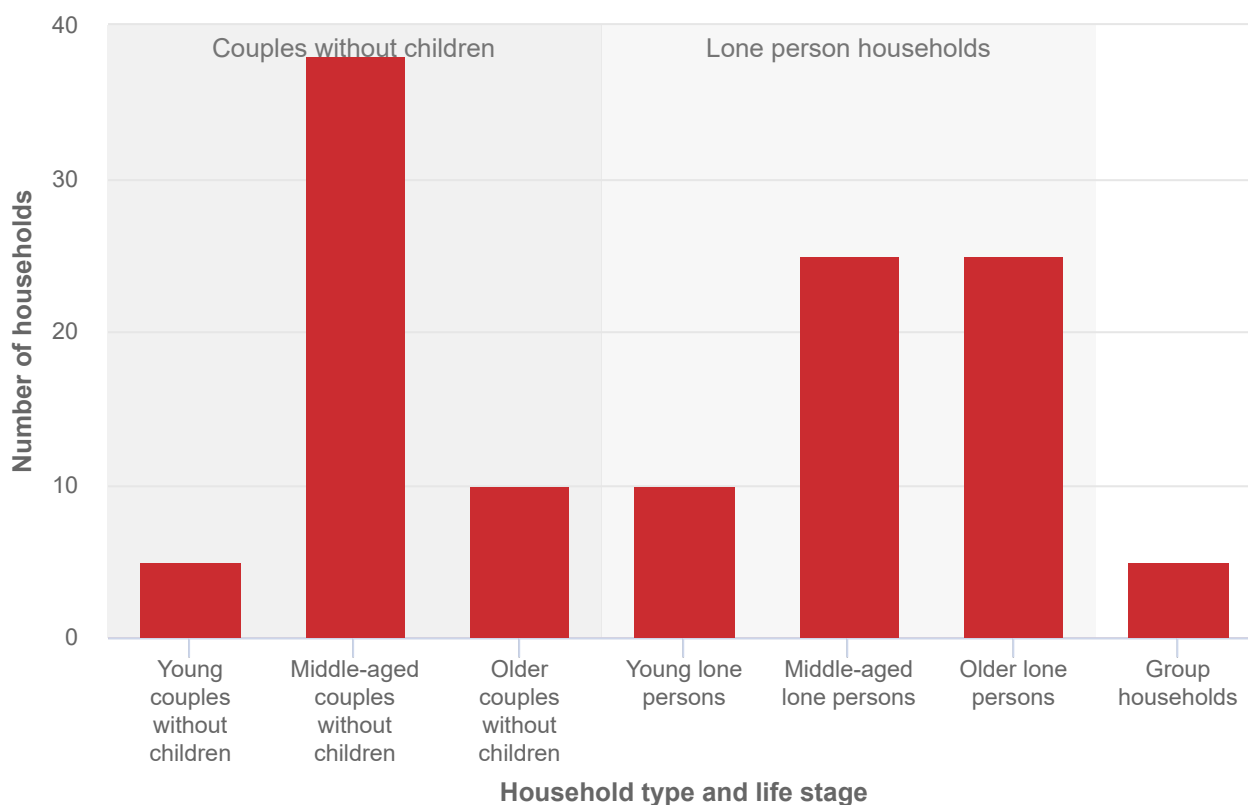
## Households without children, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the households without children in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a smaller proportion of young couples without children, a larger proportion of middle-aged couples without children, and a smaller proportion of older couples without children.

In addition, there were a smaller proportion of young lone person households, a larger proportion of middle-aged lone person households, and a smaller proportion of older lone person households.

## Emerging groups

Between 2016 and 2021, the number of households without children increased by 118.

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Household size

In 2021, 33% of households in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) contained only one person, compared with 31.3% in Regional SA, with the most dominant household size being 1 person per household.

The size of households in general follows the life-cycle of families. Households are usually small at the stage of relationship formation (early marriage), and then increase in size with the advent of children. They later reduce in size again as these children reach adulthood and leave home. Household size can also be influenced by a lack (or abundance) of affordable housing. Overseas migrants and indigenous persons often have a tradition of living with extended family members which significantly affects household size.

Household size in Australia has generally declined since the 1970s, but the rate of decline has slowed in recent years.

An increasing household size in an area may indicate a lack of affordable housing opportunities for young people, an increase in the birth rate or an increase in family formation in the area. A declining household size may indicate children leaving the area when they leave home, an increase in retirees settling in the area, or an attraction of young singles and couples to the area.

For greater insight, Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s Household Size data should be viewed in conjunction with Household Summary, Age Structure, Dwelling Type, Household Income and Language Spoken at Home.

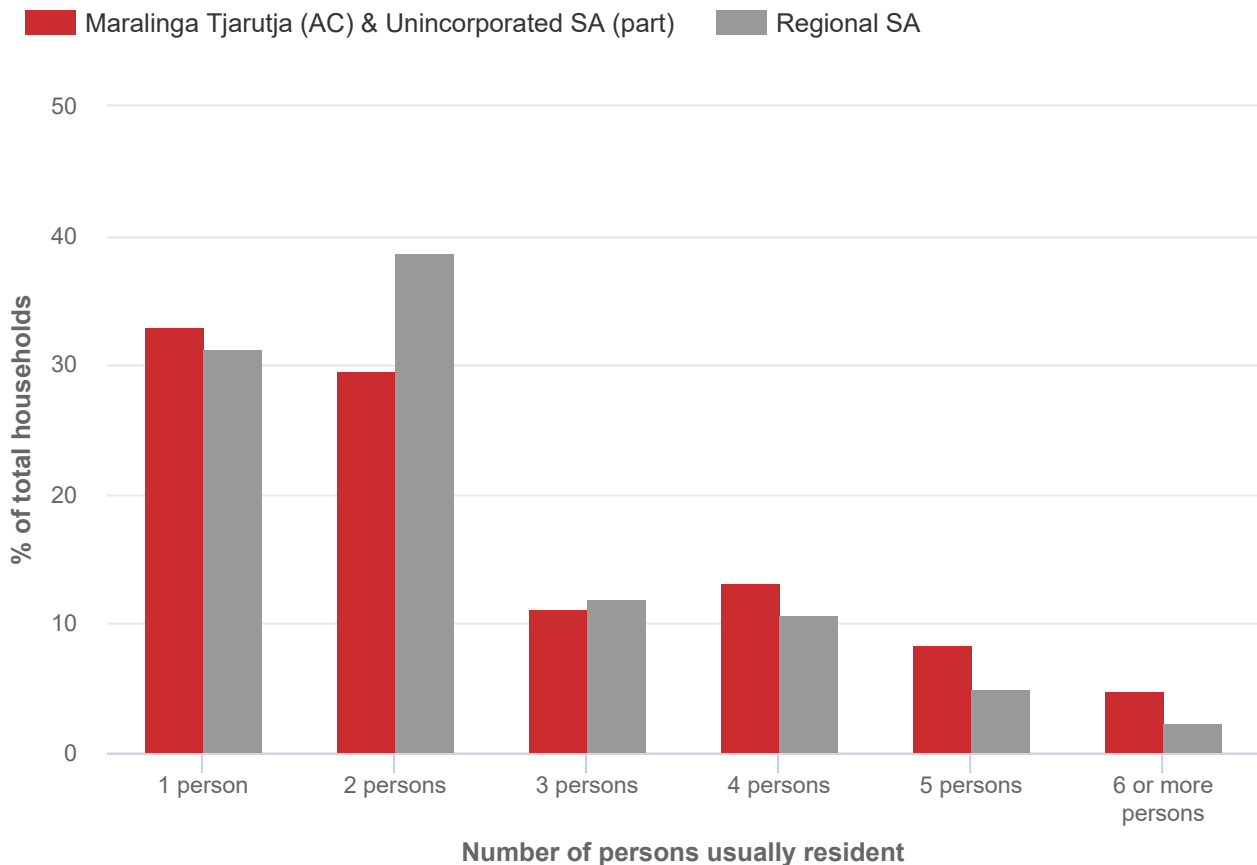

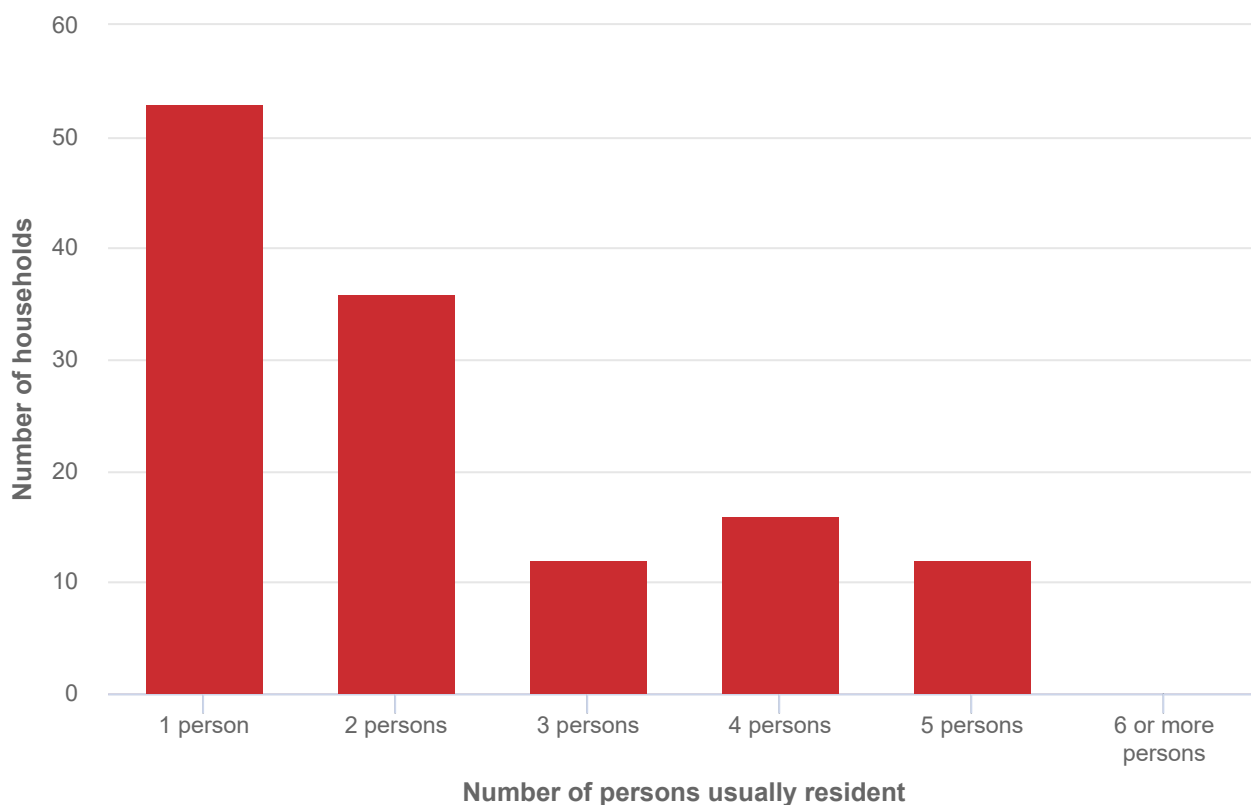
### Household size, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the number of persons usually resident in a household in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) compared with Regional SA shows that there were a higher proportion of lone person households, and a higher proportion of larger households (those with 4 persons or more). Overall there were 32.9% of lone person households, and 26.3% of larger households, compared with 31.3% and 18.0% respectively for Regional SA.

The major differences in the household size for Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of households with 5 persons usually resident (8.4% compared to 5.0%)
- A *larger* percentage of households with 4 persons usually resident (13.2% compared to 10.7%)
- A *larger* percentage of households with 6 or more persons usually resident (4.8% compared to 2.3%)
- A *smaller* percentage of households with 2 persons usually resident (29.6% compared to 38.7%)

Information on blended and intact families can be an indicator of the level of family breakup and repartnering within the area, and a potential indicator of socio-economic disadvantage. Family blending only applies to couple families with children. 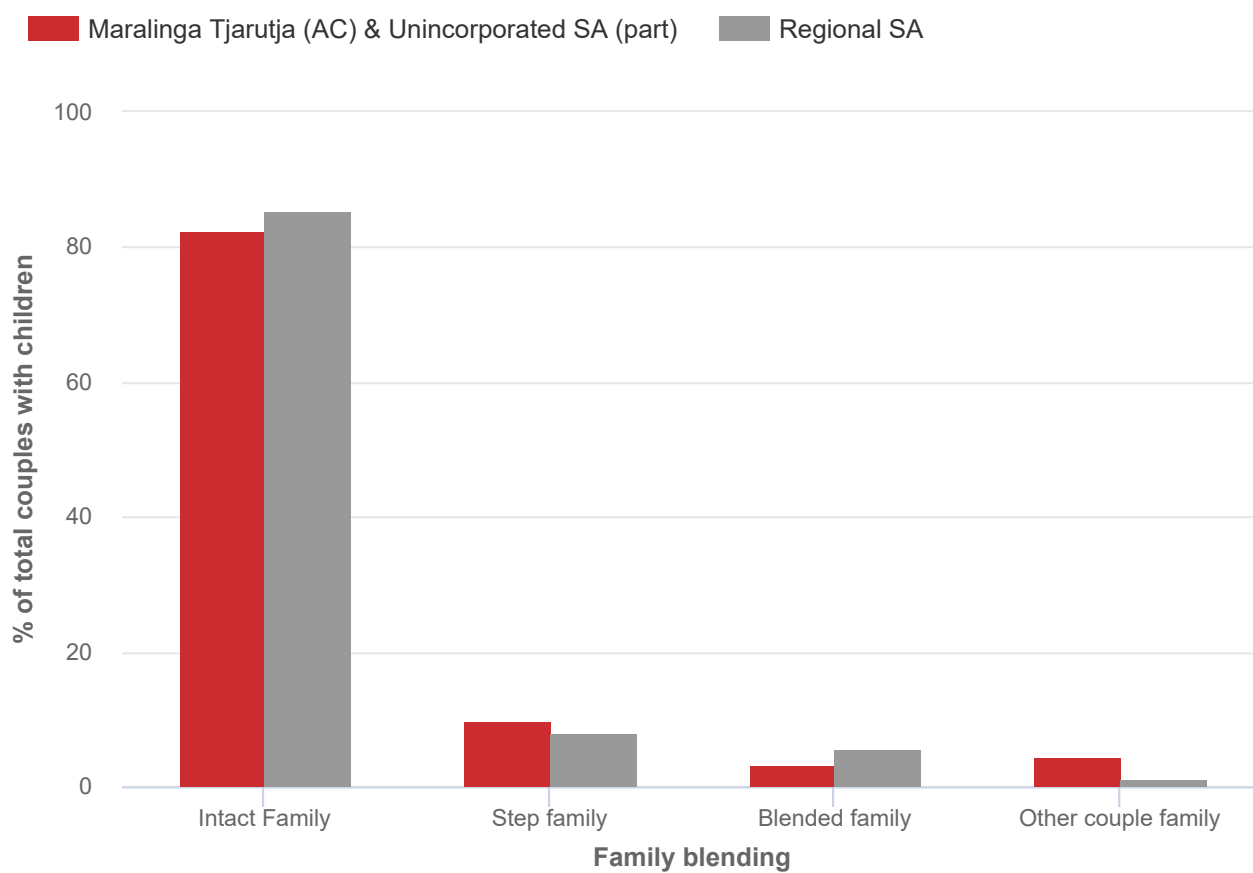

## Family blending, 2021

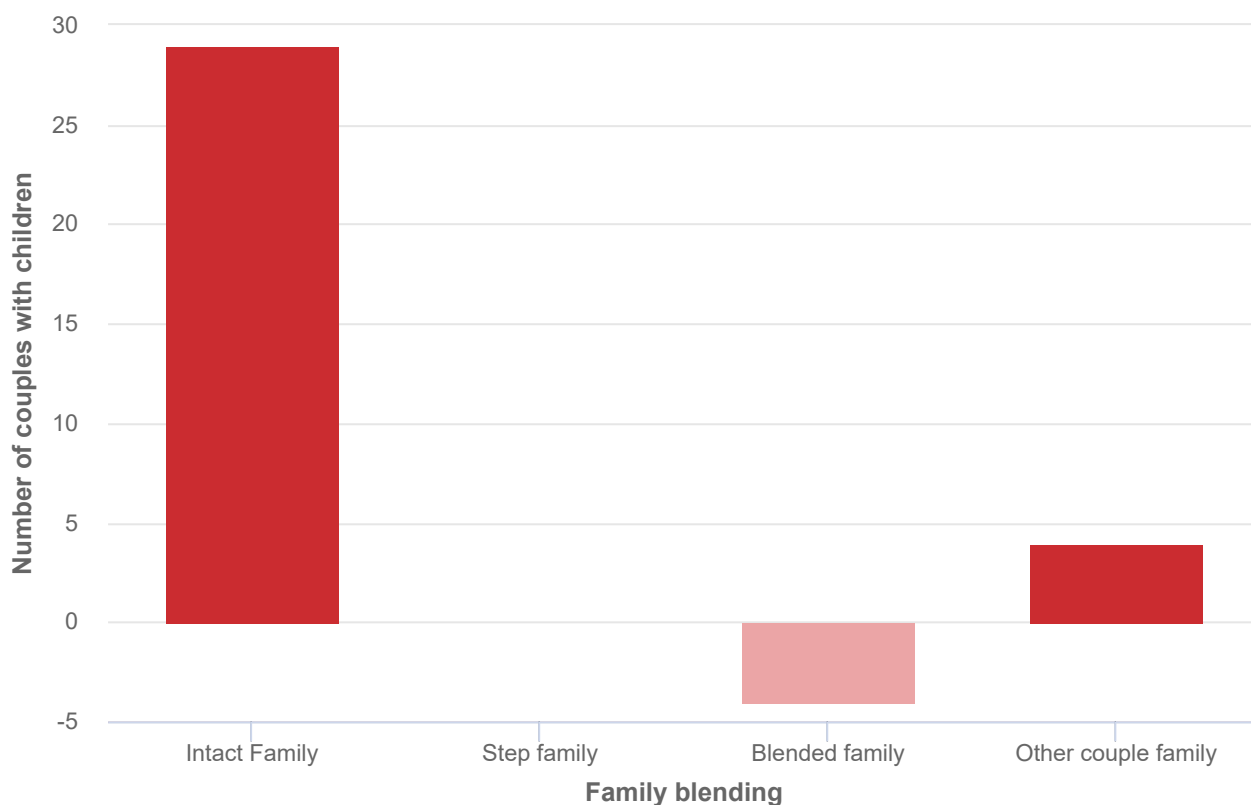

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the family blending in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a higher proportion of step families as well as a higher proportion of blended families. Overall, 9.8% of total couple families with children were step families, and 3.3% were blended families, compared with 7.9% and 5.5% respectively for Regional SA.

There were a higher proportion of other families and a lower proportion of couples without children. Overall, the proportion of other families was 4.3% compared to 1.1% in Regional SA while the proportion of intact families was 82.6% compared to 85.5% in Regional SA.

## Emerging groups

The number of couple families with children in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) increased by 29 between 2016 and 2021.

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Dwelling type

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), 2.7% of the dwellings were medium or high density, compared to 11% in Regional SA.

Dwelling Type is an important determinant of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s residential role and function. A greater concentration of higher density dwellings is likely to attract more young adults and smaller households, often renting. Larger, detached or separate dwellings are more likely to attract families and prospective families. The residential built form often reflects market opportunities or planning policy, such as building denser forms of housing around public transport nodes or employment centres.

Dwelling Type statistics should be viewed in conjunction with Household Size, Household Types, Housing Tenure and Age Structure for a more complete picture of the housing market in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part).

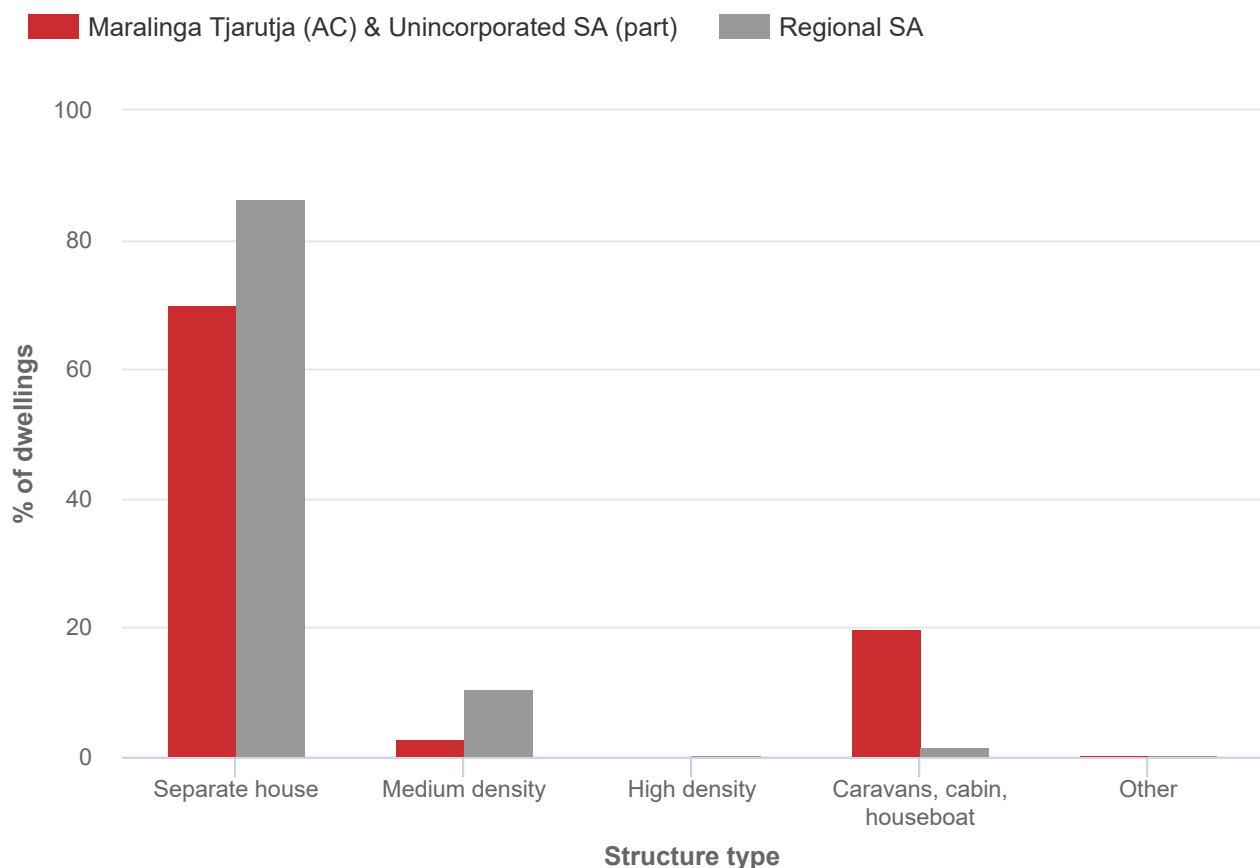

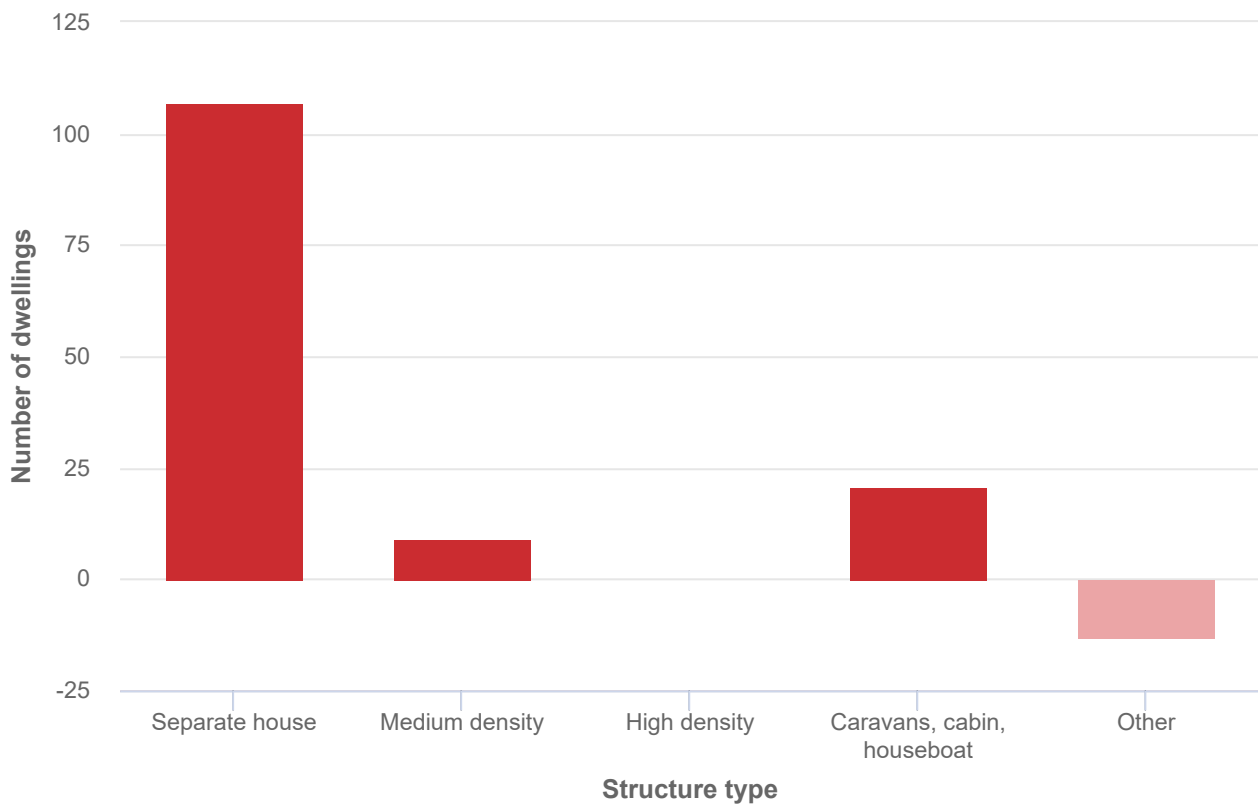
## Dwelling structure, 2021

## Dominant groups

In 2021, there were 458 separate houses in the area, 18 medium density dwellings, and no high density dwellings. In addition, there were 129 caravans/cabins/houseboats in the area.

Analysis of the types of dwellings in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 shows that 69.8% of all dwellings were separate houses; 2.7% were medium density dwellings, and 0% were in high density dwellings, compared with 86.5%, 10.6%, and 0.2% in the Regional SA respectively.

In 2021, a total of 78.9% of the dwellings in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) were occupied on Census night, compared to 79.2% in Regional SA. The proportion of unoccupied dwellings was 19.8%, which is smaller compared to that found in Regional SA (20.5%).

## Emerging groups

The total number of dwellings in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) increased by 150 between 2016 and 2021.

The largest change in the type of dwellings found in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) between 2016 and 2021 was:

- Separate house (+107 dwellings)

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Number of bedrooms per dwelling

Dwellings with 3 bedrooms were the most common in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021.

The Number of Bedrooms in a dwelling is an indicator of the size of dwellings, and when combined with Dwelling Type information, provides insight into the role Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) plays in the housing market. For example, an area of high density dwellings that are predominantly 1-2 bedroom are likely to attract students, single workers and young couples, whereas a high density area with dwellings that are predominantly 2-3 bedroom may attract more empty nesters and some families.

In combination with Household Type and Household Size, the Number of Bedrooms can also indicate issues around housing affordability, overcrowding and other socio-economic factors.

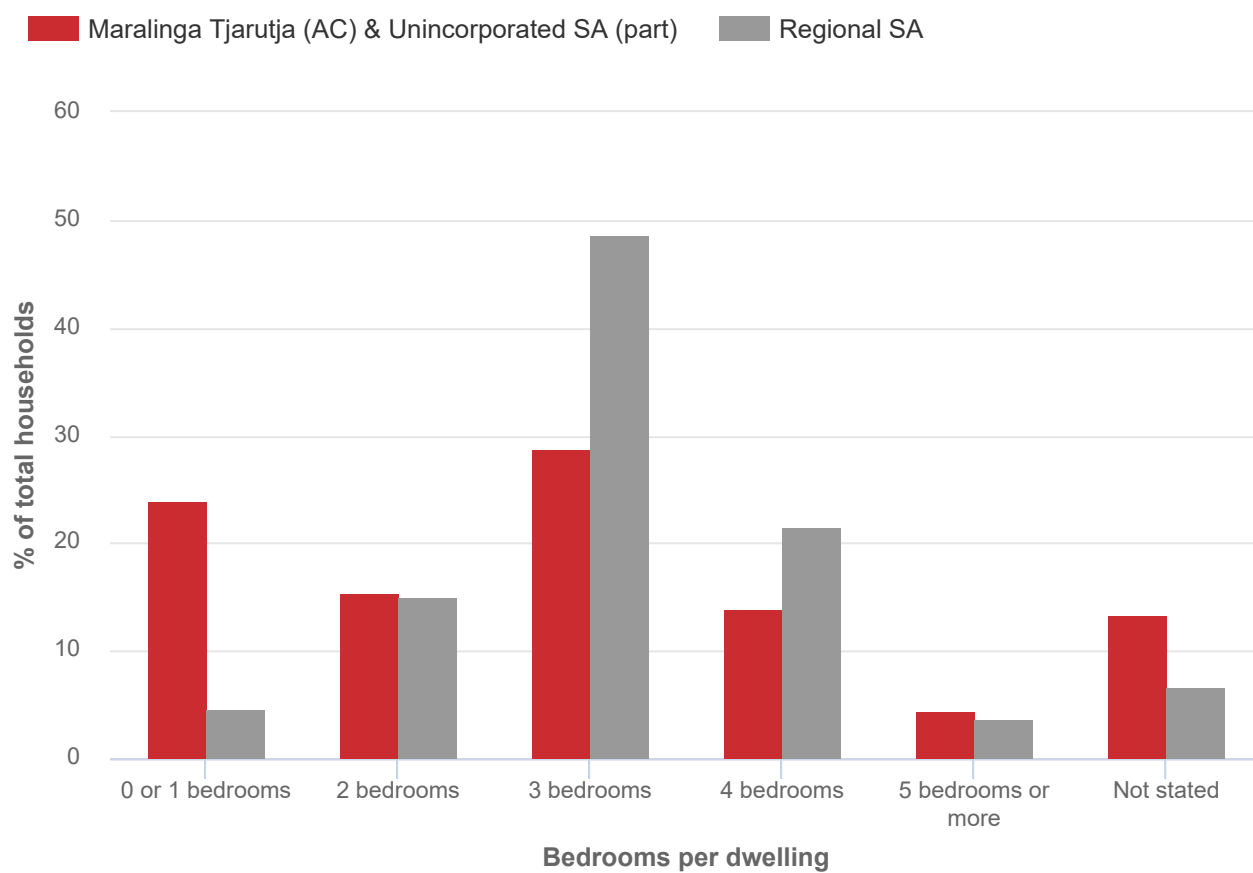

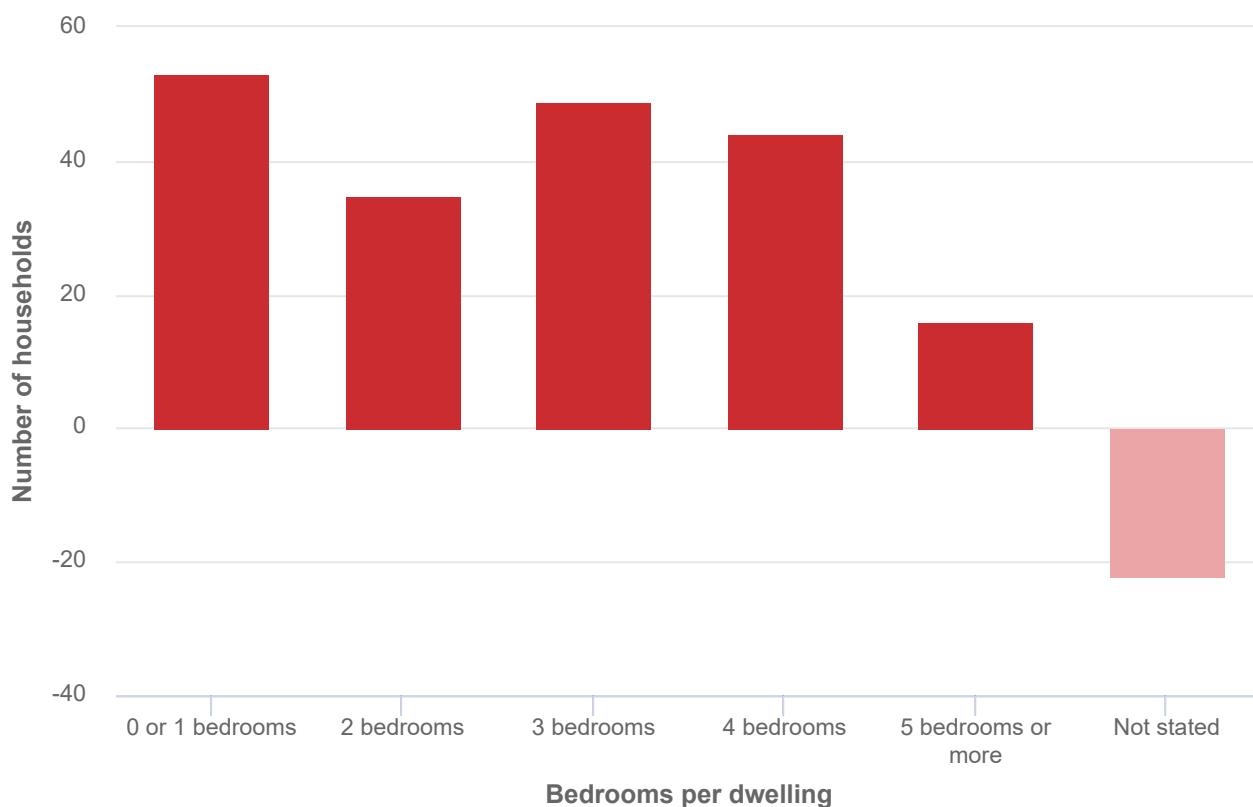
## Number of bedrooms per dwelling, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the number of bedrooms in dwellings in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a higher proportion of dwellings with 2 bedrooms or less, and a lower proportion of dwellings with 4 or more bedrooms.

Overall, 39.4% of households were in dwellings with 2 bedrooms or less, and 18.3% of 4 or more bedroom dwellings, compared with 19.6% and 25.2% for Regional SA respectively.

The major differences between the number of bedrooms per dwelling of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of dwellings with 1 or no bedrooms (includes bedsitters) (24.0% compared to 4.6%)
- A *smaller* percentage of 3 bedroom dwellings (28.8% compared to 48.6%)
- A *smaller* percentage of 4 bedroom dwellings (13.8% compared to 21.5%)

## Internet connection

In 2016, 73 households in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) (21.7%) did not have an internet connection at the dwelling.

**Please note: For the 2021 Census, the ABS dropped the question regarding household internet connection. This page shows data for the 2016 and previous Censuses only.**

An internet connection is now an important utility for most households in Australia. It is increasingly required for accessing essential information and taking part in the digital economy. Australia-wide in 2016, nearly 80% of all households had internet access. However, this decreases with age – seniors are less likely to have internet access at home. The lack of internet access is likely to indicate a level of disadvantage and could be related to socio-economic factors, age, or geographical isolation.

Internet connectivity in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) should be looked at in conjunction with Household Type and Age Structure, as well as Education Levels.

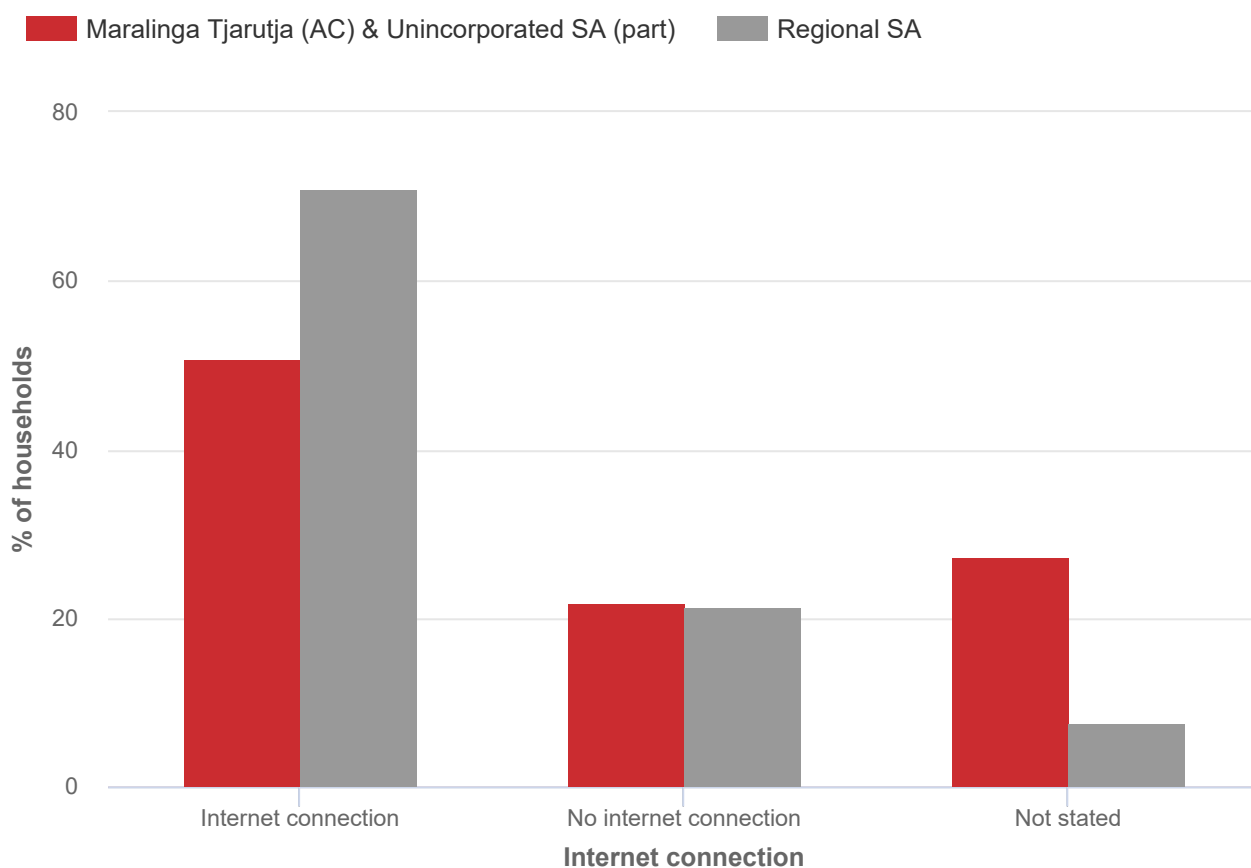

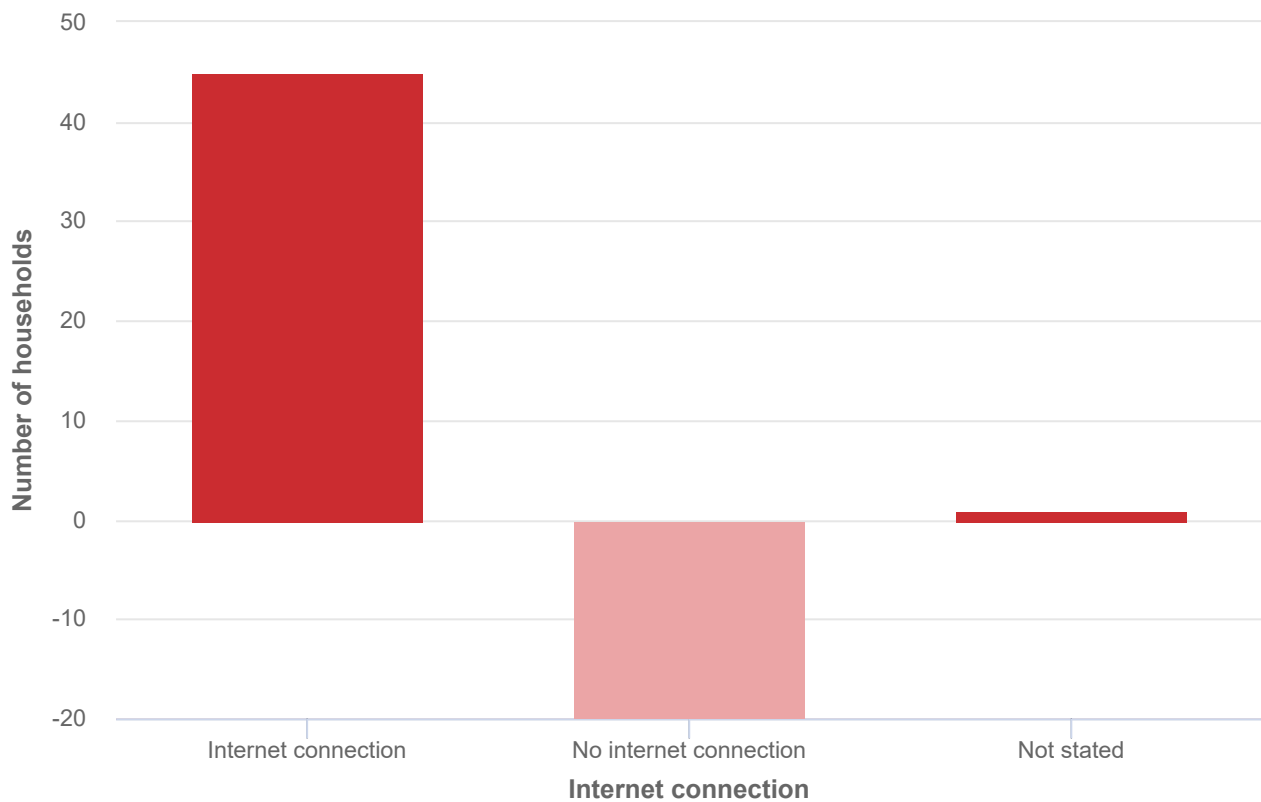
## Type of internet connection, 2016

## Number of cars per household

Analysis of car ownership in 2021, indicates 40% of households in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) had access to two or more motor vehicles, compared to 55% in Regional SA.

The ability of the population to access services and employment is strongly influenced by access to transport. The number of motor vehicles per household in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) quantifies access to private transport and will be influenced by **Age Structure** and **Household Type**, which determine the number of adults present; access to **Public Transport**; distance to shops, services, employment and education; and **Household Income**. Depending on these factors, car ownership can be seen as a measure of advantage or disadvantage, or a neutral socio-economic measure, which impacts on the environment and quality of life.

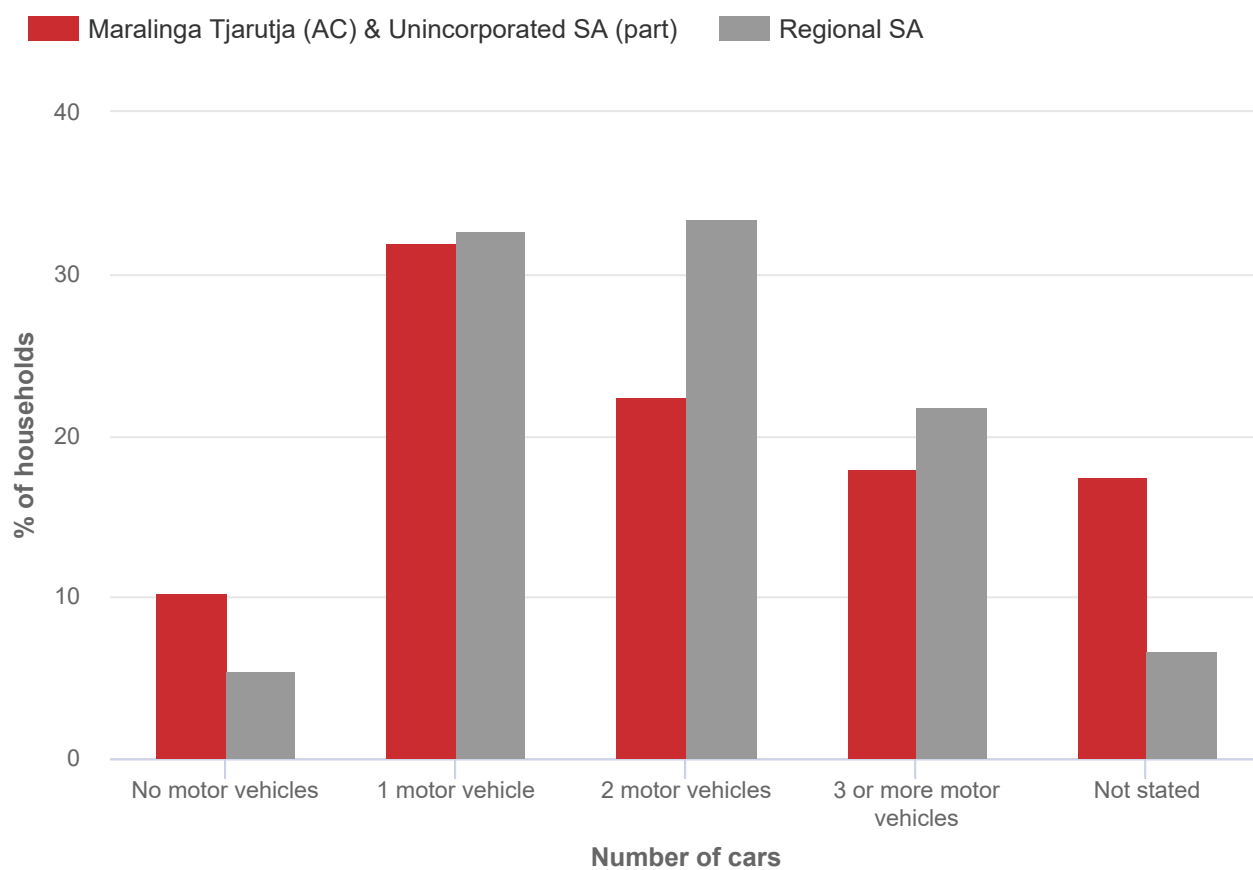

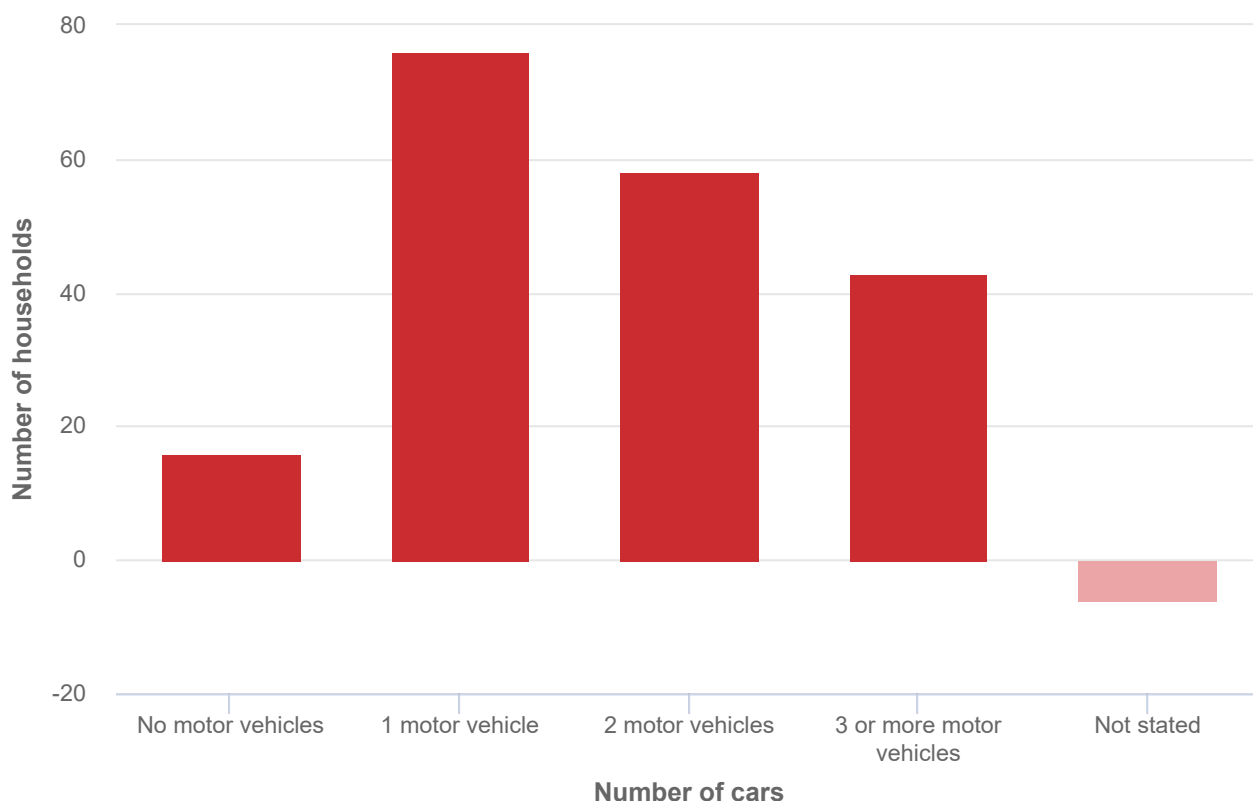
## Car ownership, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the car ownership of the households in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that 72.3% of the households owned at least one car, while 10.3% did not, compared with 88.0% and 5.4% respectively in Regional SA.

Of those that owned at least one vehicle, there was a smaller proportion who owned just one car; a smaller proportion who owned two cars; and a smaller proportion who owned three cars or more.

Overall, 31.9% of the households owned one car; 22.4% owned two cars; and 18.0% owned three cars or more, compared with 32.8%; 33.5% and 21.7% respectively for Regional SA.

The largest changes in the household car ownership in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) between 2016 and 2021 were:

- 1 motor vehicle (+76 households)
- 2 motor vehicles (+58 households)

# Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)

## Housing tenure

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), 45% of households were purchasing or fully owned their home, 13.2% were renting privately, and 19.6% were in social housing in 2021.

Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part)'s Housing Tenure data provides insights into its socio-economic status as well as the role it plays in the housing market. For example, a high concentration of private renters may indicate a transient area attractive to young singles and couples, while a concentration of home owners indicates a more settled area with mature families and empty-nesters (**Household Summary**). Tenure can also reflect built form (**Dwelling Type**), with a significantly higher share of renters in high density housing and a substantially larger proportion of home-owners in separate houses, although this is not always the case.

In conjunction with other socio-economic status indicators in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), Tenure data is useful for analysing housing markets, housing affordability and identifying public housing areas.

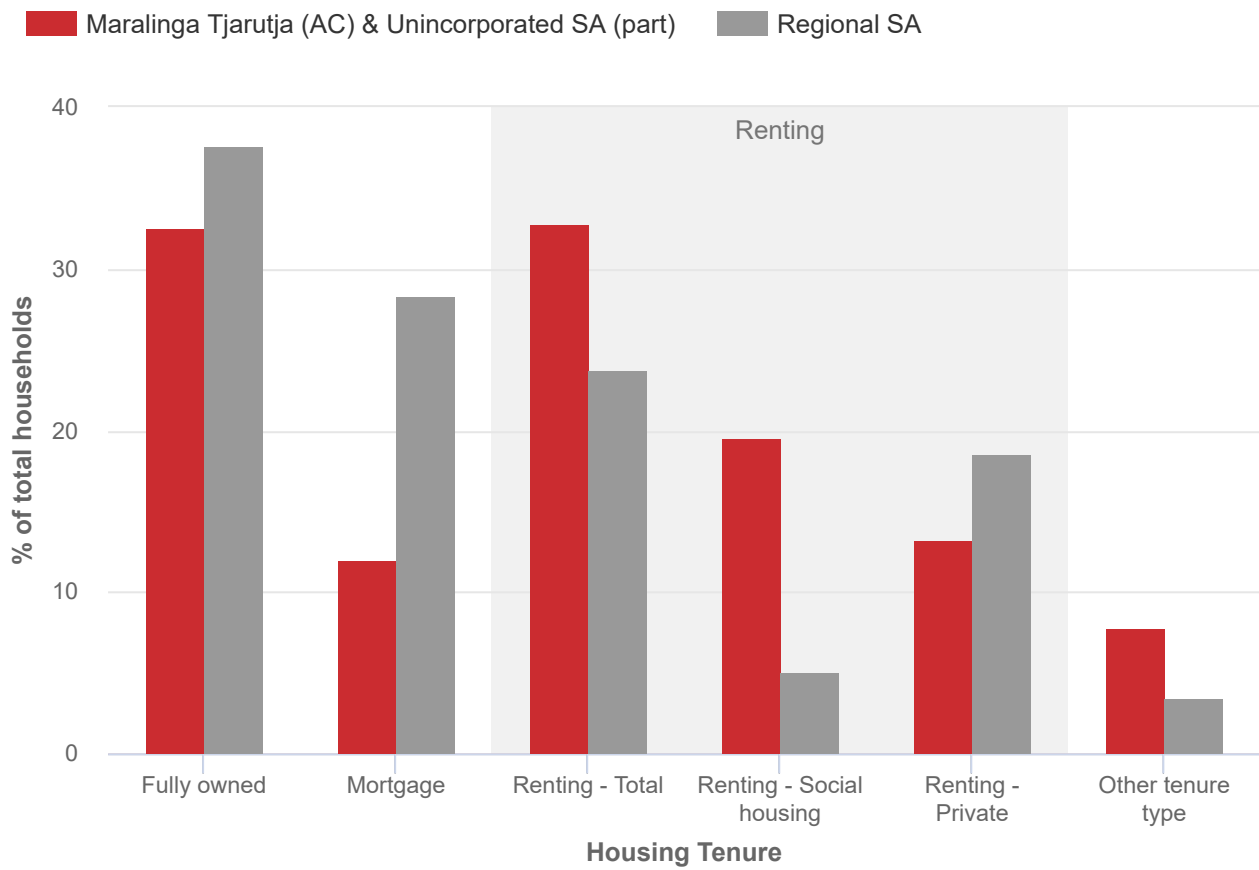

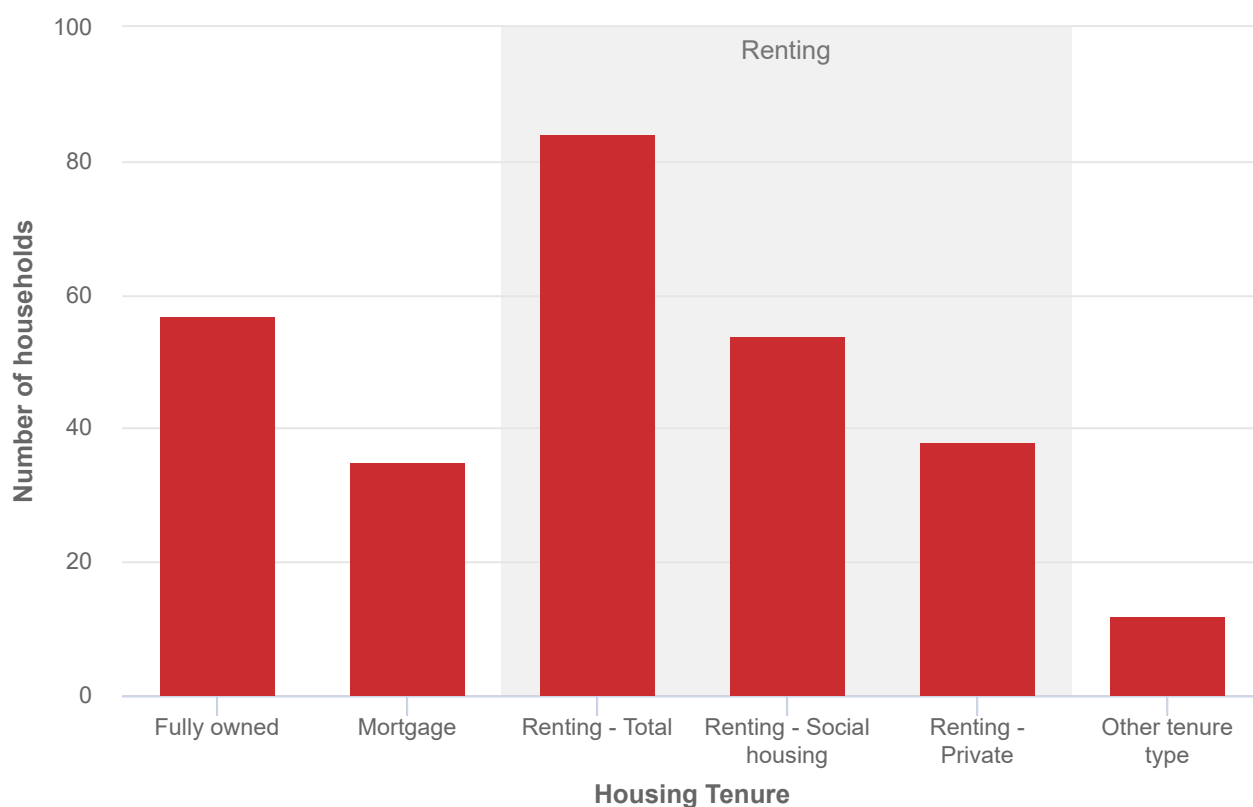
## Housing tenure, 2021

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the housing tenure of households of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) in 2021 compared to Regional SA shows that there was a smaller proportion of households who owned their dwelling; a smaller proportion purchasing their dwelling; and a larger proportion who were renters.

Overall, 32.6% of households owned their dwelling; 12.0% were purchasing, and 32.8% were renting, compared with 37.6%, 28.4% and 23.8% respectively for Regional SA.

## Emerging groups

The largest changes in housing tenure categories for the households in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) between 2016 and 2021 were:

- Fully owned (+57 households)
- Renting - Social housing (+54 households)

## Housing loan repayments

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), 8.6% of households with a mortgage were making high loan repayments of \$2,600 or more per month in 2021.

Mortgage repayments are directly related to house prices in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), length of occupancy and the level of equity of home owners. When viewed with **Household Income** data it may also indicate the level of housing stress households in the community are under. In mortgage belt areas it is expected that households will be paying a higher proportion of their income on their housing compared to well-established areas. First home buyer areas are also likely to have larger mortgages than upgrader areas where households move in with equity from elsewhere.

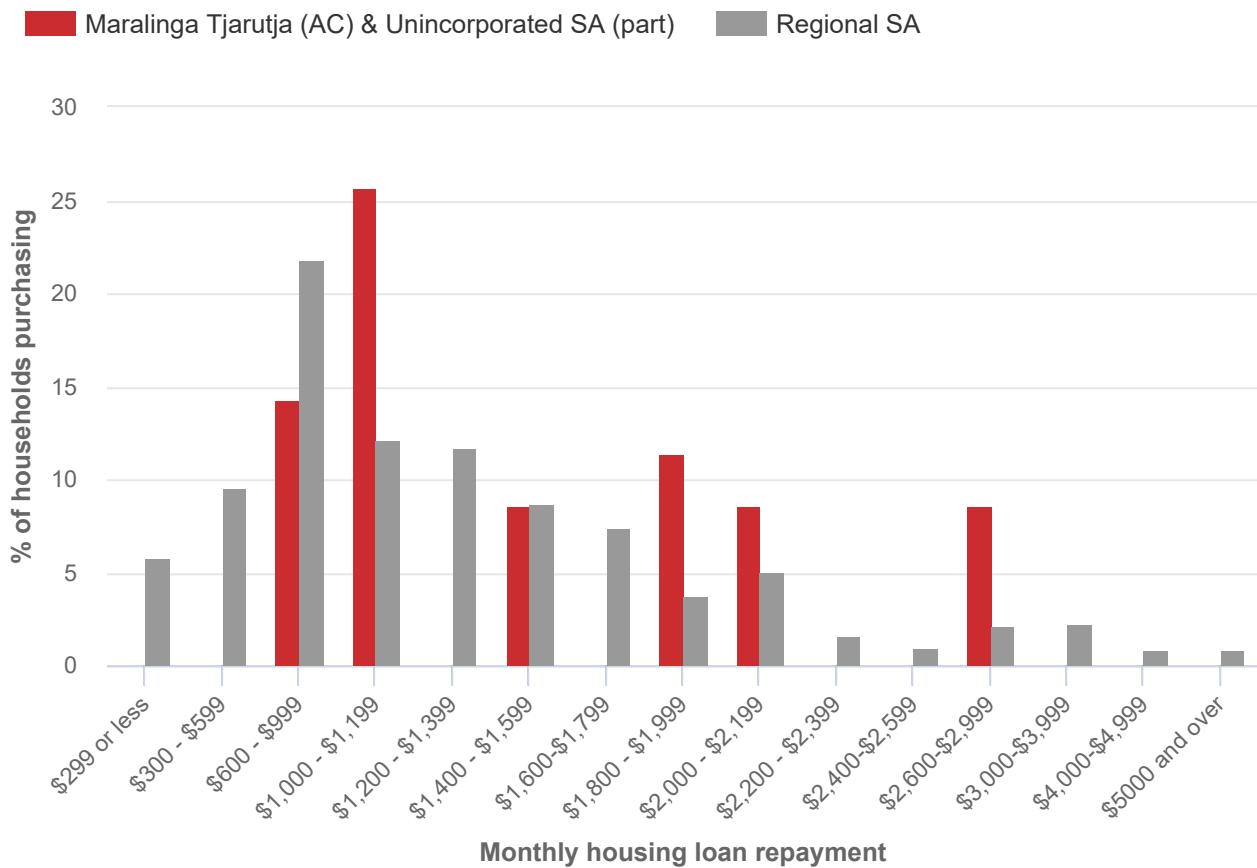

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the monthly housing loan repayments of households in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) compared to Regional SA shows that there was a larger proportion of households paying high mortgage repayments (\$2,600 per month or more), and a smaller proportion of households with low mortgage repayments (less than \$1,200 per month).

Overall, 8.6% of households were paying high mortgage repayments, and 40.0% were paying low repayments, compared with 6.1% and 49.4% respectively in Regional SA.

The major differences between the household loan repayments of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of \$1,000 - \$1,199 (25.7% compared to 12.2%)
- A *larger* percentage of \$1,800 - \$1,999 (11.4% compared to 3.8%)
- A *smaller* percentage of \$1,200 - \$1,399 (0.0% compared to 11.7%)
- A *smaller* percentage of \$300 - \$599 (0.0% compared to 9.6%)

## Housing loan quartiles

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), the 'medium lowest group' was the largest quartile, comprising of 35% of households with mortgages in 2021.

Mortgage repayments in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) are directly related to house prices, length of occupancy and the level of equity of home owners. When viewed with Household Income data it may also indicate the level of housing stress in the community.

The quartile method is the most objective method of comparing change in the mortgage payment profile of a community over time.

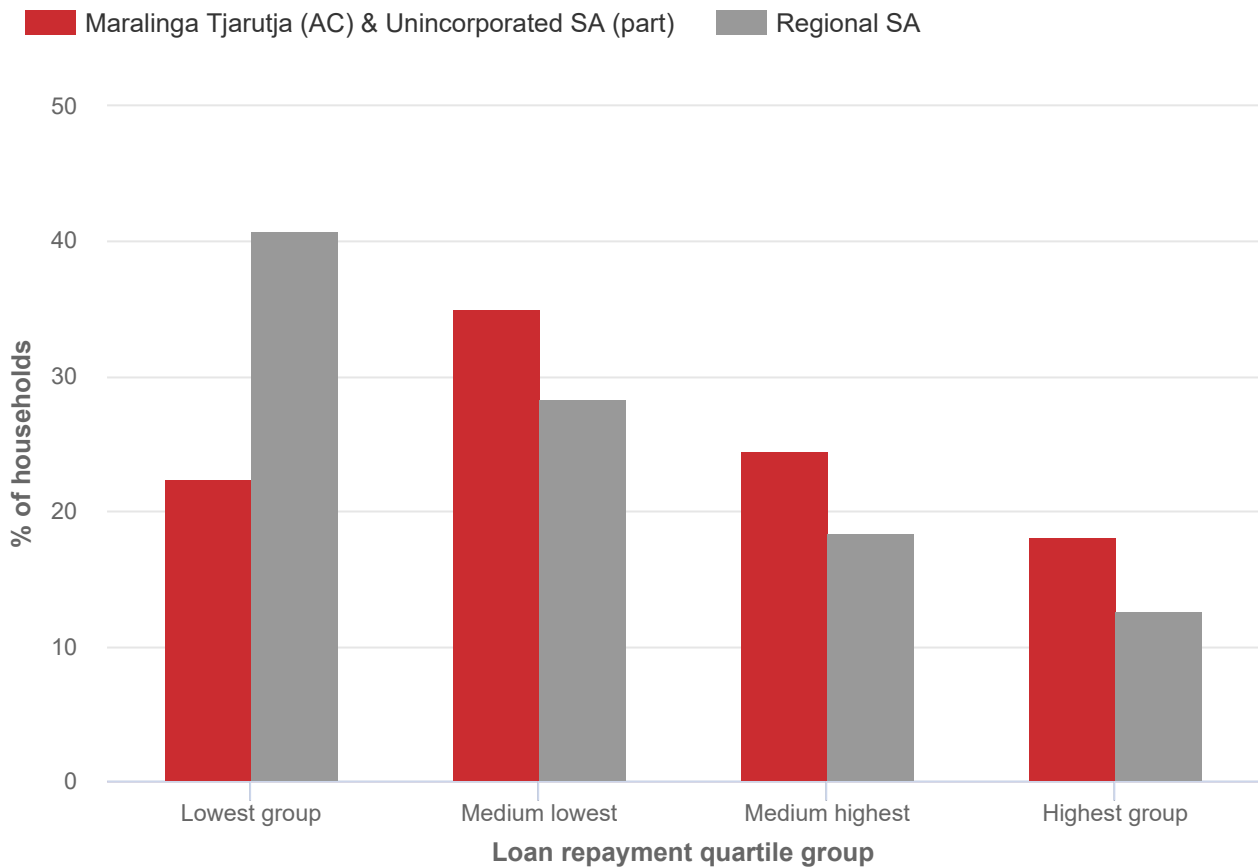

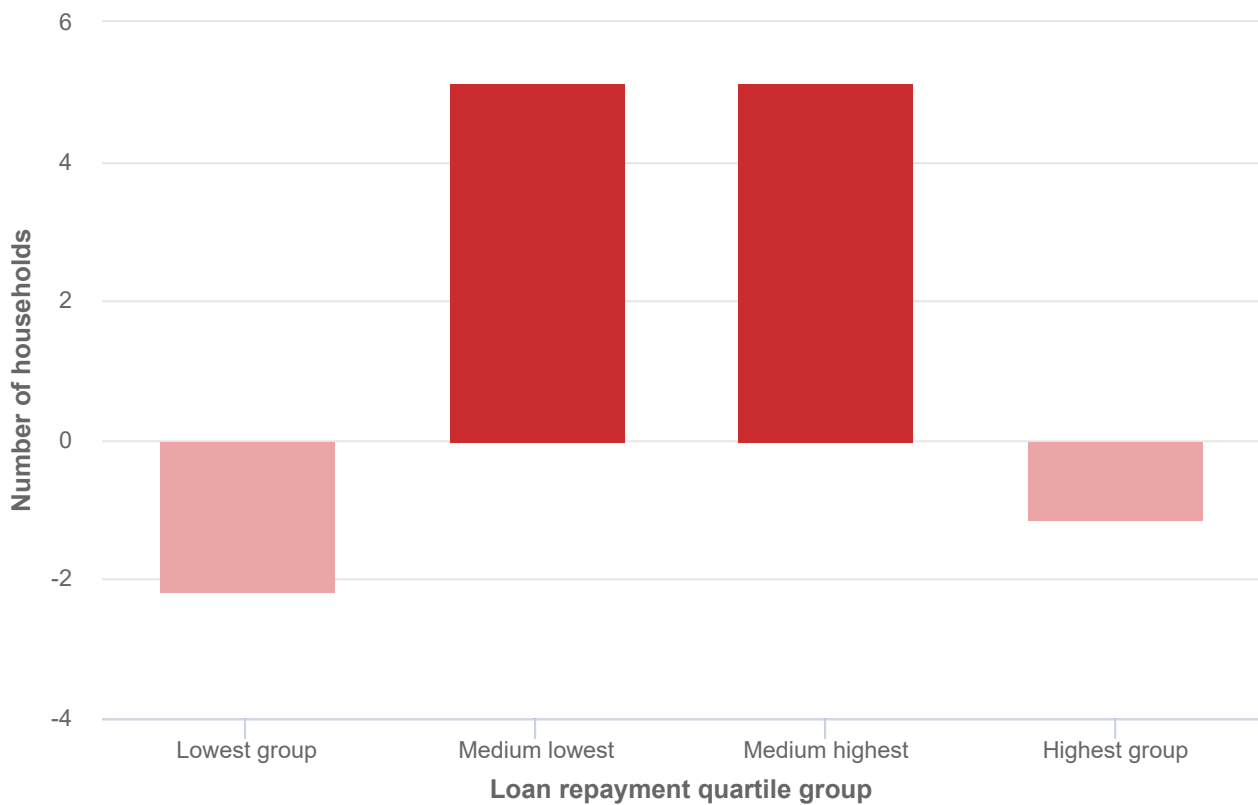
## Housing loan quartiles, 2021

Analysis of the distribution of households by housing loan repayment quartiles in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) compared to Regional SA shows that there was a larger proportion of households in the highest repayment quartile, and a smaller proportion in the lowest repayment quartile.

## Emerging groups

The total number of households with a mortgage in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) decreased by 20 between 2001 and 2021. The most significant change in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) during this period was in the medium lowest quartile which showed an increase of 5 households.

## Housing rental payments

In Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part), 5.1% of renting households were paying \$450 or more per week in rent in 2021.

Rental payments can be a better measure of the cost of housing in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) than mortgage repayments because they are not contingent on length of occupancy or equity in the dwelling.

High rental payments may indicate desirable areas with mobile populations who prefer to rent, or a housing shortage, or gentrification. Low rental payments may indicate public housing (check **Tenure Type**), or areas where low income households move by necessity for a lower cost of living.

Rental payments are not directly comparable over time because of inflation. For comparison of rental payments over time, go to **Housing Rental Quartiles**.

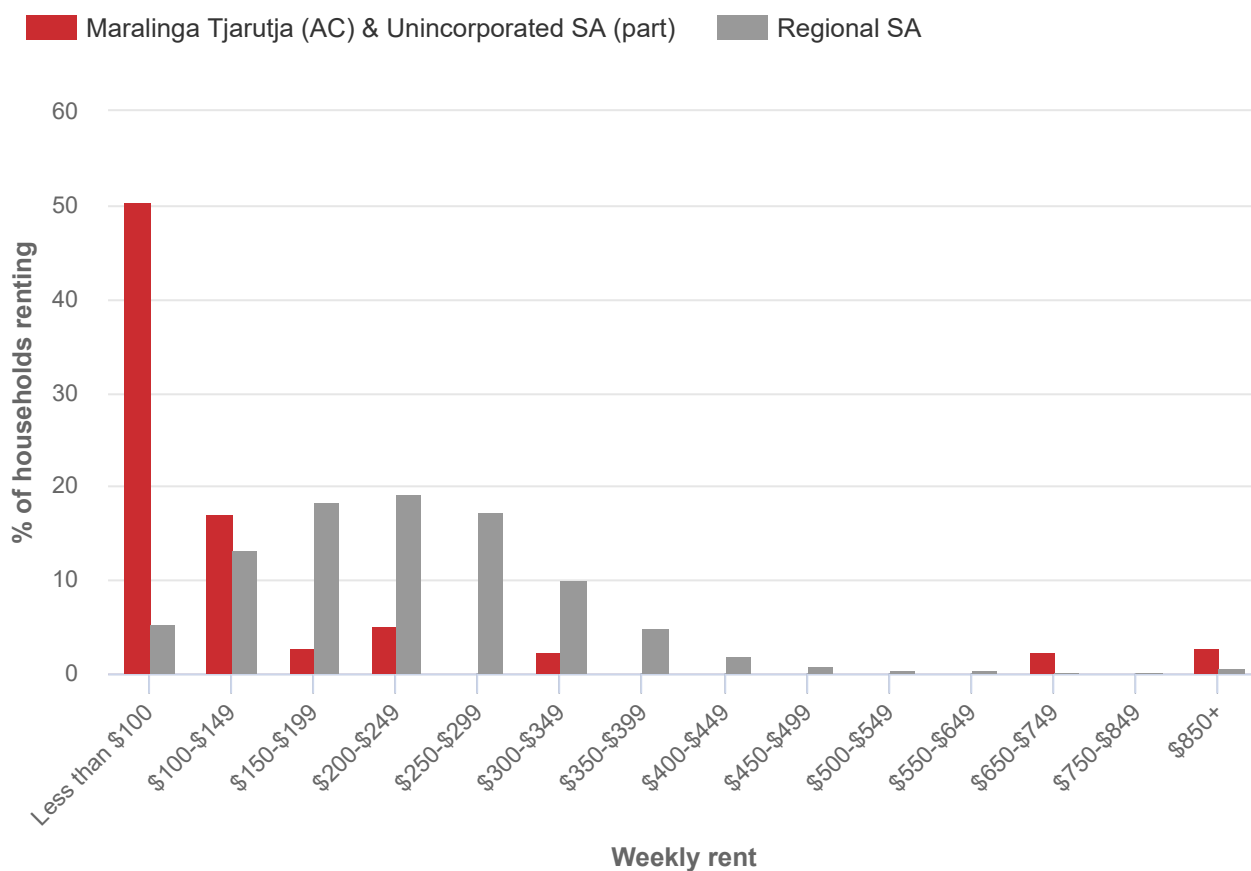

## Dominant groups

Analysis of the weekly housing rental payments of households in Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) compared to Regional SA shows that there was a larger proportion of households paying high rental payments (\$450 per week or more), as well as a larger proportion of households with low rental payments (less than \$250 per week).

Overall, 5.1% of households were paying high rental payments, and 75.4% were paying low payments, compared with 2.7% and 56.3% respectively in Regional SA.

The major differences between the housing rental payments of Maralinga Tjarutja (AC) & Unincorporated SA (part) and Regional SA were:

- A *larger* percentage of Less than \$100 (50.3% compared to 5.4%)
- A *smaller* percentage of \$250-\$299 (0.0% compared to 17.3%)
- A *smaller* percentage of \$150-\$199 (2.9% compared to 18.4%)
- A *smaller* percentage of \$200-\$249 (5.1% compared to 19.1%)

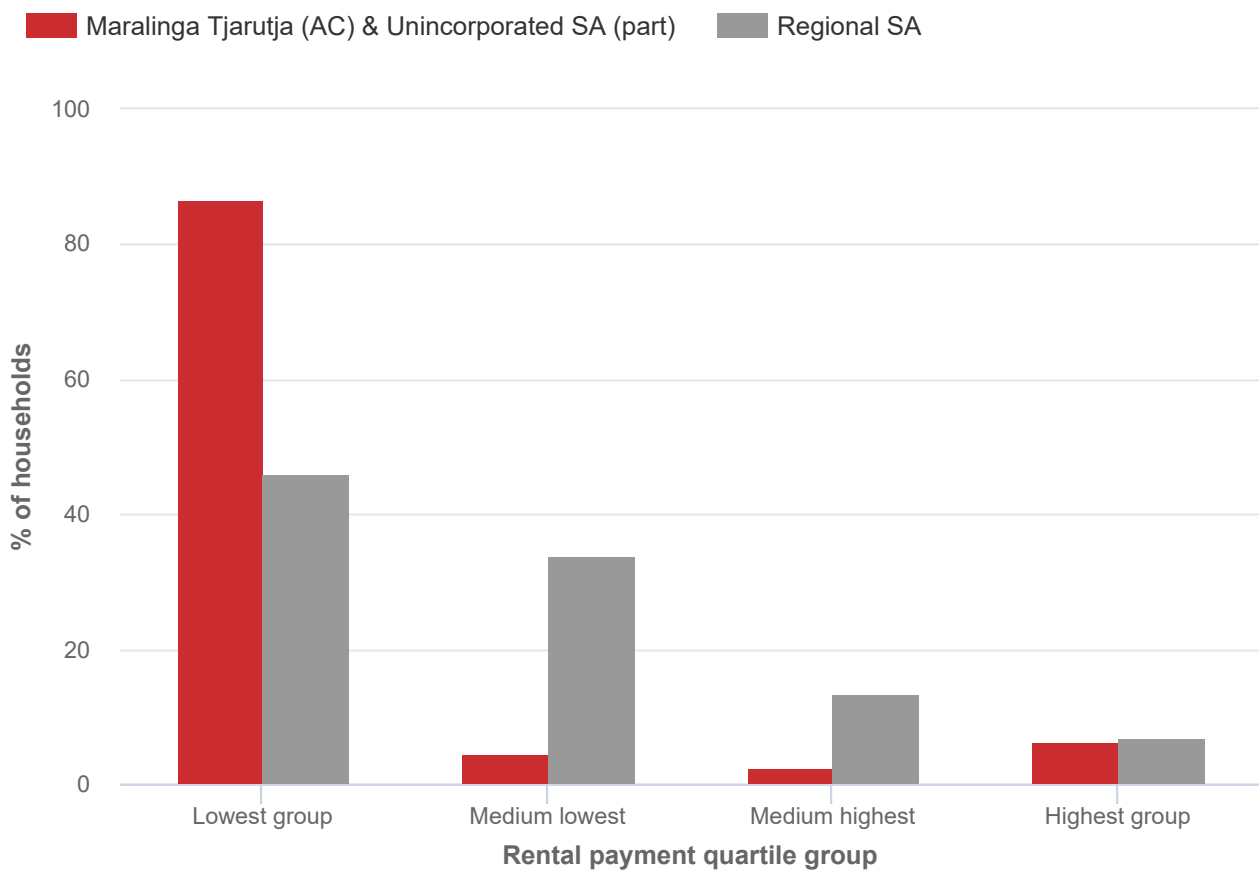

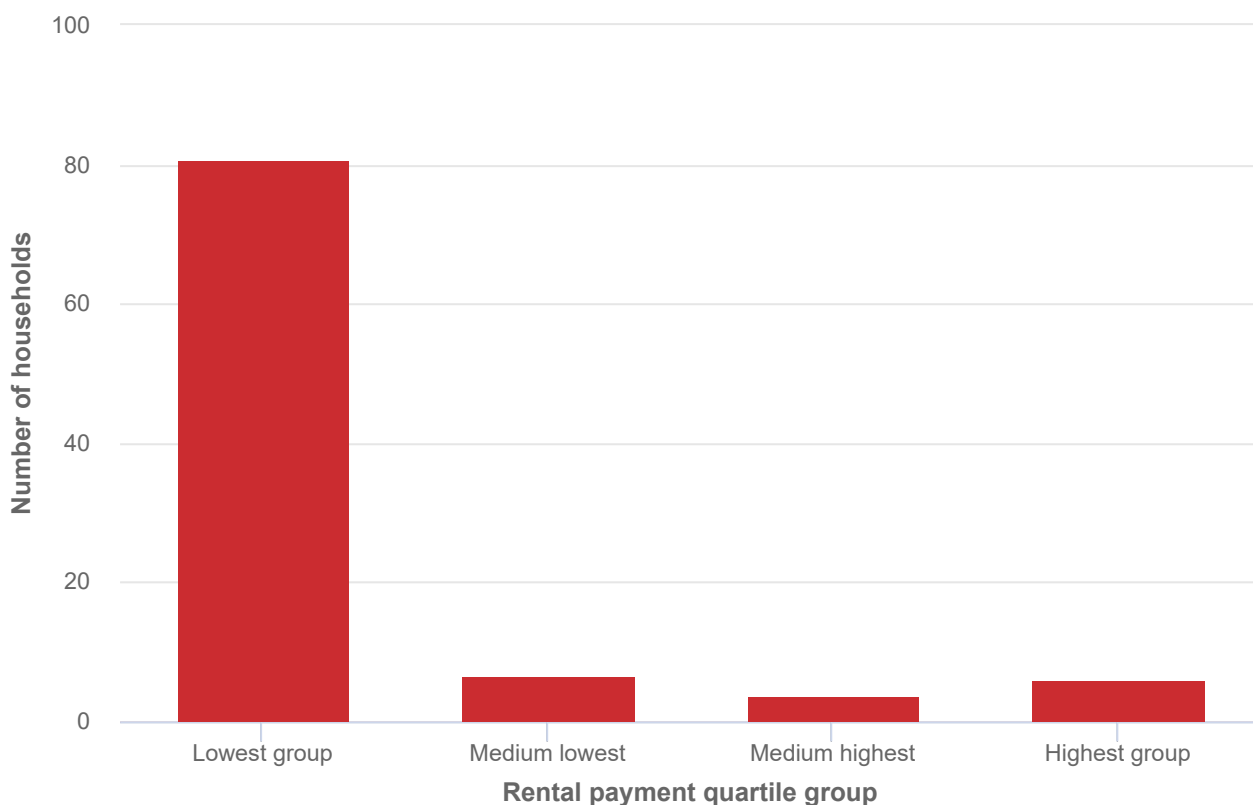
## Housing rental quartiles for 2021

## Migration summary

Between 2016 and 2021, Australia-wide, 53.1% of people (aged 5 and over) did not change address over 5 years, while 35.3% moved within Australia, and 5.4% moved from overseas.

**In the RDA Eyre Peninsula Region, a higher rate of people did not change address (60.4%), while a lower rate (29.3%) moved from elsewhere in Australia, and a lower rate (1.3%) moved from overseas. A total of 10,289 people, or 62.5% of those who moved within Australia, moved within the RDA Eyre Peninsula Region.**

Migration, or residential mobility, together with births and deaths are significant components of population change in Australia. Migration is the most volatile component of population change and can be affected by changing housing and economic opportunities such as housing affordability issues or the mining boom. The three main types of migration are overseas migration, interstate migration and within-state migration, of which within-state is the most common and largely involves moves between neighbouring areas within an urban or regional setting.

Looking at the level and type of migration in the RDA Eyre Peninsula Region can indicate whether the population is sedentary and likely to be in the area for a long time (and perhaps have significant ties to the community), or transient, and likely to move on. Related topics which can be viewed to get a clearer picture of population mobility include **Age Structure** (young adults are likely to move more often) and **Housing Tenure** (generally renters move more often while home ownership indicates a more stable population).

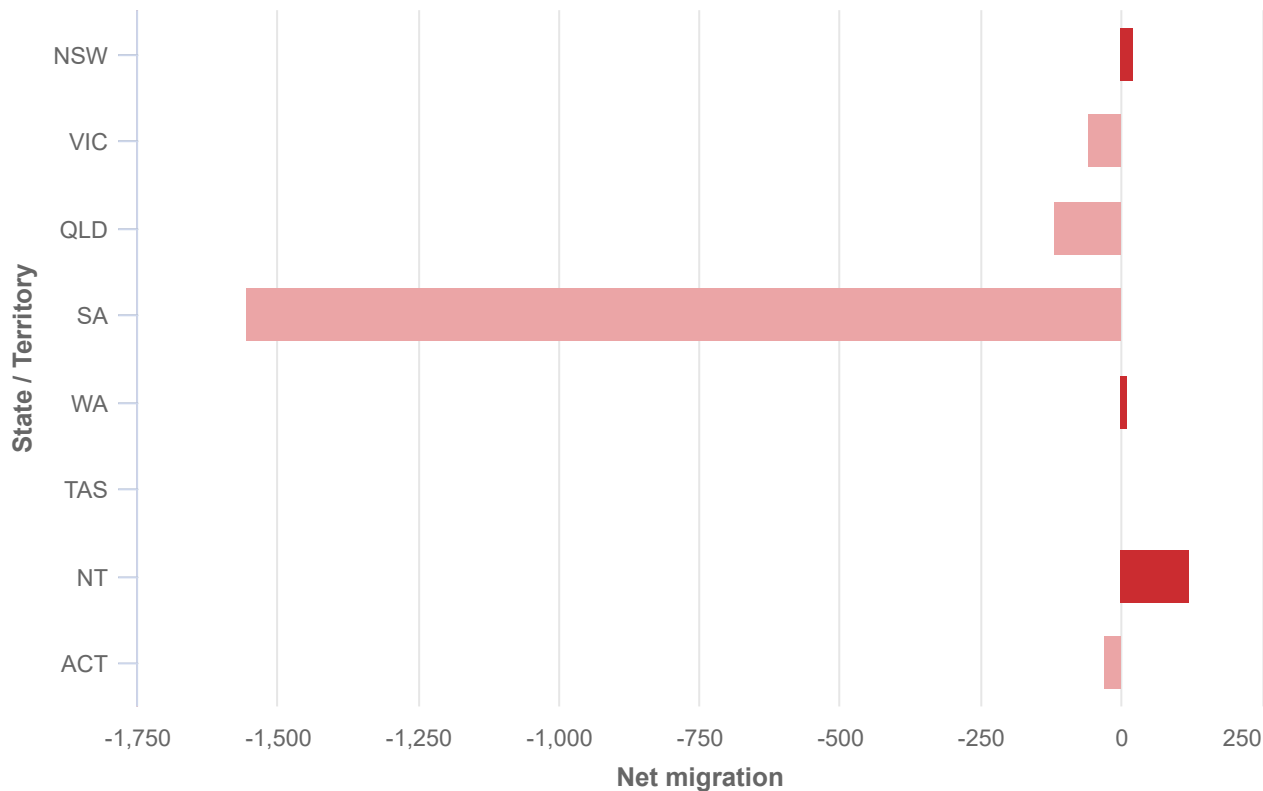

## Population movement by State/Territory

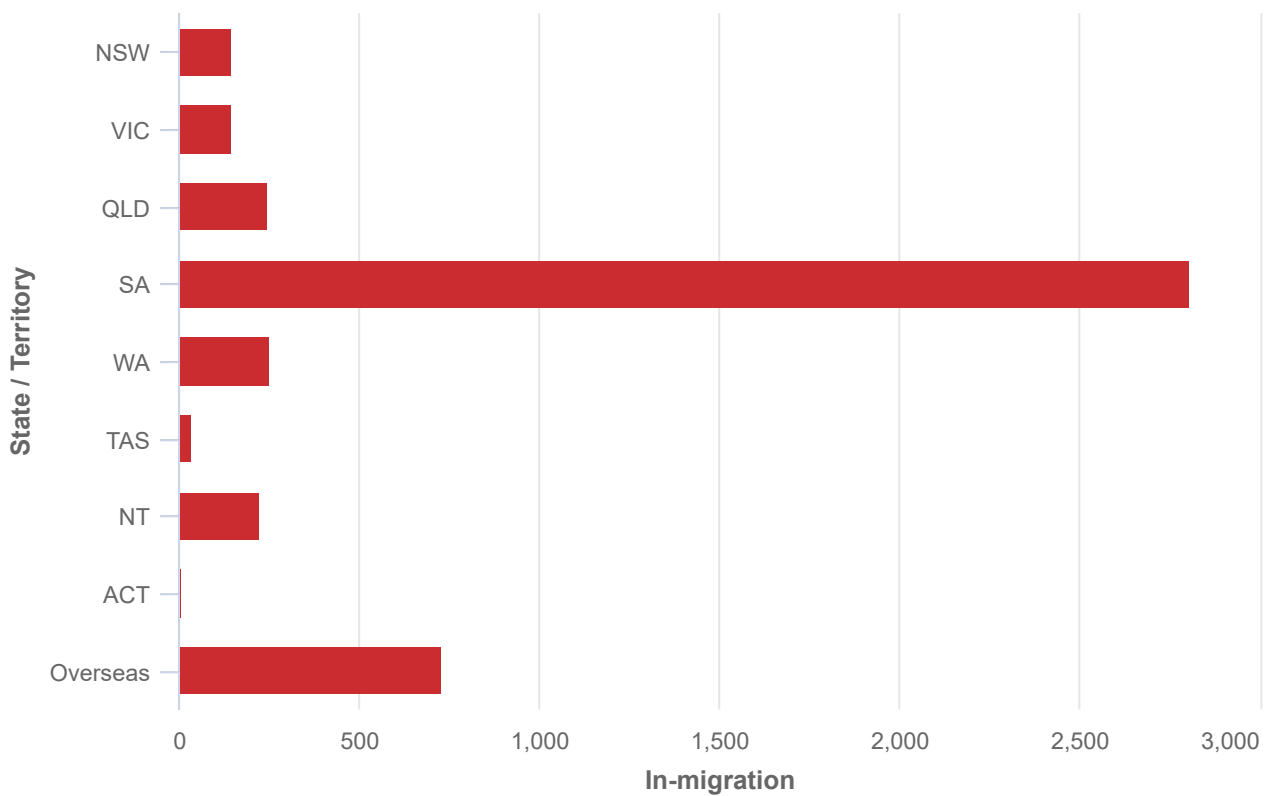

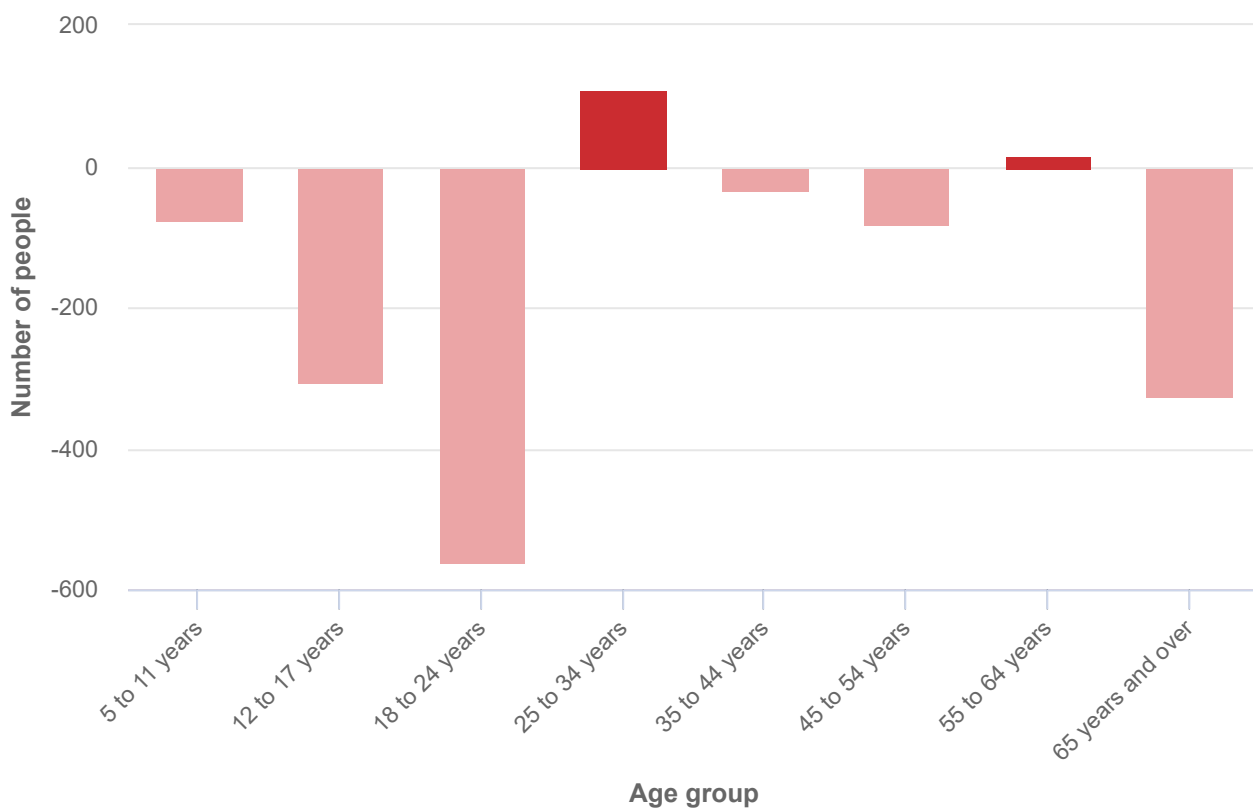

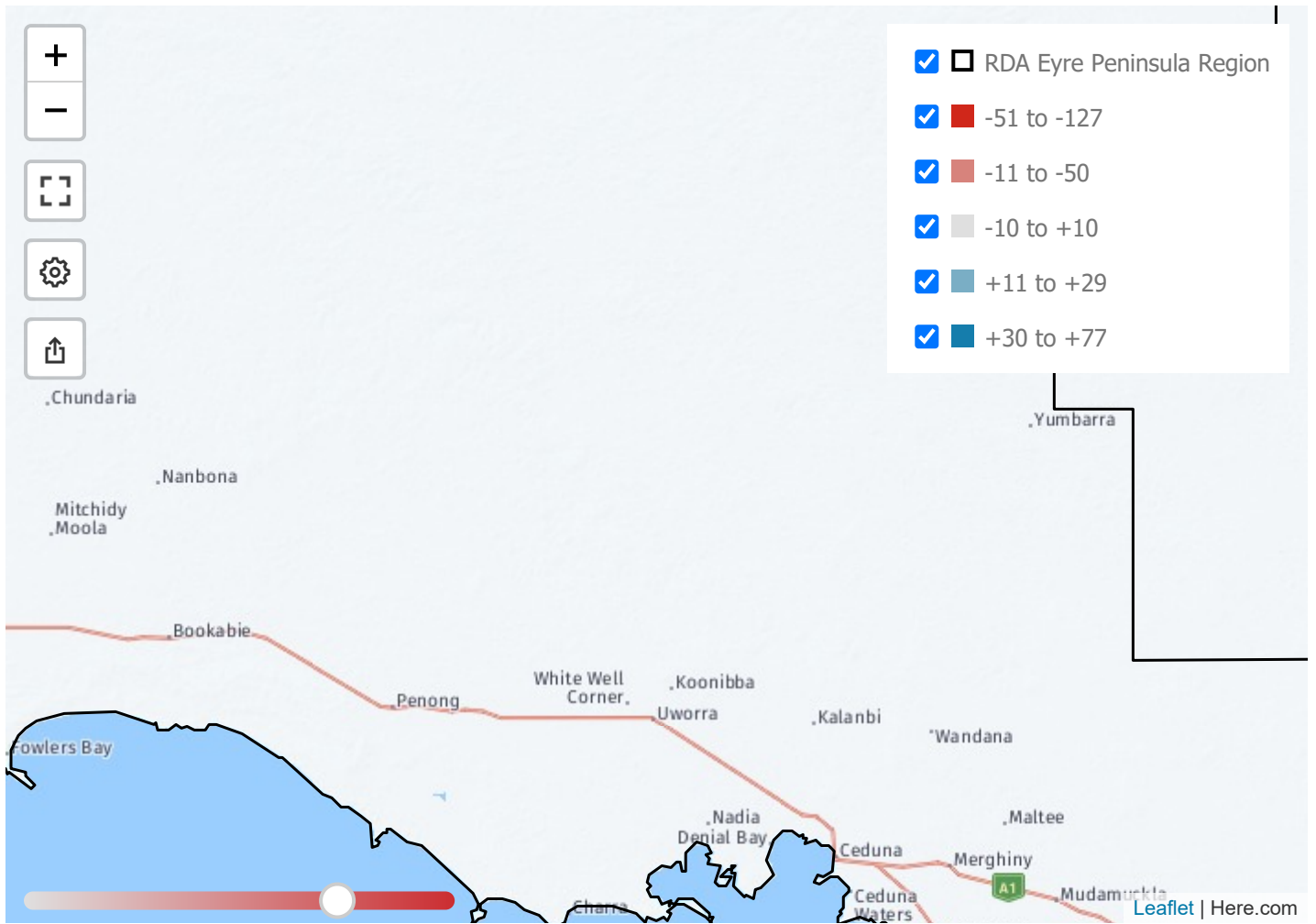

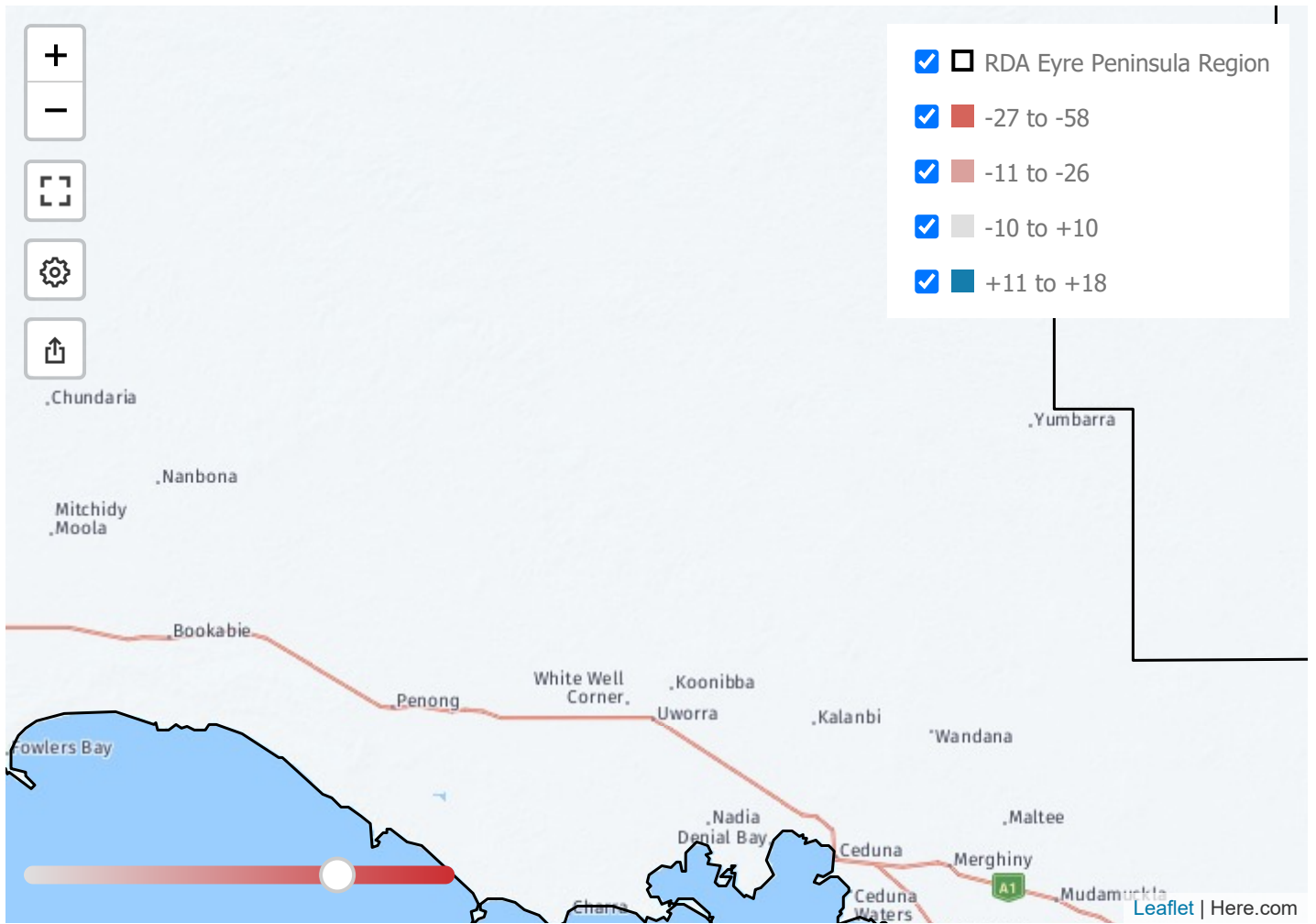
Migration, or residential mobility, together with births and deaths are significant components of population change in Australia. Migration is the most volatile component of population change and can be affected by changing housing and economic opportunities such as housing affordability issues or changes in employment patterns.

This page looks specifically at internal migration, and includes annual data collected since the last Census to look at migration patterns in the most recent time periods. This is helpful to see likely affects on future population growth and where people are moving with the wider region. The data is sourced from the ABS - "Regional Internal Migration Estimates" collection, which is a part of the annual Estimated Resident Population update, and shows movement between all LGAs in Australia. The table shows in and out movements, while the map shows the net total movement between the area of interest and each LGA in the specified time period.

Migration data should be viewed in conjunction with age structure, occupation and household type information to get an appreciation of why people are moving as well as where. Cultural diversity is also an important related topic, as some areas function as first settlement locations of migrants, while others get secondary overseas migration.

## Residential building approvals

**In the RDA Eyre Peninsula Region there were 12 residential dwellings approved to be built in the financial year 2023-2024 FYTD (July).**

The RDA Eyre Peninsula Region's building approvals are used as a leading indicator of the general level of residential development, economic activity, employment and investment. Residential building activity depends on many factors that vary with the state of the economy including interest rates, availability of mortgage funds, government spending, and business investment. Large financial changes or shocks, such as the Global Financial Crisis of 2008/09 can be observed in the data. However, the number of building approvals can fluctuate substantially from year to year simply as a result of the short-term nature of many construction projects, and the cyclical nature of the industry.

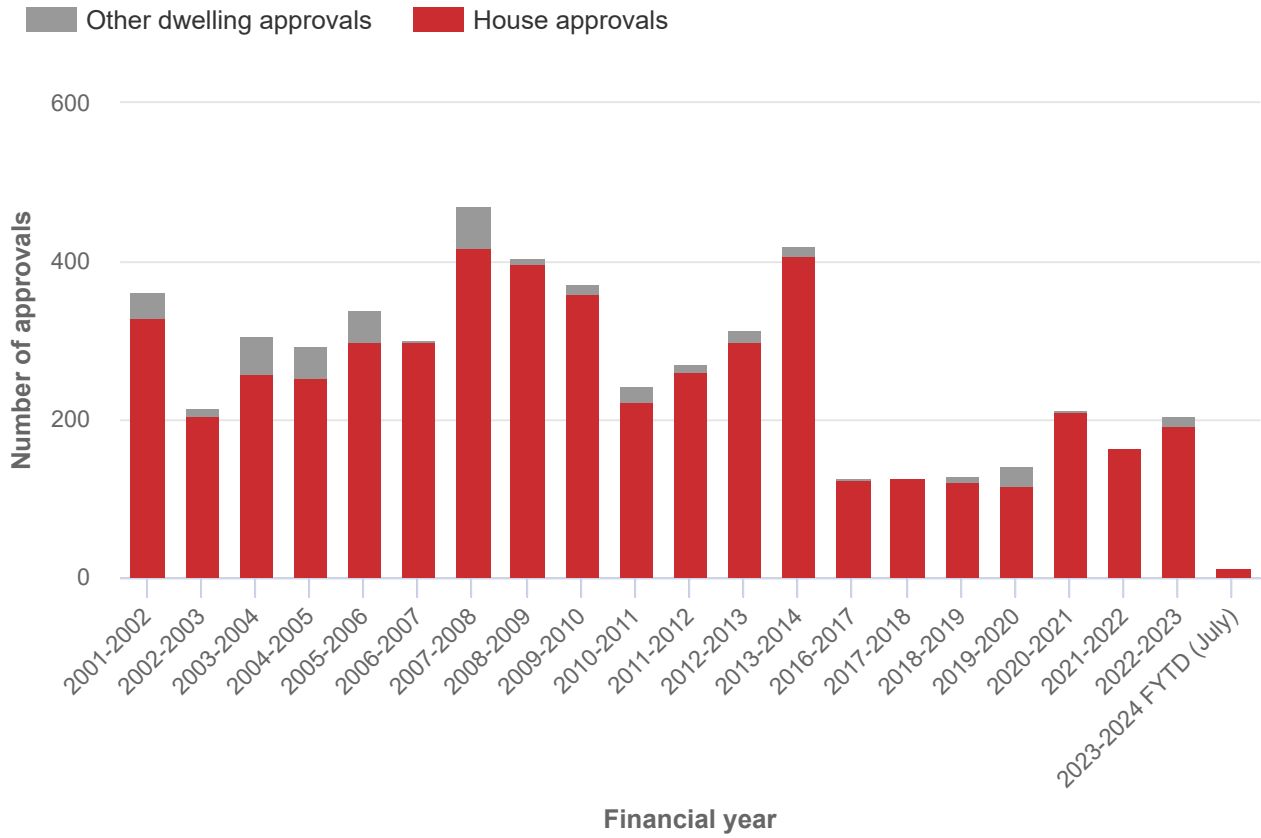

## JobSeeker and Youth Allowance recipients

In May 2023 there were 4,105 JobSeeker and Youth Allowance recipients in the RDA Eyre Peninsula Region.

This new dataset released by the Department of Social Services is updated monthly. This represents the number of people who are eligible recipients of JobSeeker allowance (generally aged 22+) and youth allowance (excluding students, generally aged 21 and under). To be eligible for JobSeeker, which replaced Newstart allowance in March 2020, participants must be unemployed and looking for work, though certain activity criteria have been relaxed during the COVID-19 period.

JobSeeker rates are a good updated measure of socio-economic disadvantage in an area, and should be looked at in conjunction with 2016 Census SEIFA indexes, employment status, income and education levels. They can also provide an indication of which areas within your region are most affected by the impacts of COVID-19 containment measures.

JobSeeker data are shown for Local Government Areas, and SA2s which have a significant population within the LGA or region.

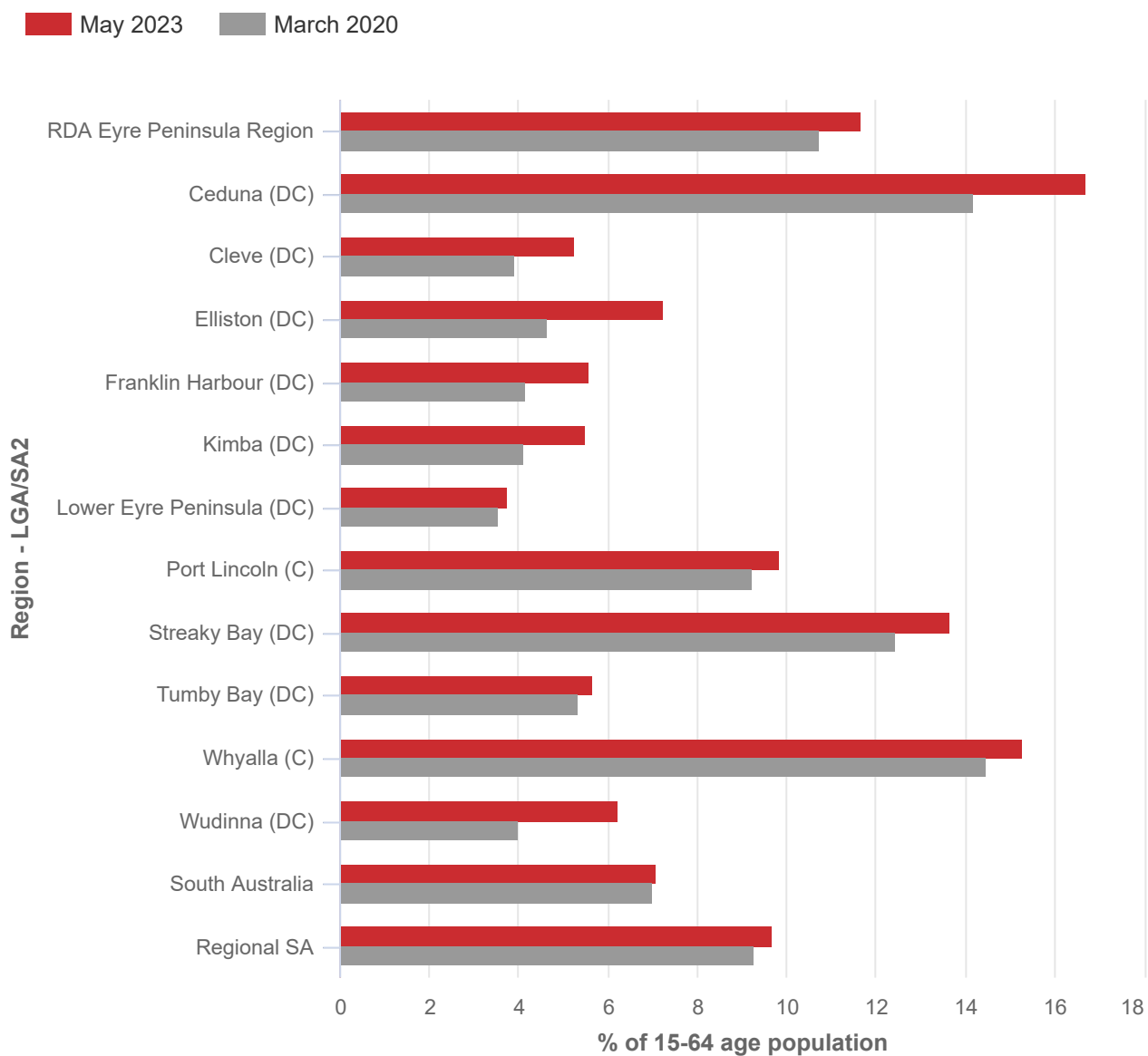

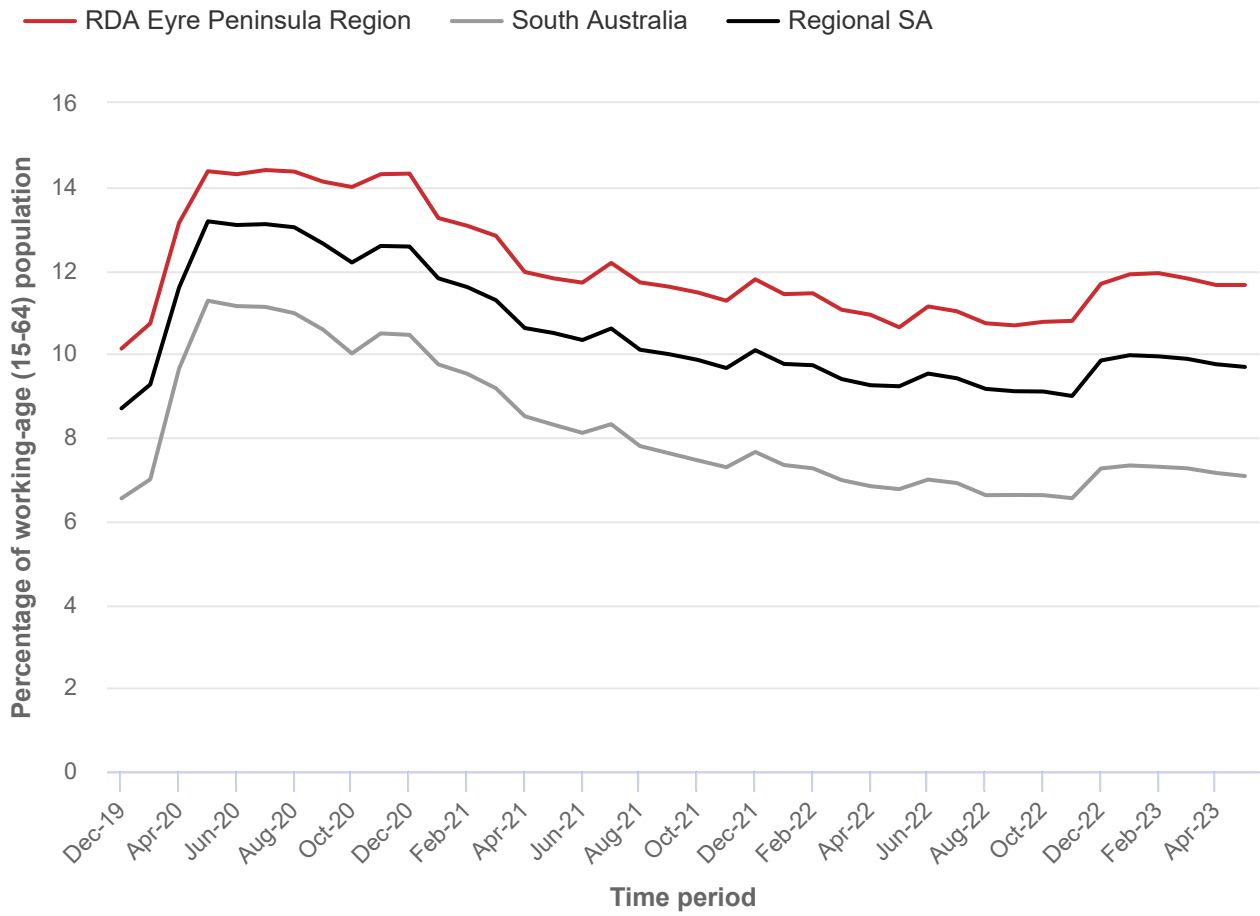

## SEIFA by Local Government Area

### SEIFA Index of Disadvantage for the RDA Eyre Peninsula Region in 2021 was 938.

The RDA Eyre Peninsula Region Socio-Economic Indexes for Areas (SEIFA) measure the relative level of socio-economic disadvantage and/or advantage based on a range of Census characteristics. Two of the SEIFA indexes: the Index of Relative Socio-Economic Disadvantage (IRSD) and the Index of Relative Socio-Economic Advantage and Disadvantage (IRSAD) can be selected below.

#### Index of Relative Socio-Economic Disadvantage (IRSD)

---

This index contains only disadvantage indicators (e.g. unemployment, low incomes or education levels, single parent families, low skilled occupations, poor English proficiency), so is best used to distinguish between disadvantaged areas, but doesn't differentiate between those areas which are highly advantaged, and those just lacking a lot of disadvantage (with population close to the middle). This index is most commonly used for funding allocations and advocacy, because it highlights the areas of most need.

#### Index of Relative Socio-Economic Advantage and Disadvantage (IRSAD)

---

This index contains indicators of disadvantage as well as additional indicators of advantage (e.g. professional occupations, high income, higher education levels, high rent, large dwellings), Characteristics are also weighted differently than the IRSD, so areas do score differently on either measure. Often the IRSAD index will show a more "spread out" distribution with a greater range of scores from very high to very low, due to its ability to measure advantage above the average level.

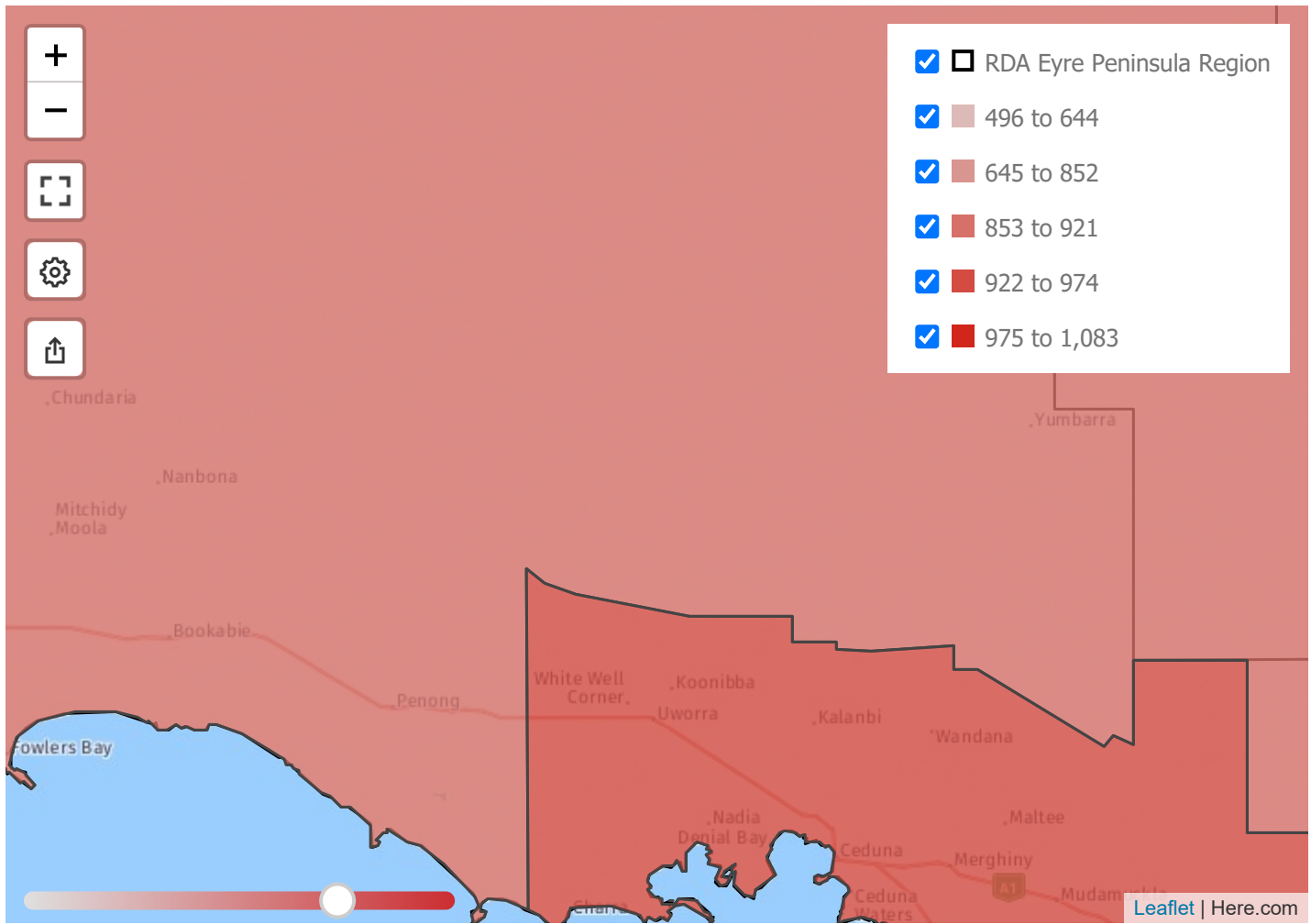
SEIFA indexes are a good place to start to get a general view of the relative level of disadvantage in one area compared to others, but it is important to also look at these underlying characteristics as they can differ markedly between areas with similar SEIFA scores and shed light on the type of disadvantage being experienced.

A higher score on the index means a *lower* level of disadvantage or (in the case of IRSAD only) a *higher* level of advantage. A lower score on the index means a *higher* level of disadvantage on both indexes, and a lack of advantage on the IRSAD.

The percentile column indicates the approximate position of this small area in a ranked list of Australia's suburbs and localities in 2021. It's meant to give a broad indication of where the area sits within the whole nation. A higher number indicates a higher socio-economic status. For instance, a percentile of 72 indicates that approximately 72% of Australia's suburbs have a SEIFA index lower than this area (more disadvantaged), while 28% are higher. This applies a comparison to suburbs even when the index concerned doesn't relate to a suburb.

## About the community profile

Demographic change across Australia is recorded by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) in the Census collections every five years. Population experts **.id (informed decisions)** analyse and convert these raw figures into stories of place to inform council staff, community groups, investors, business, students and the general public.

The RDA Eyre Peninsula Region Community Profile provides demographic analysis for the Region and its suburbs based on results from the 2021, 2016, 2011, 2006 and 2001 Australian Census of Population and Housing. The profile is updated with population estimates when the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) releases new figures such as the annual Estimated Resident Population (ERP).

Suburb boundaries and Census questions change over time, but **.id** manages the data to ensure that there is an accurate time series provided for the current geographic boundaries. You can read more about this in the **Geography Notes** section.

Results for the RDA Eyre Peninsula Region include population, age structure, ethnicity, ancestry, religion, income, qualifications, occupations, employment, unemployment, disability, disadvantage, volunteering, childcare, family structure, household structure, housing tenure, mortgage and rental payments, and the size and type of the dwellings people live in.
